ANY GALWAY MAN AROUND
When in the last week Andy Fox New Street showed me a copy of Black's Guide to Galway and Connemara printed in 1864. Andy wants to know if any reader of this column would have its opposite number referring to the Galway and Connemara with whom he says himself he could arrange a swap for a loan or for keeps.

LAUNCHED
A motor boat was launched at Ballinagully Ring last week which I have been informed will be used by its popular owner during the summer months for fishing and pleasure trips. I am also informed that the boat has not been so far formally christened but it has been suggested that it be named the M.B. Coalition as this would fit in admirably with the name of the skipper designed by the M.B. Coalition. I am sure the owner will not agree to such a suggestion. There is also a question as to whether she will be accepted at Helvick as it is said that she has a deep draught but I am sure this minor problem can be surmounted.

ALIEN CONTROL AND PENETRATION
Sleevemansure tried to me on the above subject states: "While public men press for the recovery of our Fourth Green Field fished from us by British intrigue they overlook the fact that within the past decade, up wards of 25 acres of our best land in this country with houses, industries and other property to the value of more than (say) the Co Leitrim has passed into alien hands. New bridge-heads have been set up in the room for these, our young people have been exiled at the rate of nearly 25 000 a year. They run their holdings mainly as grass ranches and give little employment except to the following: they bring with them and who in the existing state of our silly land laws may be set as tenants establishing not alone a new plantation but a fresh landlord system. Working farmers have the slum holdings from which they endeavour to wring the nation's food supply. So that to supplement what they raise, we look to the ends of the earth from this fertile semi-peopled undeveloped country. Young people naturally drift from such agricultural slums as they do from city slums over excellent land in glen or vale bullock raising. Britain is the most wasteful farming doing least for production trade employment, revenue population, national security. And while the satellites of Brooke and Churchill come in here freely exchanging for good Irish property their bags of rapidly depreciating paper citizens of this State are barred by law from residing permanently without special licence in that part of their own country so called Carsonia. They dare not buy property or exercise the normal rights of citizenship while the National Act of 1935 and even our own Constitution offers all sorts of alien undestables such privileges. Take special note of the following from Brooke his officials and the British statutes as expounded in the London Courts by Justice Clarke. Six County Premier at Newtownbutler, on August 12th, 1949, said: "In Northern Ireland they had to pass a Bill to prevent these people coming in (that is 26 County citizens). That Bill would remain on the statute Book so long as he was Prime Minister." Previously he had publicly proclaimed that he would have no Catholics about his place while in accordance with the set policy of reducing the num-

BIGGEST DERBY DRAW SINCE 1933
Total Proceeds **£2,988,325**
Prize Fund of **£1½ Millions**
Hospitals Benefit by **£522,646**

The Irish Hospitals' Derby Sweepstakes Draw which opened at the Sweepstakes Hall Ballsbridge Dublin on Saturday May 29th, and which concluded on Monday May 31st, was the biggest draw since 1933. The £1,760,357 prize fund was also the biggest prize fund of the last sixty-eight Sweeps and exceeded that of the last Derby Draw by £276,973, and that of the Grand National this year by £19,967.

The amount available for the hospitals' fund, £736,861 was the third largest in the history of the Sweepstakes. Stamp duty to be deducted from this sum however amounts to £184,215. These details were announced by Mr J. O'Sheehan Director of Draw and Publicity before the draw on Saturday last.

He described the difficulty the Sweepstakes had in running the Derby Draw which follows closely on that of the Grand National. Only six working weeks were available to issue the details from all parts of the world and issue receipts. There are 14 units in the present Sweep. The following are the details: Total proceeds £2,988,325. Prize Fund, £1,760,357. Fourteen first prizes each £50,000. 14 second prizes each £20,000. 14 third prizes each £10,000. 322 horse prizes each £735. 2,800 cash prizes each £100. 4,200 consolation prizes each £10. 50 residual prizes each £1.607.

In the 81 Sweeps to date, the Hospitals' Fund received £30,968,54. The prize fund was £7,741,613. A total of 187,798 prizes have been drawn and there were 45,612 sellers prizes. The draw was adjourned late on Saturday night after over twelve hours, during which 3,214 tickets were drawn from the drum by relays of nurses. Mr O'Sheehan said that it has the hardest day's work they have done in 24 years of the Sweepstakes. He thanked all those associated with the draw **DREW £100 CASH PRIZES**. The lucky ticket holder in Dungarvan was Mrs O'Neill 22 Keating Street, Dungarvan, who held half a share with her father and sister holding a quarter share each.

CONFIRMATION AT RING
A hearty dead-mile-fallite was extended to the Bishop of Waterford and Lismore, Most Rev. Dr. D. Conahan on his annual visit to the Gaeltacht of Waterford to administer the Sacrament of Confirmation to thirty-three students of Ring College. At the church gates his Lordship was welcomed by Very Rev. Fr J. Corbett, P.P. Ring and Old Parish and by a large gathering of the parishioners who lined the entrance. Mass was celebrated by Rev. Fr Wall C.C., during which the sacred music was sung by specially augmented choir, with Mr Richard Dee and Mr Tim Regan as guest soloists. Before confirming the children, his Lordship the Bishop made a short address during which he paid tributes to the noble efforts of the Parish Priest, Father Corbett and to those of the curate, Father Wall. He expressed his pleasure at visiting Ring—the Gaeltacht of Waterford and in paying tribute to Ring College's congratulatory An Fear Mor and the teaching staff. Later at the College the boys and girls with their parents, were entertained by An Fear Mor. Among the children confirmed was a young girl from the parish of Ring, while the others represented Cork, Dublin, Waterford, Galway, Westport, Meath, Tipperary and Wicklow.

Appeals Against Western Board Decisions Upheld
Referees Report Rough Play

A meeting of the above was held at the C.Y.M.S. Rooms Dungarvan on Monday night last, May 31st. Mr C. Curran, Chairman presiding. Also in attendance were Messrs D. Goode, Secretary T. Pinkert C. Ware P. Fanning and a large gathering of delegates.

Referees Reports
A number of referees reports were read signed and adopted. Arising out of the game between Kill and Newtown which was played at Waterford on Sunday last the referee Mr T. Dalton Dungarvan stated in his report that the game was played in a robust manner and he had to order off the field a player from each side in the first half of the game but after warning the players severely at half-time it had the desired effect with the result that no incidents occurred in the second half. He said that there was much interference from the spectators on the sideline but those were handled in a very capable manner by Mr C. Ware, G. A. A. and others whom he would like to now to congratulate. In conclusion he stated that in the case of the Kill player who was ordered to the sideline, he thought that the Board should deal leniently with his case as he was only trying to defend himself when the incident occurred. Mr C. Ware said that it was a disgrace, and the men who could not play the game should not field out with their team. The Chairman complimented Mr Dalton on his report and said that they would start off this year on the right foot and make no exceptions. He stated that they were lucky to have a referee with courage, and he wished both players should appear before the next County Board meeting to have the matter dealt with.

Mr Dalton further stated that he would like to make it known that one player was injured during the game, and had to be removed to the Infirmary Waterford for treatment but it was due to an accident during the course of play and not during the incident as many people might think.

The Secretary then read a letter from the Secretary of the Western Board, Mr D. O'Sullivan, stating that he was unable to attend due to illness, there were two referees reports attached. These were the reports of the junior hurling games played at Dungarvan on April 25th between (1) Dungarvan and Killrossanty and (2) Brickey Rangers and Ardmore. In the report of Mr M. Pollard, Lismore, who refereed the first mentioned game it was stated that the game was played in a rough manner and on one occasion when the ball was entering the Killrossanty net an individual ran on to the pitch and tried to stop it and he later ascertained that he was M. Fendergast Killrossanty. The same person later on in the game encroached on the pitch and grabbed the ball but as the time was up he blew the final whistle and asked for the ball but was refused it. The report also stated that he hoped the Board would accede to his request and deal with the matter in a strong manner. The Chairman agreed with the report but said that there was no point in discussing the matter and the only thing to do was to have M. Fendergast appear before the Board and the matter would be dealt with. In reply to C. Ware who asked could a suspended player appear before the Board the Chairman replied that his suspension would end in July and the Board were giving him the opportunity to appear before them.
