Horticultural Show—The Sixth Horticultural and Home Craft show was held in the Hall in September. The standards of the exhibits were very high but unfortunately these shows have been a financial failure despite a subsidy from the County Committee of Agriculture.

Children's Party—The annual Christmas Party for the school children of the District was held and was very successful.

Annual Collection—As a result of our annual collection a substantial sum was forwarded to the National Executive and our thanks is due to all who so generously subscribed.
