ANGER AT CLONEA

Some time ago I referred to the dangerous corner at the junction of Sexton Street and Sarsfield Street, at Abbeyside. Two main roads converge at this point—the main Dungarvan-Waterford road and the coast road to Waterford. The latter carries a particularly heavy volume of traffic during the summer months as it leads to Clonea and other seaside resorts frequented largely by people from South Tipperary, and the possibility of widening the point of convergence would help to a great extent to avert this junction more safe. A dwelling-house right at the corner made the bend completely blind but when this was demolished and made the subject of a demolition order the possibility of its removal was entertained.

An objection to the demolition was entered by the owner of the house and the matter rested there for some time but now I see that the County Manager has made an order dated October 29th that the terms of the demolition order in the case be carried out and the demolition to proceed forthwith.

WATERFORD BOARD OF PUBLIC ASSISTANCE

Time To Speed Up Knockanore Dispensary

Local Homes For Aged Suggested

Mr. T. Gallagher, Chairman of the Board, presided at the monthly meeting of the Board held in Dungarvan on Monday last. Messrs. T. Kyne, T.D., P. Browne, Senator J. Butler, N. Kelly, W. Kennedy, T.D., F. Roche and D. Heskinen were also present. Mr. J. Glavin, Acting Secretary, was in attendance.

The Secretary informed Senator Butler that they were awaiting the report of the London Waterford, concerning his suggestion of having periodic eye clinics held in Dungarvan.

With reference to the proposed Home for the Aged at Dungarvan, a letter from the Architect said that the suggestion to incorporate an X-ray department in it had been agreed in principle by the Department. It would be a good thing to have an X-ray in Dungarvan, and the Secretary said that the idea was to shift the unit from Lismore to Dungarvan.

The Board approved of the Co. Manager's Order agreeing to the purchase of 14 acres from Kilmacdonagh Co-Op Society for a dispensary and doctor's residence at Kilmacdonagh for £125, plus cost of conveyance.

RECONSTRUCTION OF GO HOME

A proposal to raise a loan of £10,000 to carry out part of the reconstruction of the Co. Home, Dungarvan, was postponed in the absence of a proper scheme.

Senator Butler said that as far as the Board had adopted no scheme and he was not in favour of spending £10,000 on work which might be turned down at a later date when a scheme was prepared.

It was decided to let working at random was a loose way of doing things, as nothing had been approved as yet.

The Secretary said that the proposed scheme for a dispensary and doctor's residence would be within the framework of any future scheme.

It was decided to adjourn the matter until a concrete scheme was submitted.

Knockanore Dispensary

Mr. Heskinen asked what the position with regard to the above was and the Secretary said that it was held up due to legal snags concerning the title of the site.

The Chairman said that he read about this in the *Dungarvan Leader* of the previous week and it appeared that a dispensary was urgently needed there.

Mr. Heskinen said that it was unfair to have people going to the ramshackle building being used at present and the legal adviser should be asked to look into the matter up as much as possible.

The Secretary said that he would have something on the matter for next meeting.

With reference to the Board's approval of £2,400 for the purpose of employing four extra nurses at the Orthopaedic Unit at the County Hospital, Waterford, Mr. Heskinen said that he knew the employment of the nurses was necessary he felt that these matters should be dealt with only at estimate meetings each year. In this way they would be aware of the need for them and they would be able to bring forward big debts to next year's estimate. It was unfair, he said, as the rates had risen so much.

Mr. Browne said that there was magnificent work being done at the Unit but said that he had received a complaint that at night time there was no system of conveying the patients to the night nurse for the patients. One nurse had to attend six wards which was impossible and he asked that a number of electric bells be installed in each ward.

This was approved.

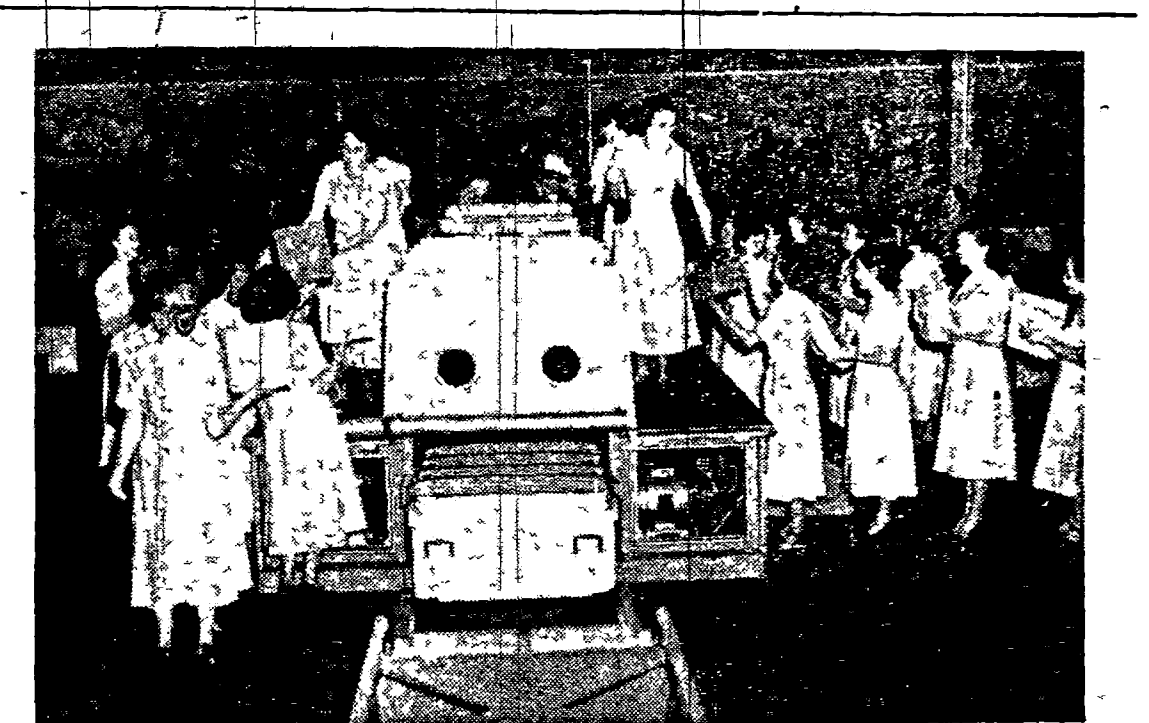
Mr. Kyne asked if any beds at the Unit was reserved for Co. Waterford patients as he said he knew of two cases from Dungarvan which had been waiting for treatment there for many years.

The Secretary was requested to prepare a report as to the personnel of the patients at present being treated at the Unit for next meeting.

Local Homes For Aged

Mr. Heskinen pointing out that it cost £2,000 a week to maintain inmates at the Co. Home, made a suggestion that it might be possible to have large houses in different localities used to keep such people. In this way the old people would not have to travel far away from their own localities as at present and could keep up their local connections when they go to Dungarvan they never see any of their connections again and are forgotten.

The Secretary said that he would look into the matter.



WHAT DO THEY DO WITH YOUR SWEEP COUNTERFOIL?

Liam MacGabhann tells of some wonders behind the big Draws

If you are one of those people who think that the later they send in their Irish Sweep counterfoils the better chance they have of winning prizes, forget it. If you think the earlier the better forget that, too. Tests carried out by Irish Hospitals Sweepstakes following the thorough mixing process have proved that counterfoils posted months apart can be as good as those posted the day after tomorrow.

These millions of counterfoils have been checked, recorded, photographed, identified, by everything but the fingerprints—are distributed into sixty steel boxes.

In two large circular spaces before the great drum they are loaded and carried by means of a screw conveyor into the centres of the two oval spaces. The counterfoils are fed into the mixers through transverse apertures and a Herco mechanically produced an current blows them like a snowstorm up a gradient they fall into another compartment and are blown again up a second gradient until they settle at last in a trough beneath the machine.

This whole business—snowstorm and all—is visible to the public through glass windows in the mixing machines. Every two minutes the machines are stopped partitions raised and the counterfoils carried in steel boxes.

But their torture is not yet over. Now half of the boxes from the one mixer are exchanged for half from the other and the windstorm blows them again on the merry-go-round. Practically every counterfoil brushes past every other one before all that is over a desert sandstorm does not carry out such other displacement as this.

When you consider that when the counterfoils go to their last routine in the drum itself and are whirled about all day in that the proverbial needle in the bundle of straw becomes an obsolete proverb.
