## SPOTLIGHT ON THE UNKNOWN

### GAELTACHT ROAD GRANT FOR RING AND OLD PARISH

I have been informed that due to the continued representations of Councillor M. Harty M.C.C. Ring a grant of £5,000 under the Gaeltacht Road Works Scheme has been obtained for the repair of roads in the Gaeltacht area of Ring and Old Parish. This should indeed, prove good news for the ratepayers of those areas as the roads there are in need of great attention and it is understood that a scheme has already been prepared by the county engineers. Apart from the much needed repairs to the roads, this grant will give a great deal of employment and it is to be hoped that the scheme will be put in operation as soon as possible.

I have learned nothing as to whether the Ardmore area is to be included in this scheme or not and there is some difference of opinion I understand, as to whether St. Declan's territory comes within the scope of the scheme or not.

Incidentally it has also been mentioned that the case of the Western Bay, Dungarvan, has not been completely shelved, and that there is a distinct possibility of hearing some good news concerning this project within the next few months.

### CARTOON PERSONALITIES

Much interest was created in Dungarvan by an advertisement in a National daily paper on Saturday last depicting four well-known local personalities in a cartoon. Viewing a T.V. set in a comfortable position in the Square were shown Messrs Colum Moloney, Eddie Spratt and Tony Moloney while Mr. Monnie Casey looked on from the back. It was really one for the scrap-book.

### ELEVEN DAYS LEFT

With only eleven days left to Christmas shoppers are going through the usual worry of getting something for someone and the wise ones are out early to avoid the last minute rush. An added worry with most this year is the provision of cash from a limited budget and it will be a case with the majority of making a little go a long way. However Christmas comes but once a year and age old traditions cannot be broken no matter what the economists say.

### FOG—FOG—NOTHING BUT FOG

During the past week, Dungarvan and district got its full share of the thick fog which has been covering the country much to the inconvenience of many. On Sunday and Monday last it was exceptionally bad and motorists travelled with great difficulty. In several cases it was so bad that visibility was down to a few feet only and what struck me as most unusual was a sight which met my eyes in Mount Mellerey. I was driving along the road and I could not see it. It was wrapped in the thick fog and at times presented a most unusual sight as murky outlines became visible for a second or so and then disappeared. It was up to the time of writing no serious accident as a result, had been reported but traffic in many cases had been dislocated.

### MORE BOTHER

There is at present a great deal of bother as a result of Dr. Ryan's new Health Bill, the proposals for which have been providing loads of material for argument all over the country. To the ordinary observer it appears that opposition outweighs favour of the scheme and in view of its cost, many of us will agree that it should be opposed. The main opposition generally is the fact that it will mean a substantial increase in rates and this is something which cannot be afforded by the ratepayers under present circumstances.

The other troublesome point is that the scheme is not for the poor man but is instead for the man with an income of £400 to £600 of an income per year. In plain figures that means that the scheme is for the man getting from around £8 to £11 a week and we are told that the ratepayers must be scrounged for their benefit but this is not the only object. There are several but for the present suffice to mention a recent case which speaks for itself.

Father Felim O'Brien, Franciscan professor of Philosophy at University College, Galway, recently attacked Health Minister Dr. "Jim" Ryan's speech in which the Minister defended the scheme against Father O'Brien's previous criticisms. Father O'Brien accused Dr. Ryan of using intemperate language and "distortion". He denied the Minister's allegation that he had tried to

terrify people that county office staffs would in future spend their spare time reading about the ailments and "shameful diseases" of their friends. Father O'Brien said he thought nothing of the kind. He asked Dr. Ryan to explain how he was going to protect medical secrets under the new health plan.

He added it was wrong for the Minister to say that no such fear of divulgence was expressed in England. "It was and is being expressed even in Ireland under the limited amount of State control of medicine such divulgence have already occurred," he said.

Dr. Ryan had asked Father O'Brien if he condemned the means test or not if he was simply "commissioning" to condemn a Flanagan scheme. Father O'Brien replied that this "final insinuation" was almost "the exact reproduction of the accusations against the priests in the mock trials that every leader in Iron Curtain countries has been using."

He said that in these countries "commissioning" was claimed to have been done by Americans or British but the Minister was not unlike that of the Minister to force all men into political conformity.

The same kind of opposition that killed ex-Minister Dr. Noel Browne's Mother and Child Scheme which ended in Dr. Browne's dismissal from the Costello Government and finally overthrew the Government itself is taking place.

### CO BOARD CHAIRMAN GIVES THE FACTS

"It is admitted that due to a variety of circumstances arrangements for the game were far from perfect and the Waterford Board will take the blame for this. It was not their fault, naturally, the Board will not accept responsibility for the mistakes and incompetency of other."

This was what Mr. C. Curran, Chairman of Waterford Co. Board G.A.A. told me during the week in an interview relating to the recent Kilkenny-Waterford N.H.L. game at Waterford, which had to be abandoned nine minutes before full time owing to encroachment.

Mr. Curran said "Press reports of the game have created the impression in the public mind that negligence on the part of the Waterford Co. Board was entirely responsible for the abandonment of the game. In an effort to clarify the position I would like to point out the following facts:

(1) That both teams were ready in the dressing rooms before the time appointed for the commencement of the game (3 a.m.).

(2) That Waterford or Kilkenny teams were not responsible for the fact that the game did not start until about 3.30 p.m.—as a matter of fact it was an official of the Waterford Board that made the first move to start the game.

(3) That a limited number of stewards were on duty on the field but from the start of the game a section of the crowd on one sideline persisted in behaving in an unruly and provocative manner and absolutely refused to obey the instructions of the officials.

(4) That the congestion at the entrance gates was largely due to the fact that a large proportion of the crowd arrived about the same time.

### "THE CRADLE SONG"

Another Successful Presentation By Dungarvan Dramatic Club

The Friary Hall, Dungarvan, was packed on Sunday Monday, and Tuesday nights last for the three performances of "The Cradle Song" by the Dungarvan Dramatic Club. A two-act comedy by Gregoria and Maria Martinez Sierra translated from the Spanish by J. Garrett Underhill, it dealt with a little drama covering a period of eighteen years in a Convent of Enclosed Dominican Nuns in Spain. A complete change from the previous twenty-three productions of the Club, it was a simple yet wholly exceptional piece that met with an instant affectionate response, and it was an ideal production for the purpose of raising money for the building funds of the two local Convents.

First produced at the Teatra Lara Madrid forty-one years ago, it has proved an ever-green production, as the story unfolds in one that can happen at any time. Main characters in the play were The Prioress Vicar and Mistress of Novices and the parts were ably and most realistically portrayed by Mary Foley, Betty O'Neil, and Kitty Cullinan, while the part of Sister Joanna of the Cross, whose maternal instincts were deeply touched by the little founding Teresa was delicately played with touching poignancy by the newcomer Angela Kirwan. James O'Keefe, as usual, brought a complete understanding to the part of the Community doctor, who after a lifetime of service was as much a part of the Convent as the nuns and novices themselves, while Thomas Meskill, who has appeared in previous productions by the Club, showed further promise in the part of Antonio. The part of Teresa, which more or less dominates Act 2 of the Play, was well played by Margaret Burke who scored such a distinct success in the name part of the Club's last production "Peg O' My Heart."

The parts of the other nuns were ably played by May Flaherty as Sister Inez, Stephanie Hennebery as Sister Marcelle, Sheelagh Flynn as Sister Turner, Aevie Hennebery as Sister Maria, Esther Minihan as Sister Sagrario, while Ellis Power, Margo Cum-

mins and Breda Keohane took the parts of other Lay Sisters and Nuns.

During the interlude between Acts I and II, Michael Cullinan, who was also co-producer of the play with M. H. O'Hara came on stage as a poet and related in most perfect fashion, in verse form the story of the play. The background music for this and other parts of the play was very effective.

The Decor by Padraig O'Murchada Stage Manager, was excellent and he was ably assisted in this most important contribution to the success of a production by assistant stage managers, Jessie Coward, Michael Coward and Liam Comerford. The lighting and effects by Maurice Kiely and Bernard Walsh were very satisfying. Make-up was by Miss B. Whittle and the Hall Superintendent was Joseph Riordan who ably saw to the comfort of the patrons.

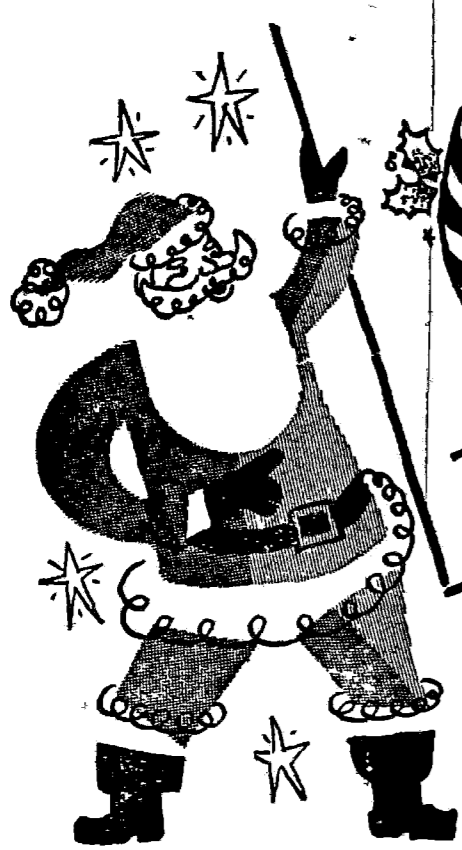
