THE LONG ARM OF GO-INCIDENCE AGAIN

Mr Sean Norris, son of Mr and Mrs James Norris Abbey-side, was due home for a holiday from America this month, but duty called and he had to cancel his trip until next year. Sean was a Radio Officer attached to Aer Lingus and flew with the Company's planes for many years until he resigned and went to America. After a shot at photography he returned to the radio again and was appointed Radio Officer by a big Company, sailing heavy freighters and tankers from New York. Since taking over many Dungarvan men, also sailing on the high seas, and as their ships passed each other unobserved, he had radio conversations with Captain D. Foley Abbeyside and also Mr J. Whelan Abbeyside when the latter was attached to one of the Irish Shipping Company's ships.

The reason that Sean had to cancel his May trip home was that his Company were bringing a new ship to America which had been constructed in Japan. She is the "Petroqueen", one of the biggest tankers in the world and her crew was flown out to the East from New York. Sean was the Radio Officer assigned to the ship. His first stop on the air trip out was at San Francisco and Sean remembering that he had some relations in that city contacted them. There was one a first cousin whose address he was not sure of and during his travels around the big city he called into a restaurant for a cup of coffee. The waiter in America like we take tea here) the attendant was of a curious nature and asked Sean what nationality he was. Sean replied Sean and the attendant said he was a Swede. Fatal Accident Near Clonmel

At Clonmel before District Justice O. Riain John Lenane of Ballinacorney, Clonmel, County Waterford was summoned for the dangerous driving of a motor-car, and also for driving a motor-car without efficient brakes.

The charges arose in connection with a road accident which occurred near the Ball Alley Cross near Clonmel on the Clonmel-Dungarvan Road last December and as a result of which a 68-year-old pedestrian received fatal injuries.

Francis Ryan Fishery Inspector who was motoring towards Clonmel on the evening in question said he noticed lights of an oncoming car at a distance on the Clonmel side of the Cross.

Describing the accident witness said it was dark and the roads were very wet, but visibility was fairly good. When he saw the other car he dimmed his lights and concentrated on his own side of the road.

The following resolution proposed by Deputy Kyne and seconded by Deputy Ormond was passed: That we ask the County Manager to formulate a late Cottage Purchase Scheme for all cottages built since the 1937 Purchase Scheme based on an annuity of 50% of the existing rent at the time of making such scheme.

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Housing Grants

Report circulated on the present position of the Regional Grants and Supplementary Grants for the installation of private water supplies and sewerage facilities and (2) Supplementary housing grants for new houses and in the case of (1) the Council agreed to the raising of a loan of £5000 and (2) a loan of £10000.

Water Charges

When consideration came up as to whether revised scales of water charges are to be levied (a) on the basis of uniform rates for the whole county health district or (b) on the basis of separate scales related to the costs of individual schemes Senator Butler pointed out that if the costs of the schemes were spread, they were spread it would mean a 1% in the £ on the rates which could not be justified.

Ring And Helvick Water Scheme

When a letter from the Department of Local Government was read concerning the above Mr Harty said that what he had in mind was the securing of a Gaeltacht Grant and on his suggestion it was agreed to refer the matter to Mr J. Lynch, Parliamentary Secretary who is in charge of such grants.

Other Items

A revised list of schemes under the Local Authorities (Works) Act totalling £15151 was approved. The Council agreed to dispose of a plot of ground measuring 4 feet 20 feet to Messrs O'Brien Brothers, Tallow and it was agreed to put the matter on the agenda for next meeting as required by Local Government regulations.

Munster Championship Games At Waterford

WATERFORD DEFEAT TIPPERARY IN SENIOR FOOTBALL

S F—Waterford, 2-4 Tipperary, 0-4 M F—Cork, 3-10, Waterford, 0-5

Moderate football was witnessed by supporters at Waterford Gaelic Field on Sunday last when the home county's seniors lived up to expectations by disposing of a much-fancied Tipperary side in the opening game of the Munster Senior Championship. Preceding the senior match, Waterford's minors failed to hold a useful Cork team after a hard and robust hours football.

While the Deeles followers may extract considerable satisfaction from the seniors' victory, they cannot close their eyes to the fact that the standard of play was generally poor if not very bad at times even allowing for the failings of the ground itself and the breeze and showers which left the ball and the surface of the pitch slippery. It is doubtful if Waterford will constitute a danger to Cork's crown when they meet on July 5th in the semi-final at a venue to be decided.

Neither Tipperary nor Waterford had a real scoring ability and conversely, the Waterford men scored more frequently when playing against the breeze than when favoured by it.

The first score of the hour came during the low time of the opening half when Waterford notched a goal followed by a quick point to lead by that score at the interval without a reply from Tipperary.

Views Of Our Readers

Points About The Control And Creation Of Money

(To The Editor)

S.A.I.D. Professor Soddy (Nobel Laureate) It was recognised in Athens and Sparta two centuries before Christ that one of the most vital prerogatives of the State was the right to issue money.

To allow the monetary system to become a source of profit to private citizens was a secret and unspoken aim of the Government and last a rival power enough to overthrow all other forms of Government.

Every Bank Loan Creates A Deposit

From Reginald McKenna Chancellor of the Exchequer and Chairman of the Midland Bank I am afraid that the ordinary citizen will not like to be told that the banks or the Bank of England can create or destroy money.

Every bank loan and every purchase of securities creates a deposit and every repayment of a bank loan and every sale of securities destroys one.

A bank loan creates a deposit and thus it creates money.

The report of the MacMillan Commission (1931) which included the ablest British financiers stated—'The bulk of the deposits arises out of the action of the banks themselves by granting loans; allowing the depositors to purchase or draft or purchasing securities a bank creates a credit in its books which is equivalent to a deposit.'

Challenged on this issue at the MacMillan Commission by Lord Keynes, Montague Norman, then Governor of the Bank of England was forced to admit in millions deposits or credits of ten thousand pounds each could be created. WHAT MONTAGUE NORMAN ADMITTED

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SMALLNESS OF PAID UP CAPITAL

Mr Hartley Withers in The Meaning of Money writes—The first feature that strikes the casual observer is the smallness of the paid-up capital of the banks when compared with the vastness of the figures that they handle.

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
