Five West Waterford Girls Professed Nuns.

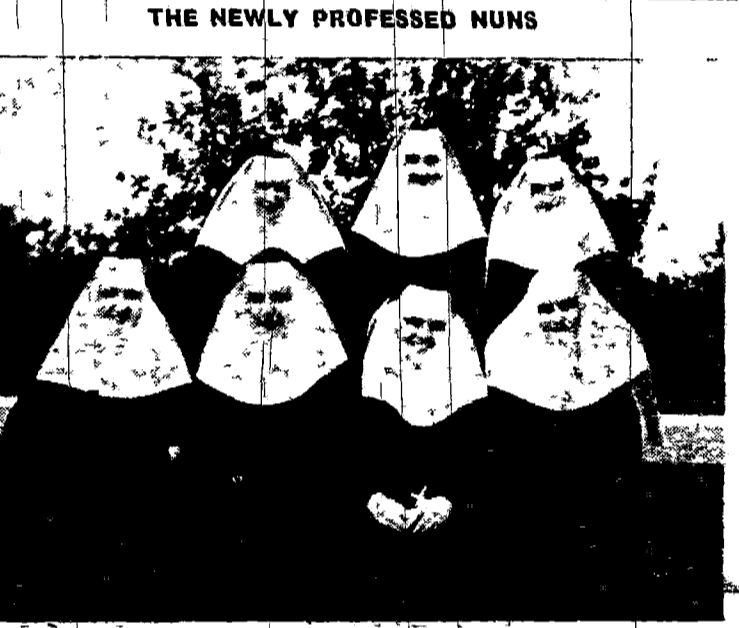

Tallow and Round About

Scalds are treated in the same way as burns. If the dressing should take the form of a mask with holes cut for the eyes nose and mouth. If the skin is broken dress with sterile lint soaked in warm water or a warm solution of bicarbonate of soda. Do not prick blisters and obtain a doctor in all serious cases.

Stings—If the insects sting is let it bleed. If extracted use Dab or dilute ammonia or peroxide of hydrogen, if neither of these is to hand try a piece of household blue bag.

Hay Fever—Large numbers of people suffer from this complaint. Chronic sufferers can be cured by inoculation but the treatment is a long one. Keep away from hay and long grass, and do not smell flowers.

First Aid in Camp—In last week's issue we dealt with first aid in camp and in this issue we will deal further with this important matter.

Chilblains—Caused by bad circulation or continued exposure to cold or damp. If unobtainable relief can be obtained by rubbing with a hand or dry friction with a fish glove. This improves the circulation.

Drowning—A method of resuscitation when breathing has apparently ceased. To promote breathing observe the following instructions. After the person has been lifted out of the water and breathing ceased, immediately turn him face up.
