THE TOPICAL SONGS OF OLD DUNGARVAN

A couple of months ago I reproduced reports of the production of the old Dungarvan Dramatic Society in the 1916-20 period and this week thanks to Mr. Michael Kelly of the Devonshire Arms Hotel I came across one of the topical songs composed by Mr. Tom Keohan, sung at the Society's production of "The Shaughraun" on Horse Show Night 22nd July 1920. These songs brought in the leading personalities of the town at the time with harmlessly witty references and were eagerly looked for by the audiences at the various productions.

The song sung on that Horse Show night thirty-three years ago went as follows

When the King of the Great Fijl Islands got ill
With a ten-horse-power touch of lumbago,
His doctors from out of their medical skill,
Put him feeding on turnips and sage
But Lar Foley who happened to pass round that way
On an aeroplane trip called to see him one day.
Said he "All you want is a dip in the sea"
Like the Gaybricks across in Dungarvan.

"I'm not joking at all as you'll find very soon
If you'll only hop into my little balloon
You'll feel quite as fit as the man in the moon
When I land you across in Dungarvan.

And so the King came with Lar Foley "his said
They came round via France and Kibrian
For poor Willie Brett caught a cold in his head,
From the draught they made over him fly
Then they went round by Mappstown and the Spring
"Don't fall out now, your Highness" says Lar to the King,
"For we're over the Poorhouse and 'tisn't the thing

Young Woman Crushed Under Lorry

Fatal Accident At Glendaloughin

Mr. A. R. Farrell, Solr Dungarvan, Temporary Coroner for West Waterford held an inquest at Knocknaree, Ballymacorney, on Tuesday last into the circumstances surrounding the death of Miss Bridget Prendergast, which occurred on Monday, September 28th.

The following jury was sworn—Messrs P. McCarthy, M. Grady, T. Wall (foreman), P. Whelan, T. Crotty, D. Hogan and J. Harney.

Patrick Foster, 81 Slevanmore Road, Clonmel, owner of a two-ton lorry in his evidence stated that it was arranged with William Prendergast father of the deceased girl to bring a lorry to the bog for turf on Monday, September 28th.

The lorry was started at 3 p.m. and in the lorry's cab he took William Prendergast the deceased, Mrs. Rockett and a boy named Whelan. Having loaded the lorry they started back a few hours later and sitting beside him was Mrs. Rockett then her father (Mr. Prendergast) with the boy on his knee and the deceased next to the door.

He had perfect control over the lorry which was travelling at 4 1/2 m.p.h. and had just passed the bottom of a steep incline when he heard the deceased say 'Let me out' or something like that and at the same time she opened the door and jumped out.

The door had been properly fastened before that and when she jumped out she stopped the lorry and pulled up in the bog. The lorry's own length. Before he got out he was told to back which he did but he felt no bump. He then got out and to the side of the lorry and then went off to get a priest. There was nothing he could have done in the circumstances to avoid the accident.

Witness Prendergast deceased's father said that he was a farmer living at Knocknaree and the deceased lived with him. Having described how they went to the bog for the turf he said they set out for home about 3 p.m. on Monday.

At a place called Glendaloughin he continued, he had come down a hill and was travelling on the level very slowly and all of a sudden the lorry stopped. She opened the door and jumped out. The lorry pulled up very quickly and we all jumped out. Young Whelan was the first out and he said she was under the wheel.

The deceased was lying with her head on the grass ramp towards the front wheel and the back was against the left back wheel. She was being squeezed by the wheel. The driver backed the lorry and then got out and picked her up. She appeared to be alive then. She heard her breathing later Mr. O'Sullivan's car came and we put her into it and brought her to the hospital. She was 29 years of age in good health and unmarried. She was nervous in a car before. There would have been about three tons of turf in the lorry. Just before my daughter said 'let me out' I heard the driver say 'Oh!'

Jumped Out Mrs. Margaret Rockett sister of deceased said that she was coming home with the lorry and driver. The lorry was going slowly and she heard the driver say 'my God' and at the same time she saw him grasp a lever coming up from the floor with his left hand. Just then she heard her sister say 'let me out' because she had her hand on the deceased's shoulder and behind her father's back. The deceased then opened the door and jumped out. The lorry pulled up very quickly and they found her sister on the back wheel as described. She saw no reason why her sister should have jumped out except that she was a very nervous type of person.

Dr. D. J. McNamara, deposed that deceased suffered from a fracture of the neck with extensive bruising of the thorax. The left ribs were fractured and there were other abrasions and wounds. The injuries were consistent with deceased having been crushed by the wheel of a lorry. In his opinion death was caused by shock and haemorrhage due to multiple injuries.

On the application of Supt. Duggan, Lismore, who represented the Authorities, the request was adjourned pending further investigation.

Sympathy was expressed by the Coroner, Superintendent and foreman of the jury with the father and family of the deceased on the tragic occurrence.

PROTEST AGAINST DELAY IN ABBEYSIDE SEWERAGE SCHEME

SURVEY OF DERELICT SITES

Chairman can get the Minister to change his mind. I, with other members here, believe that the road there will not be widened. The Council side unless the Council give permission to have their big wall knocked down as church property cannot be acquired under any Act.

Mr. N. Kelly, Vice-Chairman presided at a meeting of the Dungarvan Urban Council held on last Friday night. Also present were Messrs. T. K. T. D., T. Lee, R. Walsh and P. Casey. Messrs. S. J. Moylan and Manager, F. O'Brien, E. Borough Surveyor and Deery Town Clerk were in attendance.

Removal of Range With reference to the Manager's order concerning the removal of the range from 43 Murphy Place by Mrs. E. Wade which Mrs. Wade wants replaced with a tiled fireplace, Deputy Kyrne said that Mrs. Wade was willing to purchase the fireplace herself and return the range to the Council if they in turn installed the fireplace. It was unreasonable he said, to expect her to pay for the installation of the fireplace as well as return the range.

Mr. O'Brien said that he would reconsider the matter if the Abbeyside Sewerage Scheme was approved. Mr. Walsh referring to the tender accepted for the above, said that the Council had not even seen the tenders before they were dealt with and it was obvious that the Council who had to pay the tender had a say.

The tender which had been finally accepted (Messrs. Murphy Brothers Cork at £13,855) was £2,000 above the original highest tender and he said that he wished to protest in the strongest manner against the whole procedure. The Engineer's initial estimate for the work was £11,000 but there was a big difference in the two figures.

'The Council might as well be not here at all he added as their only function is to pass votes of sympathy'.

Mr. Lee—We never had a say in anything it's the Manager and the officials have all the say.

Deputy Kyrne concurring with what Mr. Walsh had said stated that there were two faces to the coin. First was the increased cost of the scheme to the ratepayers because another tender had not been accepted in the first instance and secondly the long delay of four or five months in drawing unemployment insurance while they were employed on the scheme.

There would now be an added delay and he thought it would be next January before the scheme would be started. This is bad Local Government, he said, no matter what anyone says, but the Council has no responsibility in the matter as they had no authority about it.

Mr. Kelly agreed that it is to focus attention on those who are to blame for the fault it was. If the matter had been handled properly the job would have been done by a competent contractor, which is what the Council are used to. Mr. Lee—Oh, he wasn't in the 'ring'.

Mr. Walsh—All we had to do was provide the money. The partner had sanctioned the tender and he was now waiting for the contractor to submit the necessary bond.

REQUEST TO GUARANTEE LOAN
OF £132,500
REPORT ON ARDKEEN CHEST

Mr M. Morrissey, Chairman,
presided at a special meeting of
the Waterford County Council on
Tuesday last. Messrs W. Fitz-
gerald, D. Leahy, D. Heskin, J.
Quirk, T. Power, J. Fahy, Sena-
tor Butler, J. Kirwan, N. Walsh,
M. McGrath, E. Power, M. Hart,
L. Morrissey, W. Kenneally, T.D.,
and C. O'Mond T.D. were also
present.

Messrs S. J. Moynihan, Co.
Manager, D. Sheedy, Co. Sur-
veyor and J. G. Dowling, Co. Sec-
retary, were in attendance.
At the afternoon session
several members were absent.
The Secretary read letters from
the Secretary of the Commissioners
which stated that the Minister
