**PIONEERING IN BALLINAMEELA**  
In the progressive little parish of Ballinameela Co. Waterford a fitting monument to the endeavours of the local Young Farmers Club is today approaching completion.

It is a very well laid-out building which will be used as a Vocational School and general cultural centre and has been built by the young and old farmers of the area and students of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Schools. The idea was born when the Ballinameela Young Farmers found their need for a proper meeting place growing more and more daily. The matter was discussed again and again and eventually it was decided to put the idea before the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee in the hope of getting their support. The young farmers stated their case. They had a free site given them by Mr. Patrick Hickey of Knocknascacha. They were prepared to put up £150 and they would devote every bit of spare time to building operations. They wanted the aid of the Vocational Education Instructors and the backing of the Co. Waterford. There was no hesitation on the part of the Committee realising only too well that one of the main objects of the Young Farmers Club is the promotion of every young educational for the farmer and they agreed to co-operate in every way.

Mr. T. Murray Woodcock Instructors in the Cappoquin Vocational School was put in charge, while Mr. J. Baston, Headmaster at Cappoquin, took charge of plans and lay-out. The success of their work today stands as a tribute to deep interest in their work. Site preparation went ahead and then commenced the actual building operations. It was at this stage that Mr. Denis Cullinan, Co. Waterford C.E.O. who is also Vice-President of Macra na Feirme really moved in the enterprise. From the very birth of the idea he was one of the most active workers but his thoughtfulness in bringing in a number of young apprentices sponsored by the Department of Education, to coincide with the erection of the hall won him the admiration of the Young Farmers, the Department and the young apprentices. Twelve apprentices were selected for the course and were released from their employment to undergo the eight weeks course. They received an allowance of £2 10s 6d a week from the Department while doing the course which commenced in June last.

As it is the policy of the Department to put apprentices undergoing such a course on the erection of some building of a minor nature under the guidance of Vocational Instructors it was agreed that the plan as outlined by Mr. Cullinan would prove of high value to the youths. The scheme was unique in as much as it was the first time such a big job was tackled by a group of apprentices. In the past in other parts of Ireland the erection of such buildings as bicycles sheds for the school concerned or extensions to existing stores were carried out but never before was it even thought of that apprentices should work at the erection of what would be a modern vocational school. It was an experiment that paid off with 100% success, and for the twelve apprentices it was a job they would always remember and especially for what

## ENTRIES UP, HIGH STANDARD AT DUNGARVAN SHOW

### Jumping Was Highlight

Warm sunny weather tempered by a light breeze made conditions exceedingly pleasant for what must have been almost a record attendance at the Dungarvan Agricultural Show held on Thursday, July 31st. The grounds, situated in the shadow of the Corragh Mountains were well filled from an early hour and in the afternoon when the shops were closed for the weekly half-holiday, hundreds more arrived to enjoy the many exhibits and to enjoy the jumping competitions. The Committee in charge had made well high perfect arrangements and judging was carried through in excellent time. In all sections the entries were up to previous years and the standard was very high. As well as livestock there was a record display of arts and crafts (50) and a section for agricultural machinery. The jumping in the afternoon was the high light of the day and crowds watched the performers give a skillful display of riding. There were four competitions and the entries up were very large all the best known riders in the South taking part. There were 14 classes in the horse section and the judges had a difficult task in allotting the prizes.

The four-year-old bay gelding owned by Mr. Larry O'Byrne, Kilmacthomas, was awarded the Dungarvan Farmers Dance Committee Cup which carries with it the championship of the show. This fine animal has already captured the championship at Cork and Middleton Shows and was winner of his class at Clonmel. He did not win the championship there. 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

**TALLOW AND ROUND ABOUT**

Bank Holiday Week-end—The last bank holiday of the current season has come and gone and while it could not be termed the ideal of holidaymakers it was dry and that was all that mattered. The order as all endeavoured to make the most of the holiday week-end Sunday was rather cloudy and more like April than August owing to the threatening clouds held up, and there were odd periods of sunshine. In Tallow the only attraction was the Tournament match at the Sportsfield. The majority of the spectators were attracted while others spent the day more quietly in the country. At night the various places of amusement were well patronised. Monday dawned dull but mild and witnessed the usual exodus of racing enthusiasts to Mallow and Youghal for the Annual Races and at the quarter past nine the town was reminiscent of Goldsmith's poem "The Deserted Village"—all all were gone. And so the Bank Holiday week-end passed in Tulac an Iarainn.

**Affairs For Tournament Final**

At the Sportsfield on Monday the Silver Medal Tournament was staged at the Tallow Sportsfield on Sunday last between Affane and Tallow and following a keen and well contested game the match was successful with three points and qualified for the final of the Tournament when they meet the winner of the Lismore v Ballyduff match which will be played on the first available Sunday probably August 18th.

Affane failed to reproduce the form displayed against St. Catherine's (Ballynoe) in the opening round but they were short a number of their regular players on Sunday including their goal-keeper and this no doubt mitigated against their display. Tallow although fielding the majority of their team put up a very fine display against their more experienced opponents and had they relied more on individual efforts, their efforts might have had better results—as it was the final score of 5-6 to 5-3 was a fair indication of the closeness of the game. The match was in excellent condition but the attendance was very small and certainly there were no excuses on Sunday from a weather point of view. This apathy on the part of the public is certainly anything but encouraging for the young Gaels of the town who are young nothing undone to bring hurling back to its former proud position in the Brideside town.

Winning the toss Tallow played into the town goal, aided by a strong breeze. From the "throw-in" O'Mahony sent Tallow away and Cronin was wide with a good effort. Coffey drove well upfield and Curley went in for the visitors with a neat point. Curley sent the puck-out well into the Affane half but S. Buckley and E. O'Shea put his side two points up and he drove a free bar. P. Collins sent Tallow attacking and forcing a 70 opened their score with a point per J. Burke. Heartened by this success J. O'Brien made it "level pegging" at a point. The pressure O'Mahony proved his worth by driving well upfield for Cronin to crash to the net for a goal and the lead which was supplemented by another play by Curley. Tallow drove a free well-in and following a melee in the goalmouth were through for a goal. A similar score to Affane was disallowed owing to an infringement but a minute later P. Foley drove to the net, and took the lead with a goal per M. Daly to which O'Shea added a point. Tallow fought back in determined style and the late goal per O'Brien. From the puck-out Affane had a point to make the score 5-5 to 5-3 in favour of the visitors. At this stage Tallow made an all out effort to pull the game "out of the fire" and hurleys clashed in the Affane goalmouth but the defence held out and before the end added another point to win by three points.

It will contain a very fine room measuring 38 ft. x 23 ft. suitable for classes meetings and concerts as well as a smaller room which can be used for classes committee meetings, etc. It is estimated that the cost will work out at about £1,200 and contractors have stated that to build such a fine building in the ordinary way would mean the expenditure of at least £4,000. In these days of soaring rates a saving of £2,800 to the ratepayers is no mean achievement.

And so today the people of Ballinameela both young and old look forward hopefully no longer will their lives in quiet countryside lack the opportunities of those in the towns. No more will the long dark nights, be wasted in boring idleness. Education and social entertainment will now work hand in hand in brightening their lives in moulding their future and above all in making Ireland a better nation.
