### G.A.A. NOTES

County Convention—The annual Convention takes place in Dungarvan on Sunday next and the Gaelic of Waterford are to be complimented on a successful year. All the Co-Manager's ships were completed in good time although the Junior finals could not have been played earlier.

POLLUTION OF RIVER COLLIGAN

Dungarvan District Court was held before Mr E O'Riain D.J. on Wednesday last. A special exemption order was granted to Mrs K Kent, O'Connell Street.

Both the defendant Companies were charged with (1) on the 15th day of July, 1953, using the Collihan river for the purpose of depositing deleterious matter without providing and maintaining such means as would effectively prevent the liquid from such receptacles from being discharged into the Collihan river.

The defendant companies were charged with (2) that on the 15th day of July, 1953, they caused to fall into the Collihan river at Ballinacree, deleterious matter in contravention of the provisions of the Fisheries Act, 1862.

Mr J F Kenny, solicitor who appeared for the Fisheries Conservators stated that the first company charged, Dungarvan Iron and Steel, went into liquidation for the purpose of transferring its assets to a second company, Rousseau & Casey, Ltd.

Mr Langan, solicitor for the defendant, stated that the defendant had purchased a car in Cappoquin early in December and had only used it twice before the High Court case.

The Justice said that the plea of defence was not a very good one and that the fact that the defendant had used a car without insurance and without a licence was an offence in itself.
