Cork's Easy Victories

Cork's junior footballers and minor hurlers registered a comfortable double over Waterford in the Munster Championships at Lismore on Sunday last. In both games, the Cork players were victorious, crenching the fairly large attendance and putting a good standard of play out of the question.

Minor Hurling

The minor hurling match opened the programme, was the more pleasant to watch, and though Waterford turned over two goals in the second half, always much more dangerous than their footballing brothers. There was never much doubt about the outcome of the football game after the first half when Cork led by 2-1 to 0-2. The play was of the scrambling variety with the winners having the best of matters in most respects.

In the matter of play the Cork minors had nothing over their opponents in the first half and a doubtful goal helped them to look better than Waterford. As the game progressed however, it became increasingly obvious that the losers' attack could not pass the Cork defence. Here Blackrock's P. Finnipot at right half-back had several goals over the Cork goalkeeper. The Cork forwards, however, were beyond saving by then and when Cork negated with another goal, the issue was well and truly clinched.

Junior Football

When P. O'Sullivan's goal saved a penalty shot from Hunt entering the last quarter the junior football match was as good as over. Waterford never recovered though it was not the fault of centre-backs B. Barrett or half-forwards T. Power and W. Kiersey that the team was not better rewarded for the day.

Substituted though the All-Ireland holders winning margin was the team as a whole was not too impressive even after allowances are made for the prevailing conditions.
