### RADIO EIREANN SPOTLIGHTS FISH COOKING

"Provincial News Round-up," which deals with items of interest from the Provinces and which is broadcast from Radio Eireann on Sunday evenings, spot-lighted Dungarvan on Sunday last and the present special demonstrations of fish cooking that are being conducted at the Technical School, Dungarvan, under the auspices of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee.

I was at the Technical School on the previous Thursday evening when John Ross in charge of this particular programme visited the school to record the proceedings. I just blew in looking for a bit of news, when Donnachadha O'Connell, the live-wire Chief Executive Officer of the Committee informed me that I was just in time to have a look behind the scenes.

I saw Bobby Keane who owns a big fish business in Dungarvan, there also when I asked about him I was informed of his very magnanimous gesture in presenting £10 worth of fish free which is being used on the course.

The idea behind the demonstrations is to teach people how to prepare cook and garnish fish dishes in a proper and varied way as a result of which it is hoped that more fish will be consumed by the public.

I learned all this in the CEO's office and then we were invited to move up to the Domestic Economy Classroom. There I saw the instructresses in charge of the course—Miss M. Malone and Miss E. Bessford and a prospective class which included Mrs. D. Cullinan, Miss G. Patterson, Miss O'Brien, Miss Christopher, Miss E. Power, Mrs. T. Maher, Miss G. Morrissey and Miss Moloney.

Mr. Pat Fleming, Inspector of the Vocational Branch Department of Education was also present and there also I spied Mary Langan who has been associated with the Dungarvan Technical School for more years than I can remember.

John Ross then got to work organising his programme. There had to be a rehearsal as to the questions and answers and the sequel to the interview and if you heard the programme on Sunday night you could hardly believe that so much concentrated work went into the three minutes which it occupied on the air.

I congratulated Donnachadha O'Connell whose idea this special course was, Mr. Bobby Keane whose gesture in presenting the fish free is most creditable and Radio Eireann and its wide and wonderful staff. John Ross for noting the importance of this course, which is one that could be copied all over Ireland with most beneficial results.

Incidentally I also congratulate Mr. Colum Moloney who is co-operating with the course by installing and supply free a "fridge" for the duration of the demonstration.

**THE PROVINCIAL PRESS**

It is a remarkable fact that since the daily and Sunday newspapers increased their circulations throughout our towns and countryside, the sales of our Provincial newspapers have also increased.

### Accidental Drowning At Quay

As reported in our later issues last week, the body of a man later identified as that of Thomas Horgan, a native of West Cork, was found in the sea at the Quay on Thursday evening May 21st at the Look-Out Dungarvan.

The following jury was sworn before Judge Coleman (foreman) Samuel Kennedy James Fitzgerald, Gerald Crotty Thomas Kirby and James Moore.

Sgt. J. Browne G.S. represented the authorities. Dr. M. K. Cusack, Dungarvan stated that on Thursday May 21st he was called to the Look-Out Dungarvan at about 2.30 p.m. where he saw the body of a man on the slipway. Mr. R. Keating was applying artificial respiration, but witness decided that the man was then dead, and that further efforts in this direction were unavailing. There were no external marks of violence apart from a few minor bruises on the forehead, which could have been caused by falling into the water or hitting something while floating. The man was in poor general condition. In his opinion the man died from asphyxia due to drowning.

**WARD GURGLING NOISE**  
James Kieley, Castle Street, Dungarvan, deposed: I was walking along the quay in the direction of the Dickens Evening Factory on Thursday evening before I reached the first slip I heard a noise in the water. It was like a moan and when I heard a gurgling noise I thought it was a seal first and then I saw a cap in the water. I heard continued on around the wall but I couldn't see where it came from and I came to the conclusion that there was something drowning. I rushed to the alarm. A short time afterwards I saw a body being taken from the water. At the time I saw no one in the vicinity of the quay and I noticed the tide was rising until the body was landed strongly at this point.

Guard K. Boyle, Dungarvan stated that at about 2.15 p.m. that evening he was at the Garda Station when the last witness testified that he thought there was someone drowning. He rushed out and took a life-belt with him and went to the Look-Out. He heard someone shouting to get a boat and went back to the slip way near the Barracks and with the help of John Duggan, Thomas Kieley and Patrick Hurley they got a boat out. As they rounded the corner to the Look-Out, they saw a body floating, head downwards, in the water. Thomas Kieley who was in front caught the body and raised it up above the water and they went for the slip where respiration was applied. The doctor and priest then came. When they got it, the body showed no signs of life. From the time the alarm was raised until the body was landed about five minutes had elapsed.

John Duggan, Bridget Street, Dungarvan, said that he was on the quay that day and saw the body being taken from the direction of the Garda Barracks. He appeared to be sober but was feeble, and was walking slowly. Ten minutes later witness said that he heard the alarm and went towards the slip where with the others, he helped to man a boat and they recovered the body of a man about 80 yards from the slip. The body was that of the man who had previously passed him on the quay.

Patrick Brennan, gate-keeper, County Home, Dungarvan, in his evidence said that about 12 p.m. on Thursday a man named Thomas Horgan, a native of West Cork was admitted as an inmate. Witness knew he went to Waterford for treatment of defective vision. The deceased he said, left the Home on pass at about 9.30 a.m. on Thursday morning.

**IDENTIFICATION**  
Daniel Horgan, Glountane, Bantry, gave evidence of identifying the body as that of his brother, Thomas. He had not seen him, he said, since he left home fourteen years ago, but knew that he worked as a farm labourer with farmers around County Waterford. He was about 55 years old and had never been in robust health, and his eye-sight had been poor.

**URINAL NEEDED**  
Mr. J. Coleman (foreman of the jury) asked if it was possible that deceased had gone down the steps of the slip-way through a public convenience, and then slipped into the water. It was stated that this was possible as the steps were very slippery.

**ACCIDENTAL DROWNING**  
The jury then returned a verdict that deceased died of asphyxia due to drowning, when he accidentally fell into the sea at the Quay. A public urinal was needed at this end of the Quay.

**SYMPATHY**  
The Coroner extended sympathy to deceased's brother on the sad tragedy which had been completely accidental.

Then the Dungarvan Gaelic League Band played a rousing selection of Irish airs which was the delight of all the spectators. On arriving at the Dungarvan Station the victorious team lined up behind the band and were paraded through the town to the G.A.A. ground. Bobby Keane on arrival congratulated both the team and their supporters and said that such a victory was a record for so small a town. He thanked most sincerely the Superior for their fine showing and spirit at the match. He ended by asking the crowd to give three cheers for the team and so ended another historic day in Dungarvan.

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### WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL

#### Contributing Areas Towards Youghal Bridge

#### Minister Urged To Include Waterford and Cork Cities

Mr. D. Leahy, Chairman, presided at a special meeting of the County Council on Tuesday evening, May 26th. Present: Messrs T. K. Roche, J. Ormond, T. D. Senator, J. Butler, M. Hart, N. Walsh, M. McGrath, J. Quirk, D. Heskin, T. Morrissey, J. Mansfield, J. Fahy, E. Power, L. L. O'Sullivan, W. Kennedy, T. D. Senator.

Messrs S. J. Moynihan, Co. Manager, D. Sheedy, Co. Surveyor, T. B. Boyle, Co. Accountant, Dr. O'Meara, Co. Secretary, Mr. G. Dowling, Co. Secretary were in attendance.

The vacancy caused by the recent death of the late Council member, Mr. O'Meara, was formally declared and the Council decided that it be filled at the annual meeting to be held on June 30th.

The Chairman read a copy of a letter from the Minister for Local Government to Cork County Council, stating that it had been decided to erect a fixed bridge on Ardslaugh site, near Waterford, in view of the Minister's very definite statement on the matter in the Dail and the findings of the Inquiry. He thought that the people of Waterford would be well advised to accept these findings as the sooner they do this the sooner will a bridge be built.

The Chairman said that the matter was one for the Cork County Council and not for Youghal Urban Council. The County Manager said that all he wished to say was that Cork City should be brought in as a contributing body to the cost of the bridge. Mr. Hart, agreeing, said that the bridge was used largely by the commercial people of Cork, but he thought that a dual purpose bridge would be better, to take the traffic, and to act as a breakwater and thereby considerably reduce flooding in the west of the county.

Senator Butler said that it was a matter for the Cork County Council and not for Youghal Urban Council. ### Dungarvan U.D.C.

#### Officials Reply To Charges Of Political Patronage

#### Deputy Kyne Makes Further Statement

#### Mr. Casey Questions Accounts

Mr. T. Lannen, Chairman, presided at a meeting of the Dungarvan U.D.C. on Tuesday last. Present: Messrs P. Casey, M. J. Keane, T. McCarthy, Senator J. Butler, T. Kyne, T. D. R. Walsh and T. Lee, were present.

Ormond Chief Assistant Engineer and Mr. O'Meara, Acting Town Clerk were in attendance. Replies To Political Patronage Charges. Speaking at the outset Deputy Kyne said that he was well pleased to see a report in a certain newspaper of a number of complaints which I made at the last meeting. I feel it necessary to clear up a few points which would appear from the report that the three complaints were linked together whereas each was a separate and distinct one and not related to the other.

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repairs and I required no further individual authority for any repairs carried out by me. All that was required of me was that I should keep within the approved estimate. Whether applications for repairs came through the Town Clerk, the members of the Council or direct to myself I was empowered to deal with them according to their merits. As a matter of fact at the same meeting at which this discussion took place several applications for repairs, including a new front door were brought up and what did the Council do? They were all referred to the Engineer without comment.

Repairs To House of James Fraher—The application was that this tenant was favoured in having certain repairs carried out to his house. No mention was made to the fact that four years ago in that row received similar repairs. As for being favoured the reverse was the case as it is over eighteen months since this tenant made application for repairs. I was empowered to defer his application from time to time until eventually the housing money became exhausted and repairs had to be deferred. I should be selected for repairs in the current year. If my tenant had any grievance this man had.

3. Railings at Shear's Street—The grievance in this case seems to be the delay in erecting these railings but why I should be selected for repairs is very strange considering my efforts to have this approved of which Deputy Kyne was well aware. In fact if enquiries had been made I could have given him the information that instructions had been given for the start of this job four days before the meeting at which he was present. The materials had been ordered and that erection would start the following Monday or Tuesday. I could also have told him that as no money was provided at the estimates meeting, I could not start in view of the Council's previous orders about expenditure.

As for the charges about political patronage I do not think there is any need for me to deny these. As a member of the Council I am not one member of the Council. I believe that I have been nearly thirty years associated with the County Council and over ten years with the U.D.C. and I challenge anyone to cite any single incident when I used political influence in my dealings with either body.

An order by the Manager on the report of the U.D.C. and that U.D.C. was informed that Co. Manager regards these charges of patronage (political or otherwise) in either the letting or repair of houses as completely unfounded and unjustified.

Mr. Kyne—in connection with the repairs question I checked over the Manager's Orders but they did not go back 18 months. Was there an order made in that case?

Mr. Ormond—No there was no need and Mr. Kyne seems to be under a bit of a misapprehension about this. These repairs were completely unfounded and unjustified.

Mr. Ormond—There were five applications some to the Town Clerk and some to me. I have put these up for a long time and I had promised the repairs would be done as soon as the money was made available.

Mr. Kyne—The position is so that in fact people don't have to apply here at all. I always was under the impression that every application for repairs had first to come to the Council, which would refer it to the Borough Surveyor and I'm sure every member here had the same idea. It is the Engineer's duty and I have no reason to doubt his word that it is up to him to make a complete estimate and explain why some houses are repaired without reference to the Council while others who appear to the Council can be turned down.

Mr. Ormond said that in the case of small repairs no order was needed.

Mr. Kyne said that this was a considerable repair involving £10 or £12.

Mr. Ormond—Yes but the doors needed replacement and the old doors can be inspected by anyone in the Council yard.

Mr. Casey—I had an interest in these repairs as I was to the Swimming Pool account. Mr. Ormond—Nothing was charged against the Pool because what was legally chargeable. The Chairman said that he knew that there were a lot of repairs done without coming before the Council, but while he personally disapproved of the system he believed that the Engineer had always been honest and fair. Some people, he said, could get repairs done while others could not. The sum of £12 spent on the house in question was a lot of money and he disagreed with it.

DUNGARVAN BATTALION. Platoon Competition. As in former years the Annual Platoon Competition will take place in Youghal Camp during the last week in July. The Dungarvan Platoon which participated splendidly at the moment, should be in a position to provide the backbone of the Platoon this year. The Staff have no doubt that the Platoon will do very well this year but special attention will have to be given to the Range Practices. This is the stumbling block which the Unit encounters each year and there is no apparent reason why the Range Practices should shoot as well as those of other Units. Alleged Breach Of Warranty In Sale Of Cow

Decree For £20 Awarded

Dungarvan District Court was held before Mr E O'Riain, D.J. on Wednesday last.

A summons against Mrs. Murphy, for breach of warranty in respect of using an untagged calf was dismissed when it was pointed out that on the date of the offence it was defendant's husband who was driving the calf.

James Butler 16 Caseyville and Richard Moylan 26 Cathal Brugha Place, Clonsilla, (P.O.A.) who were summoned by Guard Giffin for allowing a jenny and horse to wander on the public street.

Mr William Solr defended Laurence Walsh Barnakill Kilbride claimed £20 loss and damage resulting from an alleged breach of warranty in the sale of an in-calf cow on Jan 1952 from John Lennon, Leamybrien.

Mr Farrell, Solr was for plaintiff and Mr Hutchinson, Solr defended Laurence Walsh an evidence said that he attended the auction of cows held by defendant in January 1952. The auctioneer, who was the auctioneer and before he put up the cow which witness purchased he said she was in calf to a hereford bull witness said that he distinctly heard the auctioneer say that the cow was in calf to a hereford bull.

On that understanding he bought the cow for £32 10s. The cow failed to calve in March but did so on June 1952. The calf was a hereford heifer calf she had and not a hereford calf. He estimated that because the cow did not calve 1st March he lost 364 gallons of milk (average four gallons a day) which at 1/4 per gallon amounted to £24 5s 0d.

The day the cow calved he went to Lennon's, he said and met the defendant and his wife and they agreed that the cow would be returned to Lennon's and he would pay Lennon's the cost of the calf. The defendant said that she was surprised the calf was not a hereford and produced a receipt from Mitchelstown Creamery that the cow had been artificially inseminated. She also said that the defendant who had made the mistake in saying that the cow would calve in March and that he should have said April. They then offered to take back the cow and the defendant would make no allowance towards the cost of feeding.

Nicholas Qualey Auctioneer Dungarvan, said that he recalled the auction but he could not say whether the cow was returned to Lennon's or not. Concerning the calving of the cow he kept no records but his usual practice at such auctions was to get the information from the vendor.
