ATHLETES OF RENOWN
 Recently I came across an article on the great athlete Feis of the late Sergeant Bill Shanahan of Ballinacorney Tipperary written by William Dooley in which the names of most of the big guns in Irish Athletics during the past half-century were mentioned. One of the greatest of our all-round athletes, Bill Shanahan was one of the stars of the great club which brought honour and renown to the Dublin Metropolitan Garda Force. In 1917 at the age of twenty he contested the Irish high jump championship for the first time, and was only beaten for the crown by a fraction of an inch but his disappointment did not last long for in the following year he made the national gold medal his own. Up to and following the early 1920s his best mark was 5 feet 11 inches and with the coming of the great Larry Stanley of Liffade who reached 6 feet 3 inches at the Tallinn Games in 1924 it looked as if Shanahan's star had set. However, the sceptics were rudely awakened when Shanahan cleared 6 feet 1 inch in 1926 and in the following year when he crossed the lath at 6 feet 2 inches to tie with Garda Con O'Connor of Kerry for the Championship.

Besides prowess at the high jump he was Irish Champion in the long jump 12 yards hurdles and in the Decathlon (ten all-round events). His best long jump was 22 feet 9 inches and in the hop-step-and-jump 44 feet 9 inches. He represented Ireland in many international contests and was always noted for his coolness and unruffled manner no matter how important the occasion. How Bill Shanahan and his friend Davy Fogarty of Killeacle found their calculations upset on one occasion and by a Ballinacorney man is recorded in the following paragraph of the article.

Thirty years ago Shanahan and Davy Fogarty from Killeacle Tipperary went to Dungarvan. Before they started they assumed Davy would be first and Bill second in the three standing jumps. Following two rounds of the test the placings were that way with the others nowhere when a small man, wearing a hat and coat, came to the pitch and asked them if there was any objection to his competing and Davy and Bill feeling there was nothing in the world to affect their placings replied in a loud fashion, "No, they had no objection." The small man then doffed the hat, took off his clothes, having togs underneath and in his first effort covered 34 feet to beat both more than a foot. He was Pat Power of Ballinacorney Waterford. Pat is still to the good.

Other names of the great ones of the past which appeared in the article were Davy Bernham, Pat O'Callaghan, Pat Davin, T. F. Kiely, and Paddy Anglim men who were the cream of the land in their time and who kept the Irish flag flying in many an international athletic arena—now with the passage of years their names are but memories which whisper to us the glories of the great ones of the past.

For the ten successful candidates—to be decided by oral tests to be held at Waterford City and Dungarvan—there will be three weeks at Ballinacorney with every facility possible available. Added to this each scholarship holder will receive an allowance of £2 10s to cover travelling expenses and incidentals so that nothing has been overlooked. Now all you young hurlers and footballers, my advice is that should you hear nothing official from the Secretary of days get in touch with him yourself and say that you are interested. If you fail to get the necessary information you require from him, drop a line to either of the divisional secretaries or to the County Secretary, who I am informed will only be too pleased to forward on the necessary application forms.

The date of the oral tests will be notified in due course and the ten successful candidates will then be all set to spend their holiday at Ballinacorney during the 3rd August and the 27th both days inclusive.

WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL
OPERATION OF DIFFERENTIAL RENT SYSTEM
ALLEGATION THAT RENTS WERE REDUCED ON POLLING DAY
WATER AND HOUSING SCHEMES DISCUSSED

Mr M Morrissey, Chairman, presided at the adjourned annual meeting of the above held in Dungarvan on Monday last. Also present were Messrs. T. Kyne, T. J. Fahey, D. Leahy, O. O'Malley, T. N. Walsh, M. O'Grady, T. Morrissey, Senator J. Butler, M. Hart, W. Fitzgerald, J. Kirwan, F. Roche, W. Kenneally, T. D. Rowley, N. Kelly, J. Mansfield, T. Heslin, L. Morrissey and P. Butler.

Messrs J. Ormond, Chief Assistant Engineer, D. Doyle, Housing Engineer, Dr O'Farrell, County M. O. E. Keyes, Staff Officer, and J. G. Dowling, Secretary, were in attendance. Null and Void.

Arising from the minutes of the last meeting Mr T. Morrissey said that the resolution passed the last day deciding that a new Younghall Bridge be built at Ardsallagh was null and void as the previous decision of the Council approving of the appointment of a further Consultant to advise on the feasibility of reconstructing the existing bridge had not been rescinded.

Senator Butler agreed that this was so. Deputy Ormond said that he did not think it was necessary to maintain night telephone calls as the Consultant had reported that reconstruction was not feasible.

Mr T. Morrissey asked why they should now go against the matter and against the wishes of the people of Younghall and West Waterford. Senator Butler said that in his opinion the resolution passed at the last meeting was premature as they had not had the full report of the Consultant before them.

Mr Leahy—We had as far as the reconstruction of the existing bridge was concerned, but we had not had the full report of the Consultant before them. Senator Butler—I think we should wait until we get the final report. Mr Walsh—Why wait for the Consultant's report when the question of reconstruction was done today about it, but it will come up again at a later date.

The matter was then deferred. **Gaeltacht Road Grant**—Arising from a notification by the Department of a grant of £50,000 towards road works in the Ring and Old Parish areas for 1954/55. Mr Walsh said that they should request the Department to make larger grants available for Waterford than in other counties in the province. A resolution covering the point was passed.

Arising from levels Mr Mansfield said that a pump had been previously approved but because the residents had difficulty with wells before they now wanted a piped supply. However, the cost was high and it would serve only portion of the area. The County Medical Officer said that while at the intake would undoubtedly be a pump might meet the demands.

Several members said that it was a question of deciding as to the levels at the intake. Mr Doyle (Engineer) said that the levels at the intake were higher than the reservoir and if the branch line to Grange School was taken at the higher level it might work. Mr Doyle, when asked said he would have a report on the matter for next meeting.

With regard to the Ballybrann extension it was decided to ask the Department what the cost of the work estimated at £2,100 and the question of the Ballinacorney extension was deferred to give Mr Mansfield an opportunity of discussing it again with the local residents.

Well At Monalunery—With reference to the Holy Well at Monalunery a letter from Bord Fáilte stated that they were not prepared to take any action with regard to the request for a grant towards repairing the road estimated to cost £5,000. Mr Mansfield said that repairs were badly needed and he had decided to get the local farmers to apply for a grant under the Rural Improvements Scheme.

Armore Public Lighting—With reference to the amount of £150 provided in the Estimate towards the public lighting of Armore a quotation from the E.S.B. stated that the supply and erection of six 200 watt bulbs on existing poles in the village would cost £75 while their annual maintenance would amount to £4 10s. 0d. If a time switch was required it would cost £14 10s. extra and the total cost including current for the year would be £115 to provide lights at the Council's houses at Farranagarrat and Duffcarrig a further £65 would be required making a total cost of £180.

Proposing that the additional £25 be provided with the £150 in the estimates to meet the cost Mr Mansfield said that the E.S.B. should be requested to provide lights for the people and the extra amount was not big. Deputy Ormond seconded the resolution which was passed. Mr Roche said that the attention of the E.S.B. should be drawn towards the operation of their time switches as he said it was an awful thing to see the lights on all day in some cases while they were off all night.

"BULL GROG" RESPONSIBLE FOR MAN'S DEATH

Death From Excessive Drinking

Mr Jones city coroner, held an inquest yesterday in a public house in Great Britain Street on the body of David Keefe, a cooper, 26 years of age who resided in the same neighbourhood. Jeremiah Lacey was the first witness called. He deposed - I am a cooper and worked with the deceased in a public house on Tuesday he went to dinner I saw him on his return half-an-hour afterwards. He was then quite steady, I was called away from the cooperage to the spirit store about a quarter to three and when I came back again I found the deceased drunk. Efforts were made to revive him by slapping his face with a wet cloth and he came to. He was taken to his father-in-law's house in Great Britain Street and Dr Carby of the North Infirmary was sent for. To Mr Blake - The men had no means of procuring whiskey in the store except by draining the barrels in the barrels there might sometimes be a pint or a quart of liquor. This liquor is called "bull grog" or "old cows milk" (laughter) or "bull grog". I am a publican and I can tell you 'tis very little "bull grog" I send back to the company whiskey is too dear to be wasting it like that, (renewed laughter). To the Coroner - I did not see the deceased take any drink. Edward Carbery, cooper, deposed - He saw the deceased when he came back from dinner and that he was then quite sober he saw him again at half-past four and he seemed to be drunk he was not unsteady and he came to when he was taken to the infirmary at him (the witness) He did not see the deceased drink anything that day in the morning he noticed "bull grog" in a tub in the yard. I drunk some of it myself he added "but I can say if deceased took any of it". To Mr Blake - The cooperage is so large that one man might drink "bull grog" without another perceiving him. LABOUR COURT IN DUNGARVAN

The Labour Court investigated a wage claim submitted by the Amalgamated Transport and General Workers Union on all the Dungarvan Merchants when it sat at the Town Hall, Dungarvan on Tuesday last.

The Union was represented by Mr G Lynch National Organiser, Deputy T A Kynne, and Mr P J Breen Branch Secretary.

The Merchants were represented by Mr C O'Regan, Federated Union of Employers, Deputy Kynne, presenting the case for the workers, stated that the Union submitted an application for an increase of wages on all the Merchants of Dungarvan, on the 4th December, 1953.

During the last six months increased wages had been granted to Agricultural workers and County Council workers, and Dungarvan Urban Council workers, while no increase has been given the general workers of Dungarvan.

The existing wage rates show an increase on the 1953 level which is very considerably greater than either the increase in the cost of living or the average increase in wages generally over the same period.
