THE INCARNATION OF THE SON OF GOD

The central doctrine of the Catholic Religion is the Incarnation of the Son of God which took place at the moment of the Annunciation. The Blessed Virgin is in the little home at Nazareth. Perhaps she is praying for the coming of the Messiah. An angel from heaven is sent to Her to announce the advent of the promised Redeemer. It is not to a great world centre such as Rome Athens or Jerusalem that the angel is sent, but to the little home in the village of Nazareth where the Virgin Mary lives. The angel enters and salutes her in the name of God.

Hail, full of Grace, the Lord is with thee, blessed art thou among women, simple words which contain a world of meaning. Much perplexed at these words of singular praise she has heard from the angel, Mary does not know what she is to make of such a greeting.

But the angel reassures her saying 'fear not, Mary for thou hast found favour in the sight of God. Behold thou shalt conceive in thy womb and shalt bring forth a son, and thou shalt call His name Jesus. He shall be great and shall be called the Son of the Most High and the Lord God shall give unto Him the throne of David. His Father and He shall reign in the House of Jacob forever.' Mary understands that she is to be the Mother of the Messiah and she gives her consent. 'How can that be since I have no knowledge of man?' And the angel answered her 'the Holy Ghost will come upon thee and the power of the Most High will overshadow thee. Thus the Holy Offspring to be born of thee shall be known as the Son of God.'

The Blessed Virgin replied 'Behold the handmaid of the Lord let it be done unto me according to thy word.' At the very moment that Mary gives her consent the Word becomes flesh that is, God becomes man and dwells in the Virgin's womb until His birth on Christmas Day in a stable at Bethlehem.

From this inspired account it is clear that Mary in indeed the Mother of God, the Mother of Christ who is the Eternal Son of God. Motherhood is a relation between person and person. A mother gives birth not to a mere body but to a person. Mary likewise gave birth not to a body but to the person of Christ and this person is none other than the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity made man. That is a unique privilege. Mary is chosen from all the world to be the Mother of God incarnate. The Blessed Virgin remains indeed a creature of God, but her greatness must be measured by the greatness of the Son she bore. So overwhelmed was she at the prospect of becoming Mother of such a Son that she exclaimed that 'Behold, from this day forward all generations shall call me blessed because He that is mighty hath done great things to me' (Luke 1:48).

THE PREROGATIVES OF MARY ARE FOR THE SAKE OF HER SON

To Jesus the Blessed Virgin gave what every mother gives to the child that is born of her, and for giving which she is called the child's mother. By reason of Her Divine Motherhood and the special relation in which this places her to the Blessed Trinity, Our Blessed Lady is necessarily a creature apart and unique from the very first moment of her existence.

To make her worthy of her marvellous dignity in every way, God so created her soul that from the first instant of its existence it was filled with grace. Our Lady, then by this special intervention of God applying 'to her' anticipation of the merits of the Passion yet to come, was conceived untouched by the legacy of Original Sin. This unique privilege is called her Immaculate Conception. The Virgin Mary, didst prepare a worthy habitation for Thy son, grant that we too by her intercession may come stainless unto Thee.

The figure of the Mother, and the Divine Child is enshrined in the heart of the Church and plays a prominent part in the religious life of a Catholic. The Second Person of the Blessed Trinity should have a Mother is one of the most striking circumstances of His coming on earth for our salvation. In the Incarnation God wished to honour both sexes. He exalted man in the person of Our Lord to a height that cannot be surpassed but He has also exalted women in the person of the Virgin Mary. Our Lord will have treated His Mother and felt about her as the ideal son would have done.

Hence He will have surrounded her with all that tender courtesy and respect that careful consideration that we should assume in any true son and much more besides. Moreover, He would do His best for her and not at all consider that just anything was good enough. Now what is the first and best gift in the case of Our Lord? It is sanctifying grace. Hence we are not surprised to be taught by the Church that the precious gift of Sanctifying Grace was given by Our Lord, true God, to His Mother in rich measure and from the first moment of her existence. This is what we mean by Our Lady's Immaculate Conception.

Thanks to her intimacy with Our Lord according to His human nature there is a union between God and Our Lady of a kind that no other saint can arrive at and because of this union her power of intercession is unique. Of course, the honour we give the Blessed Virgin is not and cannot be the honour we give to God, nor divine, but God's creature, dependent on Him for existence, sanctification, redemption and glorious Assumption into heaven. We do not adore Our Lady but we honour her because we give her the same honour we give the saints and we salute her as their Queen.

Infant Dies Following Extensive Burns

Spark From Fire Set Bedclothes Alight

Dr D. Healy Lismore Coroner for West Waterford held an inquest at the Courthouse, Dungarvan on Tuesday last, into the circumstances surrounding the death of the six weeks old infant child of Mr and Mrs Nicholas Barron, Kilmore Clashmore who died at the District Hospital, Dungarvan, on Saturday last, December 5th after having sustained extensive burns.

In reply to Superintendent P. Flanagan who represented the Authorities, Mr N. Barron, father of the child, gave evidence of identification and said that on the morning of the 7th of November he saw the child in perfect condition. He later saw the child in his mother's arms in a badly burned state. The baby, a girl was born on October 20th and had been christened Mary Bridget.

To the best of his ability he said that the child had been burned was that she had been in a Moses basket covered with new woollen blankets suspended between two chairs in front of an open coal fire in an upper bedroom of their house and a spark from the fire must have landed on the blankets which had been almost completely burned. There had been no fireguard.

YOUNG BOYS ON HOUSE-BREAKING AND LARCENY CHARGES COMMITTED TO INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL

"TALE OF A PHEASANT"—CAUSES NUMBER OF FINES

Dungarvan District Court was held before Mr. E. O'Riain DJ on Wednesday last. On the application of Mr. Williams Solr the renewal of the Dungarvan Literary Club License was granted

Mr. Farrell Solr, appeared for Kirby, a letter was read from Hayes stating that he was unable to attend the court and O'Shea who appeared in court admitted the charge against him

Mr. Farrell Solr, on behalf of Kirby said that his client was a carpenter's apprentice at the Glue factory and was aged 18 years. He was a member of the P.O.A. and had a licence for a rifle

Mr. Farrell added that Kirby did not know that the pheasant season was not open at the time and said that normally it would be for the past two years the pheasant day was put back from the 1st of November to the 1st of December

The Justice said that as Kirby was a member of the P.O.A. he should have known that the indiscriminate discharge of a point 22 was a serious matter if he intended to continue in pursuit of game it would be prudent in any future breaches of the Game Preservation Act in the cases against the other two defendants he imposed a fine of 10/- on each

Two members of the crews of fishing trawlers presently fishing out of Dungarvan, Maurice Power Dunmore East and George McCollig, Donegal were charged by Superintendent Flanagan with discharging a firearm on the public road at Shandon Dungarvan
