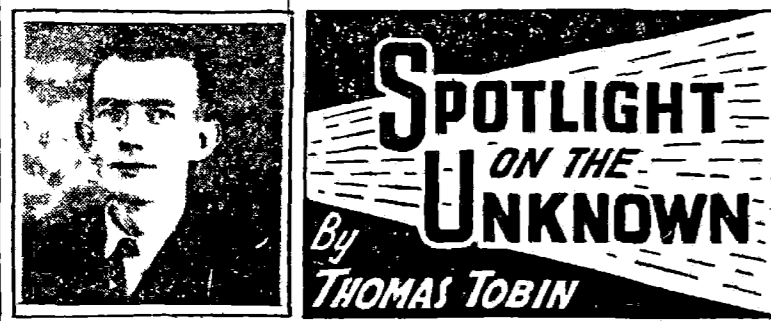

## SPOTLIGHT ON THE UNKNOWN

ANOTHER NEW INDUSTRY Waterford has another new industry which is situated at Tourin Cappoquin. A new £30,000 Grass Drying Plant a branch of Provincial Crop Driers Ltd. the industry is one which will do much for agriculture in Ireland.

This new factory was officially opened on Saturday May 24th by the Minister for Agriculture Mr. T. Walsh. The ceremony was blessed by Rev. Fr. P. McGrath P.P. Cappoquin. The Station has a total of 450 acres attached to it and will this year have a total output of 1,000 tons of grass meal.

The opening ceremony was an impressive occasion and was attended by guests from many parts of the country who were later shown over the interesting plant. The story behind the introduction of grass meal into this country is of interest not only to the farmer but also to the ordinary man in the street.

The process of drying grass to provide a concentrated food is a well-known one in the United States and in Great Britain during the early 1930s it was introduced into this country until 1947. By 1948 the total production of grass meal was about 600 tons since then however there has been constant development. With the new plant at Tourin the total this year should be about 5,000 tons.

By extracting the moisture from grass a concentrated food results with a high protein content. Unlike hay and silage dried grass retains the full vitamin and mineral content of the fresh grass. Ninety per cent of the grassmeal produced in Ireland is included in compound rations for all classes of farm stock the remainder being used by farmers for direct feeding to livestock. During the winter it replaces and gives results similar to the grazing of spring pastures.

**24-Hour Day**  
The quality of dried grass is directly related to the quality of the fresh grass from which it is produced. Grass-drying therefore must be based on the production of high quality and high-yielding grasses which must be harvested at their most nutritional stage of growth.

Grasses yield their highest protein when they are growing fastest. This is usually when they are from four to ten inches long and the stems they are cut. At the Clogran (Co. Dub.) station of Provincial Crop Driers the grass is usually cut four or five times during the season. In April and December. To keep the drier going at the height of the season it may be necessary to bring in some 70 to 80 tons of wet grass each day. At Tourin as a Van den Broek Model 'B' of Dutch manufacture. It evaporates 4,000 lbs of water an hour giving an output of 6 to 20 cwt of dried grass an hour according to the weather. On an average four and a half tons of water is extracted from five and a half tons of wet grass to produce one ton of dried grass.

**LABOUR PARTY CONVENTION**  
Councillor John Griffin Selected As Labour Candidate  
**ALD. T. LYNCH IS FINE GAEL CANDIDATE**  
Gen. Mulcahy's Address To Convention

At the Labour Convention held in the Town Hall Dungarvan on Sunday last, Mr. Brendan Corish T.D. presided in attendance were Senators J. McGrath and a record number of delegates from all districts in the county. In his address Mr. Corish stated that the outstanding feature of the forthcoming election was that the issue was very clearly defined. They could show in the best possible way whether they approved of the Fianna Fail policy or their rejection of it especially as it had played in the last budget. Dealing with accusations that Labour had taken the side of the Fine Gael Party Mr. Corish said that it was not important whose side you took what was important was that side stood for. That was the basis of their alliance with the Coalition Government and in taking that move they did so with the understanding that the Labour Party would get its due consideration. While the Coalition Government was in power Labour certainly made itself felt in many ways for the good of the people and the country. Referring to the accusations made by Fianna Fail on the spending of the Dollar Loans he would like to point out that it might be well for those so fond of raising their voice against anything but the Coalition Party to consider that the Coalition Party had spent in 3 1/2 years £24 million in 3 1/2 years. Fianna Fail have spent in eleven months £26 million dollars. Would it be Communism he asked, to suggest that if the Government really wanted to raise the actual deficit which would be about £15 million without crucifying the people could they not take it from the people's pocket and pay a higher tax than the ordinary taxpayer? Dear Sir—I do not wish to become involved in an argument on the ethics of free education as a matter of fact I rather agree with Mr. Kyne that free education would be a good thing. I am not interested in the reasons for Mr. Kyne's statements as they are quite beside the point. In the reports that reached the public his remarks were bald statements without qualification. He said that examinations and degrees could be bought. In his letter he gives a definition of "buying" which is anything out of the correct one. To buy anything one merely exchanges money for it there is no further complication. One may buy education which is really an abstract thing but again I say one may not buy the examinations in question. No amount of money will procure these for anyone who has not the required intellectual ability. Granted that the poor man's son who has ability is very severely handicapped—not in the matter of education but as regards the obtaining of certificates which are necessary to proceed further. Mr. Kyne does not say University education can be bought. He states specifically that degrees can be bought. I quote his letter in its absence money to compensate. I state very positively that money does not under any circumstances compensate for lack of talent in the matter of obtaining degrees. Note I do not say in attending the University which is an entirely different matter. In this regard the rich man's son has the rather doubtful advantage of being able to waste two years in any given faculty before being thrown out on his rich ear.

Mr. Kyne is being merely naive when he says he did not mention bribery. He did not use the word but he did say that certain things which cannot lawfully be held up for sale are in fact bought. Is there a difference? As regards entry fees for examinations it were better to dispel immediately any ideas that their function is to exclude anyone who has not the required sum of money. It is not obvious that the cost of printed paper superintendents and examiners must be covered. In conclusion may I say that Mr. Kyne has very reason to be proud of the position to which the people have raised him but I beg humbly to suggest that his position carries with it the responsibility of avoiding such rash unconsidered statements as those to which I have taken exception.
