### THE EXPLANATORY TABLES

Main items in the last two issues of the Leader have undoubtedly been the reports of the Waterford County Council meeting and the agitation carried on by the recently-formed County Waterford Ratepayers Association in an effort to get the rates for the current year reduced.

Well the rate has now been made and instead of a reduction there has been an increase of 1/6 in the £.

The main items under which the Ratepayers called for reductions were—(a) interest on loans and overdraft; (b) salaries and (c) travelling expenses of officials. The information that the combined amount of interest paid by the County Council on loans and overdrafts last year was approximately £60,000 must have staggered everyone and the capital debt of the County must be raised when the interest payable on it reached this enormous figure. The explanation—services have greatly increased and the big schemes must be paid for by raising loans. In this way, although tenders are paid for each scheme the final cost, with the addition of the loan interest must greatly increase the original figure and a great bulk of this money is dead.

In connection with the estimates a little typed booklet harmlessly entitled Form E was circulated and this gave some explanatory tables in connection with the general estimates.

As an ordinary layman not possessing any qualifications of financial wizardry, I went through the little booklet to see what foundation it could find to the Ratepayers claim that reductions could be made under the heads of salaries and travelling expenses. To the best of my ability I extracted the amounts allocated for both items under the various services and if you come with me now as I go through them, you may be able to form your own opinion on the case about which we have more than likely read so much already.

To simplify it as much as possible we will take the question of salaries first. The first page one of the book which is devoted to Road Services and here we have two entries in respect of salaries for the coming year—£1350 and £7300. In the sum of page you will see the amounts estimated for the Board of Assistance and Mental Hospital which are not itemised, so that we don't know what amount is allotted to salaries for these two services.

Now let us turn to travelling expenses of officials, and what we have got. In the road services section the travelling will cost £2360 for the next year while the only two under items entered as such expenses are £2500 (Health Service) and £300 (Housing Service). This makes a total of £2660 for travelling expenses and the grand total of the two items stands at £5750 for 52 weeks of the year. That is all I can do to help you to make up your minds as to whether the Ratepayers were talking through their hats or

### THE MEMORY OF THE DEAD

Annual Commemoration Easter 1954

Easter Sunday has been observed throughout the land for many years as a Day of National Commemoration when honour is paid to the memory of all who in every generation gave their lives for the Freedom of Ireland. Easter was chosen as the Day of Remembrance because in Irish history Easter week stands out as one of the most important and significant dates.

This year's Commemoration ceremony for West Waterford will be at STRADBALLY and it will include the unveiling of a Headstone at the grave of Volcan Cummins of the Stradbally Company I.R.A. who was killed fighting against the English at Ballyvoile on June 5th, 1921. This memorial headstone with curbing in Stradbally Churchyard has been erected by the local I.R.A. Committee and they are to be congratulated on their work and deserve every praise for their efforts, which got generous support from the people of the area. Without doubt they are proud of the many notable men and women from the district who down the ages were in the forefront of every phase of the National struggle. Stradbally looks to the future with pride on Sean Cummins who made the supreme sacrifice and his gallant comrades.

His peace be with the noble dead who died to free our land! And may He bless the true and brave who gave a helping hand! The glory of their deeds will endure as a watch fire round our shore. And shunt a beacon in the sky till time shall be no more!

The parade will assemble in the Square Stradbally, at 3.0 p.m. (S.T.) on Easter Sunday, April 18th 1954, and march to the Churchyard. The order will be—Colours, Band of the Dungarvan Gaelic League, Pipe Band, Old I.R.A. Bonmahon Pipe Band, G.A.A. Clubs and General Public. At the Churchyard the Chairman of the Memorial Committee will preside and the order will be—Unveiling of Memorial, Laying of wreaths, Decad, Oration, the sounding of the Last Post, will conclude. All attending the ceremony are requested when in the Churchyard to stand by the Church facing the Cummins plot and to avoid walking on graves.
