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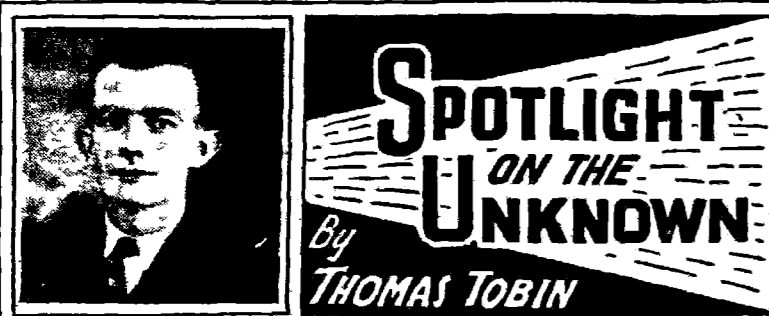

POPE'S ADDRESS ON SPORT
ADVICE TO REPORTERS

APPROVAL OF SUNDAY GAMES

Pope Pius last week-end called on sports reporters to write with sober discretion which is a thousand times more eloquent and more powerful than lyrical dithyrambs.
He told sports writers from fourteen nations that they should not be mere reporters recounting the superficiality of sports events and making their effect by a strikingly coloured style by picturesque vivacity of narration and by a technical vocabulary intelligible only to initiates which is sometimes though not always happy, often audacious and even forced.
Instead he said they should be conscious of the influence they wield and should use this influence to form public opinion. This could be done while writing with sober discretion by means of a brief reflection at the beginning of a story or at its end—or better still by a simple word which seizes in its flight a fleeting incident a gesture an attitude these comments in French which he delivered during an audience accorded to delegates to the 20th plenary assembly of the International Sporting Press Association, now meeting in Rome.
He gave the delegates a four-point outline of sports place in life. (1) Sport should not be an end in itself. It should not degenerate into a cult of the physical from interfering with the spiritual and moral perfection of man sport should promote aid and favour it. (2) For brain or manual workers the aim of sport is to provide a relief in favour of their return to their tasks with renewed vigour of will with ligaments retuned. (3) Sport should not paralyse the joys of family life. Family life is so precious that this protection cannot be refused it. (4) The same principle applies more strongly and with even greater importance when it is a question of religious duties. On Sunday the first place belongs to God.
The Pope added that the Catholic Church does not forbid Sunday sport, and indeed regards it with benevolence, on condition that Sunday remains the Lord's Day and the day of corporal and spiritual relaxation.

I am pleased to submit the twelfth annual report of the Dungarvan and District Nursing Association. The district was visited by Miss Kenny in June subsequent to her visit we received the following interesting report: "The annual round of visits paid with Miss Hartney the patients and relatives seized the opportunity to thank the Inspector for the regular attention and kindly care given by Nurse Farrell. It is a good job to have a keeper and sets a standard for all housewives in Dungarvan. It is gratifying to find that the County Council have asked our Nurses to undertake the additional work of visiting the homes of the elderly and housebound patients for whom no one knows the patients better than Nurse Hartney therefore they are more ready to submit to new treatment when advised to do so by Nurse Hartney. The annual collection proved very successful as was also the Annual Jumble Sale a net profit of £42 helped to tide the Association over a difficult period it also helped the poor of the town to purchase much-needed clothing and household articles at a small cost. The Town Clerk then received a letter from Messrs Farrell & Morrissey Solrs stating that they were lodging into the matter. Nothing then happened for a considerable period said Mr Williams and another similar notice was served on Mr Casey on July 17th giving him 14 days to carry out the repairs. Nothing happened either as a result of this notice and then Mr Casey was written to and a reply from him stated that he had handed the matter over to his legal advisers

Mr Williams then quoted the section of the Act under which he was making the application which stated that when a person on whom notice has been served makes default in abating a nuisance the Sanitary Authority shall cause a complaint to be made before the Justice to have a summons signed

The Justice said that he dealt with cases like this frequently in Clonmel and they can be brought by a summons signed by a Peace Commissioner or the District Court Clerk

Mr Williams said that he understood that the Justice himself would have to sign the summons but was pleased to know that it could be done as the Justice pointed out and said that in view of this there was no point in the present application which he withdrew

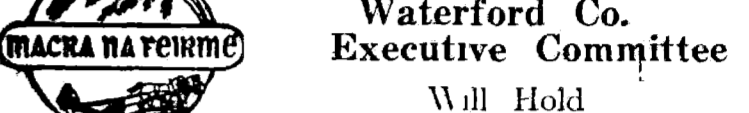
