of mine that I say that and now the point has been brought up by another man.

Chairman—He's not entitled to do so.

Mr Kelly—I hold he is.

Mr Woods—I'm sorry if I'm out of order Mr Chairman.

Mr Nicholas Kelly tried to insist that the matter was in order but the Chairman ruled it out and said that Mr Kelly could reply to the matter in another place and he asked the deputation to withdraw.

As the deputation was withdrawing from the meeting Mr Nicholas Kelly remarked that he would not reply to the matter anywhere but I will take him or Mr Kynne or anyone else on anytime under a neutral chairman. They have been trying all they can for a long time to get me down but I can tell them that they won't succeed.

The deputation then left.

Mr N Kelly said that he had not said anything at the previous meeting when the deputation was there but he said that his name had also been mentioned about the matter in the local Press and he claimed that the references were unfair to him.

Mr Lee—It is unfair for any member of a deputation to come in here and attack a member.

Mr Kynne—What is Mr Kelly's complaint does he say that the Press report was saying something he did not say?

Mr Kelly—No it was in a letter to the paper.

Mr McCarthy—We're not responsible for that.

Mr Kelly—Well it was most unfair for the deputation to print those remarks about me Chairman—Well I think that every member here has the interests of the people who can't afford to pay their rents at heart but those who can't afford to pay their rents can't expect us to make any reductions for them. My colleagues and I will vote to have the rents of those who cannot afford them reduced.

Mr Kynne said that on behalf of the Labour Party he welcomed this statement from the Chairman as all they had ever asked was that the rents of those who could not afford them be reduced.

The Clerk told Mr Kynne that he had been present when the Manager had met the deputation and he did say that the Council could decide the matter at the rates of the late Dr White if the money was provided.

Mr Kynne—If that is so and despite the Minister's letter would a notice of motion to provide money be required?

Mr Kynne said that the matter was one for the Manager. The discussion ended and the matter was adjourned to a later meeting.

Trespass At Shandon

The Engineer submitted estimates of £43 10s (bull wire) and £56 10s (chain link wire) for railings to stop the trespass at the plot at Shandon.

Mr Lee said that these estimates meant all he had when the Chairman said that there would be no money available until the rate was struck the matter was adjourned.

Estimates by the Engineer of £5 and £30 for clearing the rights-of-way at Shear's Street and Cathal Brugha Place were also referred.

Mr Walsh requested that a report be put on the condition of the railings at the back of the houses at Shear's Street.

Schemes To Be Included In Estimates

Consideration of the inclusion of a number of items in the rates estimates for the coming year led to a short and lively discussion. The Clerk said that there were also other small proposals for inclusion including the striking of something for the Red Cross towards their Water Safety Scheme.

The Chairman objected to the latter and said that the local Swimming Club were already handling this. Last year they had a collection made for them following an appeal by the *Dungarvan Leader* and had collected sufficient to bring an expert lady coach from Wales. A letter was read from the Sinn Fein Organisation asking the Council to endorse their protest against any proposals which might be made for the participation of any representatives from the Free State at the forthcoming Coronation of England's Queen Elizabeth.

Mr Casey said that on a point of order he would point out that we were now a Republic and it was wrong to refer to us as a Free State.

Mr Walsh said that the matter was one for the Government.

Mr Kelly proposed the adoption of the letter.

Mr Kynne said that while he agreed with Mr Walsh he would second Mr Kelly in case anyone would say afterwards that there was no seconding of such a proposal. He agreed he said with the protest in that there should be no mention in the lady's title of Queen of Ireland or Northern Ireland.

The motion was passed unanimously.

Other Items

A resolution from Carlow UDC requesting the Minister for Local Government to inquire into the situation of Councils which consideration of conditions etc of officers and employees of all public bodies may be referred to was on the proposal of Mr Kynne and seconded by Mr Walsh.

Mr Casey was appointed the Council's nominee to attend meetings of the Irish Public Bodies Insurance Ltd.

Mr Walsh referred to the margins left on the pathways at Murphy Place.

It was decided to ask the Engineer and Architect if it was intended to have grass grown on these.

The Clerk was directed to write to Macra Na Feirme about the tree replacement scheme at Murphy Place.

Mr Walsh again referred to unsightly ruins in Abbeyside and Dungarvan and the Clerk said that this was awaiting reports on them.

Votes of sympathy were passed with the Rev Mother and Community Presentation Convent the family of the late Dr White the family of the late Mrs Havens with the Moylan family and the relatives of the late Mrs P Walsh.

Inspection of Harbour

The Harbour Master (Mr Curran) reported that the collected for the month of February amounted to £129 12s 9d.

In reply to Mr Casey Mr Curran agreed that an Inspector had recently spent two days inspecting the harbour and quay.

The Clerk said that this inspection might be in connection with the harbour improvements scheme proposed about two years ago.

Mr Casey said that it appeared that every harbour in Ireland could get generous grants but Dungarvan could not get a grant.

Harbour Master—This might be the start as the Inspector made a very elaborate examination and took samples from the banks in the harbour.

To Mr Casey Mr Curran said that the Inspector was from the Board of Works.

Mr Casey—Did you know he was coming?

Mr Curran—No he just blew in.

Mr Casey—It's rather extraordinary that a Board of Works man would come here as all our previous dealings were with the Department of Industry and Commerce.

Mr Curran—He said he was although he was not the regular man.

Mr Casey—How do you know he was a Government man maybe he was coddling you?

Mr Curran—Oh maybe so. It was decided to await further developments and under the proposition of Mr Kynne seconded by Mr Casey, it was agreed to request the Minister to expedite the harbour scheme especially in view of the number of unemployed locally.

DAILY QUESTIONS

Deputies Ormond and Little on Wednesday February 11th asked the Minister whether he is aware that the Doyle Estate Kinsalebeg Co Waterford consisting of 135 acres has been offered for letting by the Land Commission and whether he is sure the price available for tillage and so on if he has satisfied himself that this amount is adequate having regard to the urgent need for increased tillage and further progress of a matter of Government policy a larger proportion of lands so let by the Land Commission will be made available for tillage.

The Minister stated Some time ago I arranged that the Land Commission would let in concrete tillage as much as possible of the lands in their possession which could not be allotted this Spring. On the estate in question over one third of the arable land was offered for tillage lettings at a recent auction. Owing to absence of demand only 9 acres were so let.

On the 5th Deputy Ormond asked the Minister for Industry and Commerce if he will state why in view of the fact that the price of sulphate of ammonia has been reduced within the last month, there has been no reduction yet in the price of special compound manures.

In his reply the Minister said The prices of special compound manures do not yet reflect the recent reduction in the price of sulphate of ammonia or the reason that all the ingredients for the production of the current season's full requirements and substantial quantities of the compounds already manufactured and distributed before that price reduction became effective.
