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DUNGARVAN U.D.C. MOVE TO PURCHASE PRIORY HOUSE REJECTED. BOREENATRA SITE TO BE ACQUIRED.

Mr. T. Lannen, Chairman, presided at a meeting of the County Council held in the Town Hall, Dungarvan, on last Friday night. Also present were Messrs P. Casey, M. Keane, T. McCarthy, N. Kelly, R. Walsh, T. Lee and T. K. O'Donnell. Messrs P. Walsh, Borough Surveyor, and E. Deery, Town Clerk, were in attendance.

Mr. Lee referring to the figure of £1,800 said that this was a terrible price for a bit of land that was got for a couple of hundred pounds a few years ago. Deputy Kyne said that it would be better to acquire the site and let the arbitrator who would be sent down and who would know his job decide what the land was worth.

Mr. Keane—That would be £900 an acre. Mr. Casey then asked how many acres were being offered in the advertisements asking people who wanted houses to apply. Mr. Lee—21 replies were received.

Mr. Casey—Well we have 72 derelict sites around the town and I suggest you develop those first before you acquire any more land. Some of the houses to be built would be small 3-roomed houses.

Mr. Casey—Well if you have decided to do one you can't refuse the other two. Deputy Kyne—That's right. Mr. Casey—Then that's a penny in the 2 for the three.

Mr. Casey—That £14,000 spent over there was throwing money away. The scheme was not wanted and I was always against it.

provide a second water tank at Deelishan, on the application of Mr. Farke, agreed to approve the necessary expenditure of £50 to provide the tank. The Engineer stated that when this had been provided all the Council's responsibility in the matter would cease.

A letter from the Department of Agriculture in reply to the Council's request for the names of the two Dutch Engineers who had carried out the preliminary survey of the Western Bay stated that as the Engineers in question were civil servants of the Netherlands Government who had been loaned to this country for certain land reclamation work, they were not available.

Deputy Kyne said that he still thought the Council should press this scheme and they should get the Cork Harbour Engineer, if he was available to inspect the Western Bay and give his opinion as to the advisability of the building of a dam on the harbour proper and the approximate cost.

Deputy Kyne said that all they would require was a rough idea of the cost and whether the scheme would have any effect on silting the harbour. He did not think that the Engineer's cost for a day or two to do this work was excessive.

Dread Eel Worm Is Crisis For Beetgrowers Outbreak Discovered In County Waterford

The dreaded root eel-worm has been discovered in the Ballynacourty area of Dungarvan, an area noted for its exceptionally good yields.

Mr E Dwan, Beetgrowers' Association (Mallow Branch) president and succeeded Mr Glavin at the meeting.

Mr Glavin stated that whenever he had reason to appeal for co-operation from the farmers of the Dungarvan area, he always received it and now that a serious position had arisen it was his wish that it would be given to the limit.

RECOGNISING WORM The eel-worm is a small worm visible only to the naked eye as a cyst adhering to roots of beet and other plants.

Mr Glavin pointed out that the whole cause of the trouble was bad rotation of crops. The most important cause of heavy eel-worm infestation was the growing of susceptible crops such as beet fodder, beet mangolds, turnips, kale, rape, cabbage, cauliflower Brussels sprouts, frequently in the same ground.
