**OUR INLAND FISHERIES**

She is presently staying with her aunt, Mrs Daniel Buckley and is visiting all her relatives and friends in Dungarvan before going on to England to call on other relatives before returning to America on the "Nieu Amsterdam".

Mrs Kalagher was accompanied by her friend Mrs Mary Provost a native of Tralee, whose first trip home in fifty years this was.

With reference to Mrs Kalagher's visit it is interesting to note the long associations which Dungarvan had with the town of Dungarvan.

I take the following cutting from an issue of the "Waterford Star" dated Saturday, November 11th 1905—

**"Death Of A Mother And Son."**  
On Monday morning the sad tidings of the death of Mr John Quealy Springmount, was circulated through the town. With the townspeople of Dungarvan Mr Quealy was a universal favourite. He was a cattle dealer by trade, and in all his business dealings was mainly and honestly successful. Having spent many years of his life in Australia he was well versed in all matters relating to that vast portion of the British Empire. Often has he beguiled the weary hearts of those who followed him to the fairs or markets where his business called him as he narrated some of his many numerous experiences. He lived as a good Catholic should live and died a happy and peaceful death. On Monday evening the hearts of all were filled with sympathy for the afflicted family when it was announced that Mrs Catherine Quealy, mother of the above deceased gentleman, had breathed her last. Another good and pious Christian had gone to render an account of her journey through this "vale of tears." Before her death she had not been made aware of her son's death on that morning and it is with awe that one can picture the meeting of a mother and son in another world than ours. Mrs Quealy's death was a matter of general surprise. Even during the latter days of last week she appeared as she transacted her business in town to be in perfect health. She has lived all her life in Dungarvan and had won her son's love and as they both well merited the esteem and respect of everybody who knew them. The remains of both of the deceased were conveyed to the parish church, and were attended a large concourse of sympathisers among whom were the members of the Sacred Heart Sodality. On Wednesday the remains were removed from the church and the funeral took place in the afternoon.

**Chest X-Ray Sessions For County Waterford**  
By arrangement with Dr. M. O'Farrell County Medical Officer chest X-Ray sessions open to the public will be held throughout County Waterford during the coming weeks.

On Monday Tuesday and Wednesday 14th 15th and 16th sessions open to the public will be held in the Square Dungarvan. Last year when miniature chest X-Ray facilities were offered to the people of Dungarvan a tremendous number of people—practically the whole population of the town—availed of the service. To get the best benefit from mass-radiography it is advisable that every person should have a chest X-Ray at least once a year if possible and the County Medical Officer is anxious that everyone who was X-Rayed last year and those who for some reason did not attend last year should now come forward for this health check-up. It is the aim of the County Medical Officer to provide this service if at all possible at the same time each year in the month of September or October and he is anxious that the people of Dungarvan and of this county generally should adopt the X-Ray habit.

To have a chest X-Ray is quite a simple matter. All a person has to do is to attend at any session in the county give his name and address stand in front of the X-Ray camera for less than a second and in that short time his chest X-Ray is taken. There is no necessity to undress apart from removing any heavy outside garment. The service is free, voluntary and confidential. No one but the person concerned and the Medical Director of the Unit will know the result of an X-Ray.


**NOW LOOK ON THIS PICTURE**  
Joyce held from the immediate landlord Montgomery a farm of about 59 acres (P.L.V. inclusive £89) part of the land being under scrutiny by the Land Commission. The area included over 3 acres of the bed of the river of which with the soil and what grew thereon he was holding, it being included in his order for annuities and apparently rates. The Supreme Court confirmed on appeal Joyce's ownership of the river bed half-way across. Evidence was given by the ex-landlord's valuer that large boulders had been placed in the river bed resting on the salmon and under-water wires. It was admitted that these obstructions placed there without Joyce's permission in the soil he actually owned collected weeds and floating boughs and periodically flooded his land along the river bank. Trespass by authorized fishermen occurred along the bank against the expressed wishes of the tenant. The Lisnabrin Estate which had a hotel quite near at Careyville and had the fisheries adjacent, were anxious to have Joyce's portion obviously to extend the amenities of the hotel and give to the Duke of Devonshire control of a longer stretch of the river especially in Joyce's adjacent holding. Expert evidence was given that transfer to Joyce would not lessen supervision of the Lisnabrin Estate, did not pay for such supervision and that several smaller riparian owners above and below had acquired their fishing rights. The proximity of Joyce to his Grace of Devonshire appeared to be his undoing. His application was refused. That the Duke might fish Joyce might starve.

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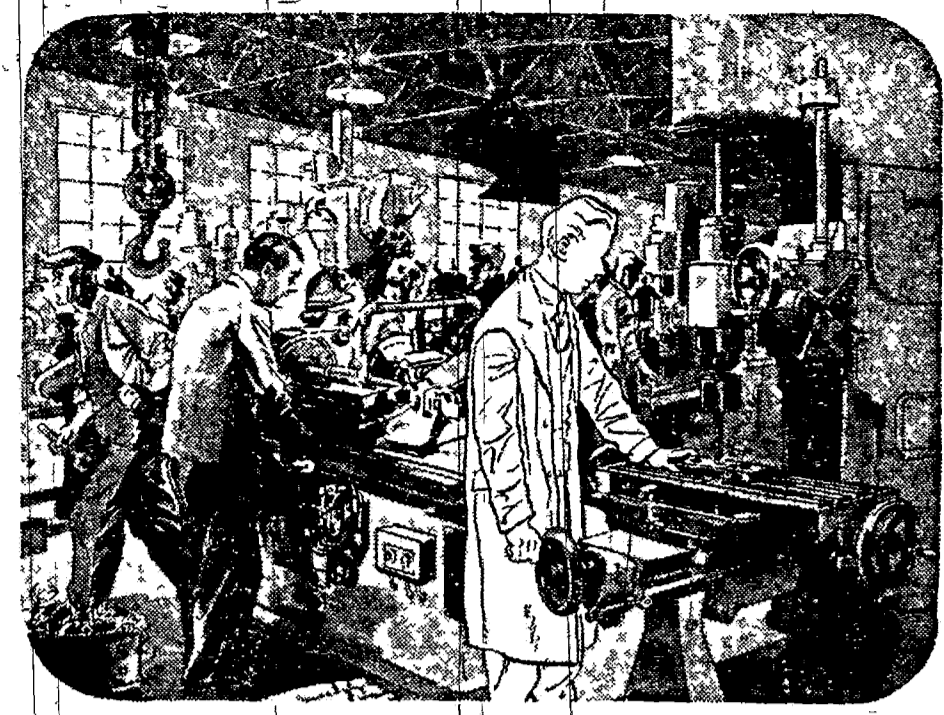
