### WHERE FOUR PARISHES MEET

It's always a sure bet if you listen you'll surely learn something and so it was in my own case the other night as I listened to a group of old-timers at Abbeyside discussing subjects of general interest.

Tom Brett was there and showed interest in a previous paragraph of mine concerning a letter from Michael Drohan of Winchester Mass U.S.A. inquiring after his relatives in Old Parish and Abbeyside. Tom is a member of a family of three brothers and one sister all of whom send regards to their American relative through this column.

When Bill Whelan spoke and talked backward to the days of the trouble when someone mentioned that a pal of his named Roche who had been ill at the local hospital had been inquiring for him Bill and his friend Roche had soldered together in Sean Moylan's column in the olden days.

Then the talk switched to local events and the same Bill Whelan asked me if I had ever seen the big rock in the locality which marks the convergence of four parishes. Naturally I displayed interest in such a matter and soon he was giving me its location.

### COUNTY WATERFORD ATHLETE WHO MET NEW SAINT

Away back in September of the year 1908 two young Irish athletes travelled to the City of Rome to take part in the Papal sports organised for that year. One was J. J. Bourke of Cappawright and the other was our own Patrick Kilgobnet of Kilmacomas who graced many of the great international athletic arenas to bring honour and glory to his home town, county and country during his young days.

The occasion of their visit to Rome was to represent Ireland in the sports which formed part of the celebrations held to mark the golden jubilee of the ordination of Pope Pius X who was recently canonised as a Saint.

The two Irishmen won five of the sprint and jumping events. They were received in audience by the Holy Father who offered them his ring to kiss.

As His Holiness was moving towards the next pilgrim, his interpreter whispered in his ears and immediately the Pope returned to the two Irish athletes and in a crowded audience chamber grasped each of them by the hand in a warm handshake in approval of his successes.

Little I'm sure did they know at the time that they were then shaking the hand of a future saint of the church and how greatly more than a simple handclasp would become as a result.

### ROCK AND SAND

Since the well-known scheme was started a few months ago at Abbeyside there has been a considerable amount of dislocation of traffic. The position is however easing somewhat as the work proceeds.

First the usual roadway to the church was torn up and then the deep scar (it must run 9 or 10 feet deep from what I saw) continued up Strandside south. It was bad enough while work was confined along these areas, but when the mechanical digger and the pneumatic drills made their way out on to the main thoroughfare at Sexton Street the problem made itself most acute and traffic jams along the narrow one-way traffic lane were frequent.

With the filling in of a good length of the deep cut and the removal of surplus materials the roadway was somewhat cleared but a slow-down in the job was experienced when a rock-vein was struck about half-way up Sexton Street. It was here the drills were brought into play but it was found necessary, in the end to blast the rock bed with dynamite in order to reach the depth required for the laying of the big sewer pipes.

Further up from this rock-vein things became easier for the excavators, once the hard crust of the road surface was pierced, as an almost sandy loam was met.

As I have already stated no one will be sorry when this big job is finished but before I end my reference to it I want to criticise the action of some section of the engineering staff of the Department of Posts and

Telegraphs who cut the road at the corner of Strandside and Sexton Street. When they filled in the cut, it sank some inches within a couple of days and in some cases could not have done their vehicles much good. Surely it is not too much to expect when cuts such as these are made especially on arterial roads that those responsible for them should attend to them in a proper and efficient manner in the case I refer to I am sure that it was not due anyway to lack of sufficient workmen as I have invariably noticed that no work is done on the road until the job is small the job being undertaken by this branch of our public service that paucity in the number of men engaged can be complained about.

Since penning the above lines I have received a letter referring to the above lines and it has happened so often in the past that there has been a big time-lag in doing this necessary work. I think it is a fair and reasonable criticism.

### HOME FROM AMERICA

Presently the children of provision stores in the States, first emigrated 24 years ago but was back on holidays 6 years ago. He is the son of Mrs. M. Wade of Cappawright, and the late Mr. Phillip Wade and brother of Messrs. Danny Tommy Michael Phillip and John Wade.

During World War II he served in the American Army in the European theatre of operations and saw much active service being wounded in Italy.

Mr. and Mrs. Wade who have already been here about a month will not return to America until August and on behalf of all their friends in Dungarvan and elsewhere I wish them a very happy holiday.

Dungarvan Urban Council adjourned their usual meeting for a period of ten minutes on last Friday night as a mark of respect to the late Mrs. Nora Boland Sexton Street Abbeyside, Dungarvan whose regretted death occurred last week. The late Mrs. Boland was sister of the late Maurice Griffin who was a member of the Urban Council for many years.

Proposing the adjournment, Deputy T. J. Kyne said that the Council should adjourn as a mark of respect to the husband and relative of the late Mrs. Boland and should convey their deepest sympathy to them in the bereavement they have sustained. He said it was not necessary for him to say who the late Mrs. Griffin family of Abbeyside were as they had long connections with National and Local Affairs and were one of the oldest families in the locality. The late Mrs. Boland's brother the late Maurice Griffin had added, given a lifetime as a trojan worker as a member of the Council.

Mr. Kelly seconding said that there was nothing he could add beyond that Mrs. Boland's death was very much deeply regretted. The Chairman and Mr. Lee also associated themselves with the expression of the sympathy which was passed in silence and the Council then adjourned as stated.

### Other Resolutions of Sympathy

The Council voted sympathy to Mr. N. Kelly on the death of his uncle to Mrs. Liam Morrissey, Dungarvan, on the death of her aunt to Mrs. Terry, Cahal Place, on the death of her daughter and on the relatives of the late Missy Donnelly Abbeyside.

## DUNGARVAN U.D.C. RENTS OF RECONSTRUCTED HOUSES

### HARBOUR GRANT OFFER "WOULDN'T BRING DREDGER TO POOL"

Mr. T. Lannen Chairman, presided at the fortnightly meeting of the Dungarvan Urban Council held at the Town Hall on last Friday night. Also present were Messrs. N. Kelly Deputy Mayor, T. Lee and later T. McCarthy and Mr. Deery, Town Clerk and Mr. P. Walsh Acting Borough Surveyor were in attendance.

Infested With Woodworm  
M. P. Lyons, 47 Congress Villas came before the Council to complain that repairs to his house had not been carried out. He said that one room was completely uninhabitable as the boards in it were all worm rotted and his furniture was being destroyed as a result. He said that something should be done about it without delay.

The Engineer was directed to inspect the house.

### Rents of Reconstructed Houses

Mr. Lee handed in a letter which he said, had been sent to Miss M. Daly an elderly woman living in a condemned house in Wolfe Tone Road stating that she would be housed in one of the newly reconstructed houses at Shandon.

Mr. Lee said that this woman's rent was only 10/- a week and the rent which she was asked to pay for the new house (with rates) was almost 9/- a week. It was unfair to ask such a rent from this woman when in cases of where there was evident need of doing so. It was ridiculous he said, to ask a person to pay almost three-fourths of her income in rent.

The Chairman said that the suggestion of the Chairman it was decided to defer the matter.

Disinfection of Second Hand Clothes  
With regard to a point raised by Mr. Lee at a previous meeting concerning the disinfection of second-hand clothes before re-sale the Clerk read a letter from the County Medical Officer which stated that there were no arrangements for the disinfection of such clothes bought in Ireland for re-sale. When an outbreak of disease occurs, however, the letter added that steps are then taken to disinfect the clothes affected and destroyed.

Deputy Mayor said that the sum total of the County M.O.'s letter was that there was, in fact, no disinfection of such clothes and the letter was only putting the best face possible on the matter by stating that steps were taken when there was an outbreak of disease where people died of TB it often happened that the clothes could be sold before the person actually died. The matter he added was no reflection on the County Council as it was one of the Government and he said that he would take it up again.

In the absence of Mr. Keane it was decided to defer further discussion on the matter.

Offer of Land for Housing  
With regard to the offer by Messrs. E. Spratt & Son Auctioneers on behalf of the executors of the estate of the late Michael and Patrick Ryan Mitchell Street, Dungarvan, of nine and a half acres of land suitable for housing at Gallowhill, the Engineer reported that the site might prove a difficult one to drain. He estimated that between 100 and 120 houses might be accommodated on the site which he added had much to commend it. He recommended that the land would be worth £150 per acre.

A report of the County Manager stated that having regard to prices for land paid for sites at Abbeyside and Caseville that an offer of £1750 be made.

It was stated that the site included about half acre on which stood the Gallowhill mound.

Mr. Lee said that no one would touch this site as there were strange stories told about a man who interfered with it before.

Deputy Mayor said that while he had no objection to the site in question, he thought it was a awful thing to see a place like Bohernatra going idle. Houses could be built there he said for working men which would be convenient to their work, but the idea seemed to be to build these houses farther and farther out from the town.

with the result that there would have to be bus service to bring the men to work soon.

Deputy Mayor referring to available sites in Abbeyside said that he thought there were sufficient for 50 houses there.

The Engineer said that he had been inspecting the sites mentioned by Mr. Kyne at Abbeyside during the previous week and the maximum, he estimated there was 30 houses.

Deputy Mayor added that if the Bohernatra site was bought it could be developed (roads, sewers and water laid) by money from relief grants and this would have the very desirable effect of keeping down the rents of the houses to be built eventually. It was the only way he saw in which to tackle the housing problem.

Finally it was agreed to make an offer for the land offered by Messrs. Spratt.

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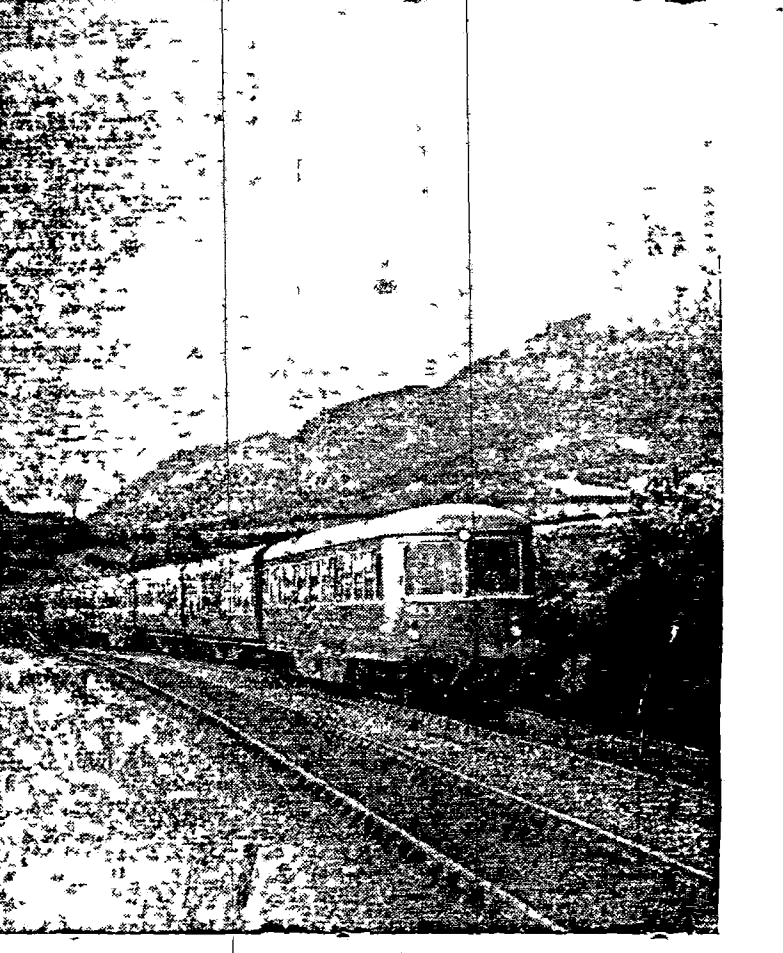

### POTATO SPRAYING

The timely spraying of the potato crop for the prevention of blight cannot be over emphasized as an early attack of the disease can reduce the yield considerably or even result in complete failure. It is foolish to neglect the operation because of the prospects of continuing fine weather as this often results in disappointment.

The older types of spraying mixtures are still commonly used, but their place is gradually being taken by proprietary substances where the fungicidal mixture is used the Copper Sulphate and Washing Soda should be dissolved in separate vessels and mixed immediately before application. Dissolving the Washing Soda in boiling water is not advisable. The mixture should under no circumstances be left overnight as it loses much of its potency and may even cause damage to the plants. The effects of the proprietary substances are not as lasting because they do not stick to the plant as well. They have, however, the advantage of ease of application in trials so far carried out it was found that three sprayings with the proprietary substances gave the same results as two sprayings with Burgundy mixture.

All blights occur each year from the planting of diseased tubers. It does not live in the soil from one season to the next. These diseased tubers may die in the ground before sprouting or may send up stalks through which the disease travels to the foliage. The disease spreads from this diseased foliage to healthy plants. Moisture is necessary for this spread hence the occurrence of blight in damp weather. The disease first appears as purplish-black spots on the tips of the leaflets. Its progress depends on climatic conditions but eventually the whole leaflet becomes withered and although the disease spreads to the stems it does not pass through them to the tubers but is washed down by rain. Hence a good mounding will go far in preventing tubers near the surface from becoming blighted.

It is just as important to have a crop well sprayed towards the end of the growing season as during the early stages of growth. The appearance of late blight can play havoc with a crop which had not been sprayed a short time previously. Such a crop becomes affected quietly because conditions are usually damper at that time of year and dew remains up till midday.

A crop which is not for immediate consumption should not be lifted until at least a fortnight after the complete death of the

tops as the disease can survive for that period in the soil and the tubers will become infected when the tubers are cut. The disease shows up in the form of brown spots and blight can be distinguished from other diseases in that these spots always have a connection with the surface of the tuber. Such tubers usually develop a wet or dry rot depending on the conditions under which they are stored and if left for any length of time become useless. Covering the cut tubers with blight foliage will also cause tuber infection and should be avoided at all costs.
