### THE BARONIES OF DECIES

Every Decies man should know the history of his native county but how many readers of this column could give me the answer if I but asked them how many baronies the region is divided into?

Truth to tell I was not very sure myself but once again Canon Powers' great reference book came to the rescue when I wanted to get the exact answer I refer of course to "Place Names of Decies" which appears in the introduction at page 14 of the whole scheduled region is divided into eight complete baronies, with one almost complete and small portions of three others, viz—Clangibbin (portion of) in Co. Cork, Cosmore and Coshbride in Co. Waterford

Gaulther and Glenahry also in the county. The Off East (greater portion of, including town of Clonmel) in Co. Tipperary and Offa West (Silvareagh (portion of) and Middlethird in Co. Tipperary and Middlethird and Upperrthird in Co. Waterford. The names of the ancient tribes or families of Decies are then given as O'Phelan and O'Bric who shared between them the Lorphism O'Brien O'Flanagan O'Foley O'Keane O'Meara O'Donnchadha and O'Neill

In a particular reference to the Barony of Condons and Clangibbin the writer states that the boundary of Decies (Mumhan must have been but loosely defined on the West where there was no river nor mountain range to be a natural line of demarcation. There is ample evidence that Decies once stretched further westward than the present county boundary. The taxation of 1302 for instance places the church of Kilmacshane (Kilworth) in the Diocese of Lismore. On the other hand the adjoining territory of Uí Liathain (Lyons) appears to have pushed itself, at one period as far east as the Blackwater. It is remarkable that the Diocesan and County boundaries here do not coincide.
