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Monthly Fair A Huge Success—The August monthly fair proved another huge success thus adding another successful chapter to its already long list of successes. All grades of cattle were in keen demand and the number of transactions effected was well in advance of last month. Some very fine animals were on offer and two local owners obtained £64 and £66 each respectively. Sheep and lambs were in brisk demand and all on offer were cleared early. Store pigs showed a sharp advance in prices and the smaller types also sold well. Transport arrangements by road and rail were all that could be desired, while every facility was available for buyers and sellers.

Public Convenience—An Urgent Necessity—With so much being heard and read nowadays about health and hygiene it seems very strange that a town of the size of Tallow, with a good population, should have no public convenience (or lavatory) and one can't help asking what is the Waterford County Council (Public Health Section) doing about the matter? Appalling nothing is in the way of thinking that a town which has an up-to-date creamery, a bus service, monthly fairs, etc., etc., which brings large numbers of people into the town night and day, and with the exception of one or two, of any kind—one would imagine we were living away back in the seventeenth century and not in the so-called progressive year of 1952. This project has been the subject of many discussions and the members of the County Council, to have this long felt want erected as soon as possible. From time to time the matter has been passed over on the plea that no suitable site was available for the purpose. Now your correspondent would like to point out that a most convenient site is available and we feel sure, be obtained at minimum cost, on this long standing plea of "no suitable site" no longer the obstacle—hence it is hoped preliminary arrangements will be made at once and that the long agitated for public convenience (or lavatory) will be erected in the town with the minimum of delay, and thus give inhabitants and visitors the minimum of public facilities.
