MEMORIES

The news of the lamented death of Mr. Mickey Ducey, Dungarvan last week set me on the trek to find out details of his life and a happy thought sent me to Eddie and Dan Phelan Mam Street where I learned a great deal about him and that very talented group of Operatic Society and the general public who banded together in the Old Boro in 1916 to form the Dungarvan Dramatic & Operatic Society, and which in that and subsequent years gave memorable performances of the "Colleen Bawn" and other famous musical productions.

I am indebted to Eddie Phelan for his courtesy in letting me have a loan of his ever-growing scrap book in which is recorded the many triumphs of this very talented Society and which I read with interest for hours. As the "Colleen Bawn" was perhaps the Society's first performance and the first production from the scrap book a report as taken from a contemporary of the time—

"THE COLLEEN BAWN
SPLENDID PRODUCTION BY THE DUNGARVAN DRAMATIC AND OPERATIC SOCIETY"

To hold as were the mirror up to nature, the charming performance given in the Town Hall on Monday evening last when the members of the local Dramatic and Operatic Society presented to the ever-green house Boucault's ever-green and popular drama "The Colleen Bawn" with the principal vocal numbers from "The Lily of Killarney". Many a time have we witnessed the production of "The Colleen Bawn", both by professionals and amateurs and so great is its charm and so racy of the soil are its characters, that it never grows old but always presents its charm for the Irish heart. In the hands of the local amateurs it lost nothing. Whether in the interpretation of the parts or in the acting of the characters, the originals were faithfully followed and with the utmost success. Everybody was delighted and more in the words of the great Latin Tristram were "satisfied but not satisfied". The crowd came and saw and were overcome by the intrinsic merit of the whole cast individually and collectively.

A sensation was caused in the town on Monday morning when the news came that the Provost Marshal at Queenstown had prohibited the production. Everything was then ready to start and but for the action of Father Cowman, all would be lost. The Rev. President realising the difficulty of the situation immediately went to Waterford and had an interview with County Inspector Hietred. The result was that a wire was sent to the Provost Marshal Father Cowman undertaking to be responsible for the conduct of the people, and a few hours later District Inspector Collins, Dungarvan, received a message from Mr. Headquarters of the Southern Command permitting the production of the piece on Father Cowman's undertaking. All were delighted as the consequence and the success of the production more than justified all the efforts made.

Great services were rendered by Messrs J. Moloney, M. Flynn, J. Moran and Frank Stuart in looking after the general comfort of the audience and superintending the arrangements in the Hall. Owing to the fact that the Town Hall on Monday and Tuesday nights was unable to hold all who wished to be present the management very wisely decided to continue the performance on Wednesday night and just as on the previous evenings a large and appreciative audience filled the house long before the curtain went up. The proceeds are to be devoted to necessary improvements to the organ in the Augustinian Church which is a most laudable object.

The Dungarvan Dramatic and Operatic Society is only a few months in existence. With such a brilliant and clever president as Rev. J. Cowman, O.S.A. we can predict for it a life of usefulness, education and enjoyment for all. After a brief training we have seen the first fruits before the footlights during the week when its members covered themselves with glory by their ability in vocal and dramatic art, and by the ease and dignity with which they accommodated themselves to their new circumstances. With the progress of time, only a few members work together, this Society should be the equal of any similar institution elsewhere, and should be equal to the production of any of the every-day operas and comedies which are successful. The Society has artistic talent of a high degree both in the ladies of Dungarvan and gentlemen. The cast could not be improved upon,

In looks and words she was to the point, and as a lively member of the upper ten, who did not want to be brushed aside in love by a peasant girl, she was true to reality. Miss K. YOUGHAL BRIDGE PROBLEM

Waterford County Council Agree To The Appointment Of Another Expert

Youghal U.D.C. Blamed For Delays

Mr M. Morrissey, Chairman of the Waterford County Council, presided at a special meeting of the Council on Tuesday last. Messrs W. Fitzgerald, J. Fahy, J. Ormond, T. D. Leahy, J. Mansfield, M. Hardy, M. McGrath, E. Heskin, Senator Butler, R. Barron, E. Power, L. Morrissey and N. Kelly were present.

Messrs S. J. Moynihan, Co. Manager, Ormond, Chief Engineer, and C. Dowling, Secretary, were in attendance.

Independent Engineer To Be Appointed

The Secretary said that he had a telephone communication from the Acting Secretary of the Cork County Council that morning stating that his Council had adopted the recommendation of the Joint Bridge Committee drawn from representatives of both Councils. A meeting held at Youghal on July 10th with an addendum added. The recommendation of the Bridge Committee was as follows:

Proposed by Mr. Con Meany M.C.C. (seconded by Mr. Denis Heskin M.C.C.) and resolved—

"That a Bridge Expert Consulting Engineer be employed to report in detail on the feasibility of reconstructing the existing bridge over the river Blackwater at Youghal, capable of carrying full modern traffic and that full details of costs be submitted with report."

Mr. Dowling said that Cork County Council had added the following to the recommendation—that the terms of reference of the Bridge Expert should include a report as to whether the existing bridge could be reconstructed at a cost not exceeding £250,000 inclusive of all fees and expenses and whether the bridge could be kept open for traffic except for short periods during its reconstruction.

Senator Butler stated that the agreement was wise and he proposed that the Council now adopt the full resolution.

Mr. Heskin seconding said that as it was the only course open to them an independent opinion was needed. As public opinion was in favour of the reconstruction or building of a bridge was carried out as soon as possible.

AGLISH AND CLASHMORE NOTES

We call the following from The London Letter of the Irish Independent—

"Notable Irish Nurse—An obviously excited Irish nurse spoke to me on the telephone from Bethnal Green Hospital. True to her training she kept her voice low and even. She is Eileen Mulcahy from Clashmore, Waterford. She had just been elected Nurse of the Year at the East End hospital. Next week will receive her prize from actor Donald Wolfitt. Secretly she is almost more interested in learning about the same time whether she has passed her final examinations. Nobody but herself doubts this because the Nurse of the Year prize is for leadership and good nursing."

She visited her parents brother and sister in June last and hopes to be with them again sometime in August. This popular Irish girl has finished her three years training for which she came to London. She told me that the Student Nurses Association had selected her to go to Sweden in September for a fortnight to make a round of hospitals there and see the nursing systems.

The weather—Torrential rain in this area on Sunday and Monday last did considerable damage to corn crops and much lodging resulted. Some flooding occurred in low-lying areas.

Concert—Kinsalebeg—A very successful concert, in aid of Parochial Funds was held at Kinsalebeg on last Sunday night. Star attraction was Miss Fletcher, National Prize Winner New Zealand Radio 1953. Her beautiful soprano voice captivated the large audience and she was loudly applauded. Songs were also contributed by Mr. Jim Keohan (tenor) Dungarvan, and a party of Cork artists.

Old Age Pensions Meeting—A meeting of the Youghal No. 2 (Rural) Old Age Pensions Committee was held at Clashmore on Monday last. Two claims were considered.

Camogie Revived—A camogie club has been formed in Clashmore. A team representing the parish will compete in the forthcoming championships.

FF Club Meets—There was a large attendance at a meeting of the Clashmore Fianna Fail Club held on Saturday night last. Correspondence was read from Mr. S. Ormond, T.D. and several matters of importance were discussed.

New Teachers Appointed

Suggestion Of Secret Vote Defeated

An Fear Mor Vice-Chairman presided at a meeting of the above held in Dungarvan on Monday last. Messrs M. O'Hara, D. Leahy, N. Kelly, J. Mansfield, N. Walsh, M. Creagh, J. McCarthy, J. Ormond, D. Senator J. Butler, T. O'Faolain and M. Hartly were present. Mr. D. Cullinane, C.E.O. was in attendance.

Domestic Class

Arising from consideration of the educational scheme for 1953-54, Mr. Creagh said that in his opinion a domestic economy class would do well in Kilmarden. It was some years since the last such class was held there and he understood that the hall there was now available.

The C.E.O. said that one of the Instructors tried to get the hall for such a class lately but failed.

Mr. O'Faolain—Who owns the hall?

Mr. Creagh—The Select Vestry it was decided to apply for the use of the hall for a class again.

Appointment Of Commercial Teacher

A list of eleven applicants for the post of permanent whole-time commercial teacher was circulated to the members.

Mr. Walsh said that this list should have been sent out to the members with the agenda in order to give them a chance to discuss the list of applicants. Getting the list at this late stage made it impossible for them to study it properly.

The Chairman agreed with Mr. Walsh.

Deputy Ormond said that it was usually accepted in cases of appointments that preference be given to applicants from County Waterford.

Mr. McCarthy agreed that this was so.

Mr. Hartly said that it was a rule decided on before.

The C.E.O. then pointed out that the list of candidates for the post of temporary whole-time capacity until he qualified fully.

Mr. Walsh asked whether the post was to be filled by secret ballot or not.

Mr. Kelly pointing out that when they filled the last position under the Committee (Caretaker at Cappoquin) it was done by secret ballot, said that it was the same procedure was adopted in this case he would not vote at all.

Mr. Walsh—You're afraid Mr. Kelly—Im not.

Deputy Ormond seconding Mr. Walsh stated that he did so as he was not a candidate, but Mr. O'Faolain seconded Mr. McCarthy's proposal that the C.E.O. should fill the post by secret ballot.

The Chairman said that he had two proposals but Mr. Walsh challenged the idea of a secret vote, and said that four members of the Committee had already shown their hands and it was not fair to them to let the rest of the members get away with a secret vote.

Senator Butler stated that he would give his first vote to Mr. Thomas Cashin but in order that a candidate from the county would be sure of getting the position, he suggested that in the event of Thomas Cashin's appointment not being sanctioned that Miss Colender should be nominated as the Committee's second choice.

Mr. O'Faolain then said that he did not see why the name of Miss Mary Ryan Emmins, Co. Sligo (the other fully qualified applicant and who had been the commerce teacher at Dungarvan for 24 years until she left to go to Sligo last year) should be put out altogether, and he proposed her for the position.

Mr. Kelly said that Miss Ryan had always given great service while she was in Dungarvan. Senator Butler said that Miss Ryan had been here for 24 years and then she had gone away. That had not been the fault of the Co. Waterford Committee and he pointed out further that last year she had been permanently employed in Sligo.

already has a job. The Chairman then read the standing orders in relation to voting, and Mr. Walsh pointed out that standing orders would not allow a secret vote.

Mr. O'Hara stating that Miss Ryan's name should not be cut out, seconded her proposal.

A recorded vote was then taken and resulted as follows: For Cashin—Messrs Ormond, Butler, Mansfield, Leahy, Hart, McCarthy (6). For Ryan—Messrs Kelly, O'Faolain, Creagh, O'Hara (4). For Colender—Messrs Walsh, Fear Mor (2).

Miss Colender was then eliminated and a further vote taken as follows—

For Cashin—Messrs Ormond, Butler, Mansfield, Leahy, Hart, McCarthy, Fear Mor (7). For Ryan—Messrs Kelly, O'Faolain, Creagh, O'Hara, Walsh (5).

The Chairman then said that Mr. Cashin had been selected as first choice and Miss Ryan as second choice.

Senator Butler said that in this case they had not been balloting for a second choice. He had made the suggestion earlier on but he held that in order to do that a separate ballot would have to be taken.

Mr. Leahy—But will the Department have to be informed if a second ballot is taken?

C.E.O. Yes, it would have to be recorded in the minutes, otherwise it would be illegal.

Mr. Leahy—Then I think it should not be held until we see if Thomas Cashin's appointment is sanctioned.

Finally it was agreed to appoint Thomas Cashin subject to sanction and not to make any second choice for the present.

Rural Science Teacher

There were six applicants for the position of permanent whole-time Rural Science teacher (3 from Co. Cork 1 each from Limerick, Kerry and Kilkenny).

Mr. O'Hara proposed the appointment of John Walsh Mulinavat Co. Kilkenny and Mr. O'Faolain seconded.

Mr. Walsh proposed William Cashman Youghal for the position and Mr. Mansfield seconded.

Deputy Ormond proposed Con Dineen Rathmore Co. Kerry and Mr. Creagh seconded.

On a show of hands the result was Cashman 6 votes, Dineen 3 and Walsh 2.

The Chairman did not vote. Wm. Cashman was accordingly appointed with Dineen and Walsh as second and third choice respectively.

Tenders For Repairs To School

The C.E.O. said that four tenders had been received for the repairs to the Technical School, Dungarvan according to the specification of the engineer Mr. W. O. Morrissey, Clonmel. Mr. Morrissey he said had been invited to attend the meeting for the opening of the tenders but had not turned up.

The Chairman then opened the tenders which were as follows—

Brothers Caseyville Dungarvan £735. J. Tobin & Sons - Ballymacmaigue Dungarvan £765. Michael Dunne Wolfe Tone Road, Dungarvan £710. Son, Dungarvan £828 15s 3d.

Mr. McCarthy asked if all the tenderers were qualified contractors, and the C.E.O. said that he could not answer for that. Mr. Mansfield proposed that the job go to Mr. Tobin and Mr. Kelly seconded.

Mr. McCarthy proposed Messrs McCarthy but there was no second.

Several members remarked on the absence of the Architect. Senator Butler said that the tenders should be submitted to the Architect and let it to him to recommend a tender to the Department.

The C.E.O. stated that the job had been £500.

Mr. Creagh said that the only sensible thing for them to do was to accept the lowest tender, and Mr. McCarthy seconded.

Finally a vote was taken between the acceptance of the tenders of Mr. Tobin and Mr. Dunne and by 7 votes to 5, Mr. Dunne's tender was accepted subject to the approval of the Architect.

Sympathy

The Committee voted sympathy to Mr. McCarthy on the death of his sister to which Mr. McCarthy, suitably replied.

COUNTY WATERFORD COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE

SHEEP BREEDING SCHEME, 1953

For the purpose of improving the breeds of mountain sheep in County Waterford the Waterford Committee of Agriculture are prepared to subject to the approval of the Department of Agriculture to locate a limited number of high-grade black-faced rams on the commonage areas of the Comeragh and Knockmealdown Mountains on the following conditions—

- (1) The Committee shall grant to each selected applicant a premium of from £5 to £8 on the basis that the value of the premium shall be less by £5 than the cost price of the ram subject to a maximum premium of £8
- (2) In the allocation of rams preference will be given to applicants who apply on behalf of sheep owners who are prepared to mate the rams to selected ewes
- (3) The Committee will endeavour to secure that a high standard of quality will be supplied but they cannot undertake responsibility in case any animal should subsequently prove unfruitful or unsatisfactory for breeding purposes
- (4) The ram must be maintained in good and healthy condition and returned in the flock for two breeding seasons
- (5) Each applicant shall be required to lodge with his application a deposit of £5. Of the amount so lodged one half may be retained by the Committee where a sufficient supply of rams being available, a selected applicant fails to procure a ram
- (6) In all cases of dispute in connection with this Scheme the decision of the Minister for Agriculture shall be final
