## BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT

with PENSMA

### RATEPAYERS ALERTED

I note from advertisements in recent issues of the Leader and other sources that the ratepayers of the County are beginning to do something positive concerning the present alarming rate position. From a central meeting in Dungarvan some few weeks ago calls went out for the formation of branches in the various areas and a central executive committee was formed. So far the organization seems to be on the proper footing but having got the Association moving what action is proposed or how does the Association mean to achieve its aims.

I have seen Ratepayers Associations formed in other areas and counties before and short of making the usual protests, very little was done with regard to the stabilisation or reduction of the costs of Local Administration. The battles of the ratepayers reduce the rate has been met with the equally effective strategy of "if you want services you must pay for them" and a stalemate has always resulted.

I do not want my readers to get the impression that I am against the formation of a Ratepayers Association. Far from it, I am all for it but I want to see an Association formed which will go in and fight for its rights with all reasonable and proper means at its disposal to do the unpopular thing if it is necessary and to continue the agitation to the very end.

No one will deny that there is an urgent need to at least stabilise the rates but the question of how to do this has not been studied. No useful purpose will be served by examining the annual estimates—they are just a jumble of figures—completely Greek to the ordinary layman. If a good case is to be made the methods of retrenchment will have to be stated, as a bald protest that the rates will have to be reduced can have no effect.

Personally I think that one of the first matters which should be dealt with is the actual cost of administration as it strikes me, at any rate, that the ordinary layman employed by our County Council in recent years. Perhaps I am wrong but it is a field worth exploring and if cuts can be effected here and in the travelling expenses of a good start will have been made.

### WILL THE LOCAL POSTAL AUTHORITIES PLEASE NOTE AND SEE WHAT CAN BE DONE ABOUT IT

Will the local postal authorities please note and see what can be done about it. I have received a letter from S. O. Mathghamhna, Kennington, London, in which he points out that the bulk of the English Press gives no publicity to the question of Partition and the treatment of Irish people in the Six North-Eastern Counties of Ireland. He states that if a bomb is put in a letter-box the Press of England immediately points the accusing finger at the Irish and the same position pertains to every bit of derogatory publicity which can be pushed against the Irish. But he adds that the boot is on the other foot if an Irishman wins a boxing contest or an international contest of any kind—then they are lauded and acclaimed, not as Irishmen however, but as citizens of the mighty British Empire with the embracing tag of "British". We will never get justice from the British Government, he concludes, and it's about time something was done instead of sitting around.

Well, Mr. O. Mathghamhna has opened a very controversial subject, and perhaps others of my readers would like to say something about it. Let's hear from you if you have.

### HISTORIC OCCASION FOR BALLINAMULT

Monday night next, 1st March at 7.30 p.m. will be an historic occasion for the Ballinamult district, when Mr. Sean Lemass Minister for Industry & Commerce will visit the area to perform the switch-on of the 100,000th consumer under the Rural Electrification Scheme. The ceremony will take place at the premises of the Knocknagore Co-Op Creamery and will attract widespread attention. Since the scheme was inaugurated eight years ago it is interesting to note the steady progress which has been made in bringing electricity to the rural areas in that time. 275,000 poles have been raised, more than 14,000 miles of line have been laid and the supply to 270 towns, each comprising about 25 square miles, has been completed. Work in bringing light and power is presently in progress in the Ardmore area, and it is soon to be known the boon of electricity.

**DEVOTION TO OUR LADY STRESSED IN LENTEN PASTORAL**  
We give hereunder the opening of the Lenten Pastoral of his Lordship, Most Rev. Dr. Cohan, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, together with the appendix setting out the special indulgences which may be gained by the Faithful during the Marian Year.

**OUR BLESSED LADY**  
Very Rev. and Rev. Fathers and Dear Brethren  
This year 1954 is dedicated in a special way to Our Blessed Lady, who is the hundredth anniversary of the solemn definition of the doctrine of the Immaculate Conception. Ireland has been noted for the ardent devotion of its people to the Holy Mother of God, and this loyalty to and love of Mary did much to preserve our Catholic Faith during the long drawn-out agony of religious persecution.

The greatest of all the saints is Mary the Mother of God, and because Mary is the Mother of God her place among the saints is a thing apart. Our Lady is the Mother of God because she conceived Christ who was born of her, is God, to Jesus Christ she gave what every mother gives to the child that is born of her, and for giving which she is called the saint's mother.

By reason of her divine motherhood and the special relation in which this places her to the Blessed Trinity, Our Lady is necessarily a creature apart from the rest of the human race, and one of affinity with the Blessed Trinity and Our Lady had the privilege of the Immaculate Conception in order to fit her to become the worthy Mother of God. It was by the aid of the Holy Spirit that she was conceived in the womb of the Virgin Mary, and she was born of her in the state of grace. The maternity of the Blessed Virgin established a relationship of consanguinity with Jesus Christ according to her human nature and one of affinity with the Blessed Trinity and Our Lady had the privilege of the Immaculate Conception in order to fit her to become the worthy Mother of God.

We should all treasure the gift of sanctifying grace in our souls but to be the Mother of God is by its nature higher than to be in the state of grace. The maternity of the Blessed Virgin established a relationship of consanguinity with Jesus Christ according to her human nature and one of affinity with the Blessed Trinity and Our Lady had the privilege of the Immaculate Conception in order to fit her to become the worthy Mother of God.

The position given to the Blessed Virgin in the Catholic religion is accidental or important. She is one of the chief instruments used by God to lead us into union with Himself. That the Son of God should have had a Mother is one of the most striking circumstances which gives rise to those touching details which make the incarnation so peculiarly well fitted to captivate our attention and affection. God chose Mary out of all the women in the world to be His Mother, to give Him the human nature He assumed. The Mother of Christ is, therefore, most dear to God; and to love Him is to love her.

As the Blessed Virgin is one of ourselves a human creature we have a natural claim on her sympathy and in our private devotion we treat her with a loving familiarity. We approach her without any feeling of remorse, any consciousness that she is able to read us, judge us or punish us. Our heart goes out to that pious Virgin, and the more we know of her, the more our congratulations follow her as she rises from Nazareth and Ephesus to her throne in heaven to be crowned Queen of all Saints.

## WATERFORD BOARD OF PUBLIC ASSISTANCE

Estimates Adopted At Third Meeting  
Original Demand Increased By Further £2,420

Waterford Board of Public Assistance met for the third time at Dungarvan on Monday last, to consider the financial estimates for the coming financial year. Mr. T. Gallagher, Chairman, presided and also present were Messrs W. Kenneally, T. D. P. Browne, N. Kelly, D. Heskin, T. Kyne, T. D. Senator, J. Butler and M. Cullen. Mr. S. Deegan Deputy Co. Manager and J. Glanville Acting Secretary, were in attendance.

**Late Aid Jones**  
Before the business of the meeting commenced the Chairman proposed a sincere vote of sympathy to the widow and family of the late Aid W. Jones, who he said, had been the oldest member on the Corporation of Waterford City.

Mr. Browne seconded saying that Aid Jones was a great loss to the city and county. Deputy Kyne and Mr. Heskin also referred to the long link which Aid Jones had with the public life of Waterford and Senator Butler said that the people of Waterford showed a great admiration for him by electing him an Alderman of the city for forty-one years. A member could not be met, he said, and he added that on future trips to Waterford he would miss the late Bill Jones.

Mr. Kelly and Mr. Deegan associated themselves with the expression of sympathy which was passed in silence. Estimates further increased. Mr. Deegan stated that he was acting for the County Manager and had been informed and disposed and said that in addition to the original estimate of £221,532 (an increase of £19,127 over last year) that due to the recommendation of the visiting committee to the County Hospital Waterford, a further £1,020 would have to be added to this if the services of three additional nurses were to be obtained while there was also an addition of £1,600 in respect of medical fees at extern institutions making a gross increase of £2,620.

The Deputy Manager added that credit would be taken in receipts for a further £200 in the sale of old ambulances which would leave the net increase at £2,420. This brought the original increase of £19,127 up to £21,547. The Secretary read a letter from the Matron of the Co. Hospital Waterford and counter-signed by the County Surgeon, Mr. O'Reilly which stated that the three extra staff nurses as recommended by the Visiting Committee were needed.

Mr. Heskin—And is the position so that we have a further £220 on top of the increased estimate we already turned down? Deputy Manager—Yes. Mr. Heskin then stated that the ratepayers were being faced with an unbearable burden and said that he had appealed before that there should be no increase in the rates this year as the farmers could not bear anymore. He added that if the farmers could not carry on that the people in the towns would be badly hit as one section was dependent on the other.

Senator Butler said that they had discussed the estimate at two previous meetings and with regard to the item of reduced receipts from their hospitals he said that he was still not convinced that these receipts would be less this year than last year. They had the matter of extra nurses now but he felt

## Some things you should know about FARMYARD LIGHTING

Since the farmer has to take full advantage of daylight for field work, a good deal of yard and out-office work has to be done after dark. Well placed lights both inside and outside make this easier and quicker. Positions for yard lights should be chosen to give the best use without risk of damage from farm traffic. They should be about 15 feet above ground level and at points where lamp replacement would not be difficult. For out-offices, hanging lights fitted with ceiling rose mounted on wooden ridge-beam or rafter are most suitable. Leaky roofs should be repaired and fittings should be high enough to avoid damage. Switches fixed 5 to 6 feet above floor level will not be so liable to damage and should be at convenient points.

SHOULD ANY FITTING OR SWITCH BECOME BROKEN OR DAMAGED, REPLACE IT IMMEDIATELY.

Location and number of lights in the yard or offices is principally decided by convenience for working. The table below is a guide to good practice, assuming 100 watt bulbs. Supplementary lights will be found very useful at regular working points.

- Yards—One per 600-1,000 sq. feet.
- Out-offices without partitions—One per 400 sq. feet.
- Out-offices with partitions—One per 200 sq. feet.
- Farm Workshops—One per 200 sq. feet.
- Dairy—One per 150 sq. feet.
- Pastry Laying House—One per 200 sq. feet.

Death of Mr John Walsh, Mt. Mellary Gates, Cappoquin Regretted Passing of Popular Man—Very briefly in last week's issue we reported the death of one of Mount Mellary's most popular inhabitants in the person of Mr John (Jack) Walsh, Mount Mellary Gates, Cappoquin.
