**COMPLAINT BY BELFAST GOVERNMENT**

A letter addressed to the Editor from Deasun O'Gahan Rua, an An Chomhdhál Agóide Beal Feirste has been passed on to me to deal with it.

Enclosed with the letter was a circular copy of which I am informed has been forwarded to every Council and Corporation in Ireland and in which grave concern is voiced by this Committee about the conundrum and decline of our Gaeltacht areas.

This concern is based on the census returns of 1945 which show a falling off in the population of our Gaeltacht areas. The letter adds that a nearby view of Government which has been in power in this country has charged itself amongst its other duties with the welfare of these areas as it is today must be laid at the Government's door.

A general meeting of about 20 various Irish organisations in Belfast held on May 26th unanimously passed the following resolutions:

**Urabb eigeandál na Gaeltachta.**

**Gaeltachtaí na hÉireann** a gceist a bheith fíor-ghairmí in éigean tuisceanaí an nEasúin.

There is no doubt but the population of our Gaeltacht areas is declining rapidly and one of the main reasons is the lack of adequate reasonably remunerative employment, which will help to keep the young men and women from emigrating and flying to the towns and cities.

If these bulwarks of the Irish language go then all hope of reviving the language will go with them, as at present these are the sources from which most of the young students of the country who learn book Irish for six months of the year in schools, convents and colleges get true inspiration and see that Irish is a live racey language and not something to be endured until the examinations are over.

**RESTRICTIVE TRADE PRACTICES**

The introduction of legislation recently regarding restrictive trade practices created a lot of interest and now that the Restrictive Trade Practices Act has been enacted by the Government, it is interesting to read the Restrictive Trade Practices 1953 Act Explained by Mr M J O'Connor F.R.S., F.C.I.M.A. will be found very useful and of much benefit to manufacturers, wholesalers, retailers and the public generally. It deals with and explains clearly the Object of the Act, unfair trade practices, the Fair Trade Commission and its functions, fair trading rules, and the sale of price maintenance, functions of the Minister for Industry & Commerce, jurisdiction of the Courts, etc.

## SAD ENDING TO HOLIDAY OUTING

EXCURSIONIST DIES FOLLOWING ACCIDENTAL ELECTRIC SHOCK

**PROLONGED INQUEST PROCEEDINGS**

A happy band of men and women left Ballinacorney, Co. Cork (half-way between Cork City and Bandon) on last Sunday morning for their annual outing to the mountains. The day had ended tragedy struck the excursionists when one of their numbers died as a result of an electric shock accidentally received when he came in contact with an electrified clothesline in the yard of the licensed premises of Mrs H. Cooney, 10 Grattan Square, Dungarvan.

The sad tragedy had been preceded by an ironic set of circumstances as the deceased, John Roche (40) single labourer, was late in turning up for the bus which turned back to pick him up. Then the day turned wet and the party left the bus earlier than they had expected and stopped for some refreshments in Dungarvan on the way home when the sad tragedy occurred.

When the news became known a great gloom set down not only among the unfortunate man's party but over the whole town where everyone was deeply shocked at such a tragedy.

In view of the inquest which lasted almost four hours on Monday the remains of the deceased which had lain in the local morgue overnight were conveyed home for burial.

**Sympathy**

At Monday's special meetings of Waterford County Council and Dungarvan Urban Council, deep and sincere sympathy was extended to the deceased's bereaved relatives. The members of both Councils expressed their deep sorrow of the very sad ending of such a happy holiday trip.

**INQUEST PROCEEDINGS**

A verdict that death was due to acute cardiac failure following an electric shock accidentally received from a live clothesline in the yard of the premises of Mrs. H. Cooney, 10 Grattan Square, Dungarvan was returned at an inquest in Dungarvan on Monday July 6th into the death of Mr. John Roche, 40, of the relative of the deceased, who was killed while on a holiday excursion.

The inquest which was held by Mr. A. R. Farrell, Solr. Dungarvan Acting Coroner for West Waterford, lasted over four hours.

The rider was added exonerating Mrs. Cooney from any moral responsibility in connection with the accident.

Mr. E. O'Driscoll, Solr. Bandon represented the next-of-kin, Mr. J. J. Kenney, Solr. Dungarvan, represented Mrs. Cooney. Mr. L. F. Lanigan, Solr. Dungarvan represented the ESB and Supt. O'Flanagan represented the Authorities.

The Jury sworn in by the Coroner were as follows—Messrs D. Walsh (foreman), T. O'Connell, D. Doherty, E. Curran, T. Kirby, A. Lavin, J. Fulton, T. Casey.

**Medical Evidence**

Dr. C. P. O'Connell, M.O. Dungarvan stated that he was called to the premises of Mrs. Cooney at approximately 7:30 p.m. on Sunday, July 6th where he found deceased lying in the yard with a man carrying out artificial respiration. Witness was told that the deceased caught the clothesline and was thrown to the ground. He examined the body and gave it an hour's rest. The clothesline was lying on the ground but was suspended from a wall.

He carried out a postmortem later and found that death was due to acute cardiac failure, which could have been brought on or accelerated by electric shock.

**Probationer's Evidence**

Mrs. Cooney in evidence stated that she has a licensed premises at 10 Grattan Square, which she has managed since the death of her husband in 1940.

Witness said that there was a light at the end of her yard which is 25 feet long and which was controlled by a switch in the back door. The light came on when she turned the handle of her customers going to and from the yard but she discontinued it a while ago because the bulb was continuously being stolen. A backroom light was made use of in its stead. When the last bulb was pulled out and the socket removed there was about four feet of the flex protruding from the wall.

In reply to the Coroner witness stated that she has a clothesline in her yard which consists of about 26 feet of wire and is about 7 feet high. One end of which is attached to the centre and the other end to a back wall to which flex was fastened. She had been hanging clothes on it every morning and never got a shock. The last time she used it was on Sunday morning, the morning of the accident. On Thursday last witness said that she had the place whitewashed by a local man. Following his departure, she did not notice anything unusual. She recalled the arrival of the deceased in the afternoon at approximately 6:45 p.m. and noticed that several of them called on her for a drink. After some time had elapsed a man rushed in from the street and yard and said "get a priest and a doctor, a man has been electrocuted at the clothesline". She told him not to be crazy adding "how could a clothesline electrocute a man? She did not believe him and did not go out in the yard, but she eventually called a priest and a doctor.

In reply to the Coroner witness said she believed someone had touched the wire some less years ago, she could not say if the switch was on or off or in an on position. When Dr. O'Connell arrived it was from him that she found out that the man who had been electrocuted was putting his hand on it at that particular time. He stated that he knew Roche back in Ballinacorney and thought that he was in good physical condition. He gave a reply to Mr. O'Driscoll, witness said that when he caught the wire he was glued to it.

John J. Butler, Ballinacorney corroborated P. Lombard's statement and added that after Lombard's legs from under him he saw the deceased catching the line with his left hand and was in the act of putting his other hand on it when he saw the man go. Deceased tried to say something but apparently he could not speak. Witness said he then ran over to him and kicked his legs from under him but in so doing he gave evidence that he saw the man knock himself against the wall.

Frank Roche, Ballinacorney stated that he was brother of the deceased, and both of them with their mother and witness lived together. He said he last saw deceased at 8:30 a.m. on Sunday when he left Ballinacorney on the excursion to Clonca, and did not see him again until he gave evidence of his identification on Monday. He thought deceased was in good health, but a short time ago he received treatment for an eye complaint. He was a builder's labourer and worked hard and he did not miss many days from work through illness. Witness stated that deceased was unmarried and was the sole support of their 73 years old mother.

Patrick Morrissey, 1, Catholic Brugha Place, Dungarvan stated that on Thursday, July 2nd he whitewashed the yard of Mrs. Cooney's premises and while doing so he noticed two protruding wires or flexes on the wall of the shed under the eave. They were in his way so he just caught them and threw them up on the corrugated roof. He was on a step ladder at that time. He took the two wires and disconnected them and he got a shock when he caught them but he had on no occasion touched the clothesline. He left the yard at approximately 10 o'clock and left the wires on the roof. He was also in the yard on Friday and tarred the end of the wall underneath the wires but did not touch the wires.

In reply to the Coroner he said he caught the wires about halfway from the shed and when he went to Mrs. Cooney to be paid he did not mention the wires to her. He also said he saw no sparks from the wires.

**ESB Engineer's Evidence**

Mr. C. Coleman, E.S.B. Engineer, Dungarvan, said that he was called to Mrs. Cooney's premises at 8 p.m. and was told that a man had been electrocuted. He noticed the clothesline was extended from the shed to the wall. He found that it was fastened to the wall by a staple into the corrugated weathering of the shed and through the wall on the other side. The weathering was made of zinc. The line was sagging about four feet high there. He touched the wire and got a shock. He then investigated the wires on the roof and found one which was making contact with the galvanised roof and these were the two wires which originally supplied the yard with light. They were thrown loosely up on the shed. He carried out a test on Monday to determine the voltage of the clothesline and found it was 180 volts. In testing he made firm contact with the wires and the shed. He was of the opinion that the earth was firmer in the test than at the time of the accident with the result the voltage might have been slightly less that evening. He then examined the switch and found it in the on position. The switch was in fact defectively wired as it was connected to the negative wire, which was the wrong one with the result that when the switch was in the 'off' position the wire would still be alive.

The wires should be completely cut out from the wall to render it safe. He also stated that the conditions were much more dangerous on Sunday evening as the weather was damp then. In reply to Mr. Lanigan witness said that the installation job was that of a handy man and it would not be approved by the E.S.B. He said as far as he knew there was no application to approve of the job.

Mr. E. Enright, Waterford District Engineer, also agreed with the evidence of Mr. Coleman.

Sergeant Browne, Garda Síochána agreed with Mr. Coleman's evidence and added he examined the clothes of the deceased for burn marks but found none. The yard surface was slightly damp and it had an earthen surface.

In reply to Mr. O'Driscoll he stated that there were barrels on one side of the yard and an unused range on the other leaving a clear space of six feet in the centre. The men were all in a sober condition. He was told about the burn on Lombard's hand and that it was received from the wire. He tied the wire in a bundle until Mr. Coleman arrived.

The Coroner then addressed the Jury who having briefly conferred with each other brought in the verdict stated at the outset.

Mr. Kenny on behalf of Mrs. Cooney expressed his deep sympathy to the relatives. Mr. Roche on such a lamentable happening on such a day when everybody was enjoying themselves.

The Coroner Mr. Lanigan and Supt. O'Flanagan and Mr. D. Walsh on behalf of the Jury also joined in the vote of sympathy, to which Mr. O'Driscoll on behalf of the next-of-kin replied.

## Waterford County Council

### Hold Special Meeting

HOUSING AND WATER PROBLEMS DISCUSSED

Mr M Morrissey Chairman of the Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan on Monday last. Present were Messrs. K. McManis, J. W. Fitzgerald, P. Roche, D. Leahy, J. Mansfield, J. Fahy, Senator J. Butler, N. Walsh, J. Quirk, T. Morrissey, M. McGrath, M. Hartly, W. Kenneally, T. D. J. Kirwan, E. Power, P. Butler, J. McKinn, S. Ormond, T. B. and N. Kelly.

Messrs. S. J. Moylan, Co. Manager, Dr. M. O'Farrell, Co. Medical Officer and J. G. Dowling, Secretary were in attendance.

**Affane-Tourin Water Extensions**

Mr Norman Walsh introducing a deputation from Affane and Tourin in connection with the proposed water extensions thanked the Chairman for the privilege of allowing them before the meeting at the outset. He said that he had spoken on the problems of the people in the area with regard to water extension but now the deputation would tell the Council of the difficulties they had themselves.

Mr Walsh then introduced the deputation as follows—Affane Area—Messrs F. Morrissey, G. Healy, R. Fitzgerald, J. Maher, Tourin Area—Messrs P. Meany, N. Sweeney, J. Griffin, M. Walsh and Qualey.

Mr F. Morrissey spokesman for the Affane area said that they had been before the Council previously but came again now to show that they had a genuine interest in the matter. He said that as things were the people in his area had to travel miles to get water.

Mr Meany on behalf of the people of Tourin said that parts of that area were like the Sahara Desert. There were many cottages in the district which had no supply of water and he appealed to the Council not to let them down in this matter as water was a first essential.

Mr Quirk said that the Council had to consider these extensions but the trouble was in the Department and all the Council could do was to pass a resolution asking the Department to allow the extension to be laid across the road. Deputies to go to see the Minister. He understood that the extensions were being held up by some official.

Mr Walsh said that no one knew what the objection to the laying of the extensions was. The Secretary read the letter from the Department on the matter which stated that the Minister was still of the opinion that the main scheme should first be proceeded with and tested before the extensions were done.

Deputy Ormond said that Mr Quirk's suggestion was good one. The Council were unanimous about the matter and if a deputation went to see the Minister he felt there would be no objection to the extensions.

The Secretary then read a letter from Mr C. McNamara Consulting Engineer for the scheme which stated that basing prices on the tender accepted for the main scheme the extension could be done for £25,800 as against his estimate of £35,000 and he advised putting the work of the extensions in hands as in his opinion it would be possible to get such an economic figure again.

Mr Walsh—£10,000 less is a big consideration.

Mr Quirk—I heard the supply in Affane is terrible and the school children are drinking it.

Mr Meany said that he had the same thing applied to Tourin. Finally a resolution was proposed by Mr Walsh and seconded by Mr McGrath urging the Department to sanction the carrying out of the extensions in conjunction with the main scheme and the following were selected to go as a deputation to put the Council's views before the Minister on the matter—Messrs Ormond, Kyne, Kenneally and Luce (County Deputies) Senator Butler, Mr N. Walsh and Mr D. Hesklin and Mr McNamara.

Mr McNamara thanked the Council for the courtesy and help in the matter and said it would be a good thing to get the extensions done as the water absolutely must be present.

The Coroner then addressed the Jury who having briefly conferred with each other brought in the verdict stated at the outset.
