BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT with PENSMAN

£5,000 NEEDED. I was present at the very enjoyable social held at the Presentation Convent Dungarvan, for the Committee and promoters of the Presentation Non-Stop Draw on Thursday night of last week. When all present had been most enjoyably entertained, a short dance and sing-song followed which was thoroughly enjoyed by all.

Following the supper, Veni Ardree, J. P. V. F. who presided, thanked the Rev. Mother and Community for their marvellous hospitality. He then went on to deal with the object of the Non-Stop Draw. He said that the Presentation Community in Dungarvan had the big task of raising £5,000 for renovations and extensions in their schools to comply with the requirements of the Department of Education.

CHANGING OF HEART. Act of Waterford County Committee of Agriculture in dealing with their estimates for the next financial year, on Monday, 20th September, 1954, decided by 5 votes to 4 to stick to their existing rate of 63d. and not to approach the County Council for the additional farthing to bridge the £550 gap between income and expenditure.

Act II—Waterford County Committee of Agriculture in dealing with the same estimates on Monday, 13th October 1954 decided by 6 votes to 5 to go to the County Council and ask for the additional farthing to bridge the gap.

WATERFORD BOARD OF PUBLIC ASSISTANCE

Revision Of Dispensary Districts To Be Considered

Local Suppliers And Workmen Should Get Preference

Mr M. Cullen, Chairman, presided at the monthly meeting of the above held in Dungarvan on Monday last. Messrs P. J. Butler, D. Heskin, M. Morrissey and F. Roche, were also present.

Messrs S. J. Moynihan Co. Manager, J. Hynes, Secretary, and J. O'Connell, Accountant, were in attendance.

Revision of Dispensary Districts.

A letter submitted by Deputy Mayor Mr T. Healy, Grange, requested the setting up of a dispensary depot at Grange. The letter pointed out that at present the people of Grange have to travel miles when they require the services of a doctor or nurse, and the latter reside in Ardmore. The letter was also signed by a big number of people in the Grange area.

Turf—Must Have Got "Mint" Of Money

When Senator Butler asked if there was any report on the matter of turf supplies, the Secretary said that he had just received the report from the Engineer, who had been on a tour recently.

The report stated that the average weekly consumption at (a) Co. Home Dungarvan was 18 1/2 tons, and (b) Co. Hospital, Waterford was 3 tons.

The maximum covered storage at the Co. Home, was 400 tons, and at the Co. Hospital, 100 tons. The report added that the cost of handling the Co. Council hand-won turf had been high at 12/6 per ton, but that the cost per ton of the machine won turf had been estimated at 10/- per ton, and the additional information would be available for the next meeting.

Revision At Waterford City

With reference to the Board's decision to appoint an additional dispensary doctor at Waterford City, the Board accepted a suggestion that a conference be held on the question of revising the dispensary districts there. The conference will be attended by the County Managers, Doctors, McCarthy, and Shelly, the Engineer, Secretary, and Waterford City members of the Board.

Referring to contracts for supplying the Board's hospitals, Mr Heskin asked if it was true that a Dublin firm was supplying provisions to the Lismore Hospital.

A Special meeting of the County Board G.A.A. was convened in the G.Y.M. Hall, Dungarvan, on Thursday night of last week for 8.30 p.m. The Board agenda were (1) To consider developments arising out of the County Board decision on Stradbally-Western Board appeal, and (2) To consider referee's report on the Senior Football Final.

The keen interest displayed in the meeting was evident from the large gathering present at the meeting time approached, but as time moved on and the Chairman and Secretary of the Board had not put in an appearance there was much speculation as to whether any meeting would be held.

Chairman's Absence Can Only Surmise

Mr Fanning asked if anything would be done at the meeting which was held at the last meeting. Were they there to try and change or justify the decision or to criticise the statement to the Press by the referee.

Mr Fanning said that Mr Curran obviously considered the matter important when he called a special meeting, but in Mr Curran's absence he said that the conducting of the meeting was almost impossible as they could only surmise what was in his mind in calling the meeting.

Change Of Heart

Mr Fanning—Perhaps the Chairman having read the additional statement of the referee thinks the matter should be further discussed but what was actually in his mind in calling this meeting I don't know. Mr Walsh said that he was sorry but he would have to contradict the Chairman on that point. Mr Connolly referring to the minutes pointed out that a vote was taken on that point.

Mr Walsh - I second that with great pleasure. I am sure all this was gone into the last day. Mr Hartly said that as all the schemes they had were beneficial to the farmers they should be left hand.

Mr Walsh then put Mr Heskin's motion that the horse breeding scheme (estimated to cost £340) which was deleted at last meeting, be restored.

On a vote Messrs Heskin, Harry, Walsh, Dower, Morrissey, Mr Butler, Messrs Leary and Messrs Leary, Fahy and McGrath (3) voted against.

The Chairman accordingly decided that this scheme be restored to the estimates. The Committee then proceeded to go through the entire estimate again.

Mr Hartly suggested that a percentage be cut from each scheme in order to effect the required economy.

Mr Morrissey - Why not cut out the Fox Destruction Scheme (£214) altogether. I see where a total of £303 each at 5/- each were killed last year.

Mr Leary said that with the spread of myxomatosis, rabbits would be out and the foxes would be their food.

Mr Mi Morrissey, Chairman of the County Waterford Shepherders' Association, said that it was the case of sporty livelihood. The shepherders had suffered a great deal during the past year and he had seen groups of four and five foxes together killing lambs during the lambing season.

Mr Leary said that the County Council should continue to do the best of the mountain man would be done out of a livelihood and be wiped away. He also mentioned an agreement reached 6 years ago between the hunters and shepherders to combine to kill 50 per cent each of the cost of killing foxes in the mountain areas, but the hunters had never given one penny on that agreement.

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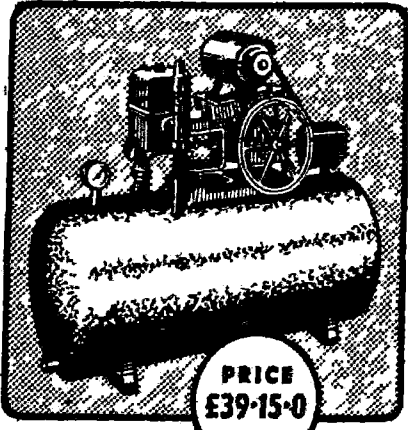

Shortly after his death the voice of Garrett was heard by some of his old followers asking for a boat to bring his body back to Templemichael. Fearing the anger of Cromwell, to do anything openly in the matter they decided to bring back the body to Templemichael and bury it there by night. However, all the boats were under control of the strangers and their only chance to bring back their burden would be to construct a boat. With this object in view they set out to build a boat in the river and week later the remains of Garrett Fitzgerald were buried at Templemichael. The boat was used for fishing and many another corpse was brought to the river and buried, and so the story goes and we may well believe it that the owners never charged a penny

Do You Remember?—The following has been copied from an old copy of the "Clonmel Chronicle," which we found in an old cupboard. The date of the paper is Saturday May 19th 1934. "A splendid Win-Waterford's Big Margin—Junior Hurlers' Triumph—Waterford defeated Kerry in the Munster Junior Hurling Championship at Mallow on Sunday. It was a day when a strong wind in the afternoon made the conditions early attacking and had an early goal in the opening minutes per J Murphy. The Kerry goal minder was again tested, but brought off a remarkable clearance. The Kerry backs were having a busy time of it with a continual flow of hard shots from all quarters of the Waterford forward line. Morrissey, the Kerry centre-forward, made a mistake when he got possession from a ruck, to send over a high point. Immediately after the Waterford forwards got moving and J Murphy sent through a shot which was the better of the two. A determined breakaway by Kerry put M. Sullivan in a scoring position, but S. Reidy, the Waterford goalie, ran out to beat him and sent play to the other end of the field. Kerry again got moving and had the hard luck in not scoring, M. Connor being tackled by J Walsh when about to shoot a certain goal. After the puck-out P Sheehan put the Waterford forwards in a new mood after a scientific piece of hurling. J Murphy then the Kerry goalkeeper all ends up. The Kingdom again looked dangerous but a wild shot by J Moran, sent the ball across the line. Two points in quick succession followed for Waterford per W Sheehan. A free chance for Kerry resulted as Morrissey, raising the white flag after a few wild exchanges, rushed the Waterford posts.
