with PENSMAN

**ONE HUNDRED GOLDEN YEARS**  
The decision of the Dungarvan Urban Council to present to the Mercy Convent Community on behalf of the people of Dungarvan an illuminated address to mark their centenary on November 21st will be received by all the townspeople with the utmost pleasure.

It is not my intention to deal with the history of this great Order since they came to Dungarvan 100 years ago as the invited space at my disposal would entirely preclude that. It would take volumes to cover it adequately and all I can do is congratulate the Rev. Mother and Community on this very auspicious birthday.

The Nuns of the Mercy have worked quietly and unostentatiously for a century educating the youth of the Old Boro. Our children are attending their schools now just as the parents, grandparents and our forebears did 100 years ago. The teaching facilities available are second to none and the records points in glowing letters to the magnificent service rendered to the community. Not only in the schools have the girls been nurtured, dedicated their lives but also in our local hospitals in alleviating the sufferings of the sick and dying. It must be a great pleasure for the Community to have the great Mercy Nuns celebrating their centenary in a tradition which their predecessors have laid down over these hundred golden years.

Therefore the people of the Old Boro will rejoice and join in the heartiest of the little celebrations next week to mark the occasion, one of which will be the staging of a beautiful 3 act play "The Message of Lourdes" by the pupils of the convent which will be produced in the Friary Hall on Sunday, Tuesday and Wednesday nights, November 21st, 23rd and 24th.

As I have said already I am sure that I am only voicing the sentiments of the people in general in extending warmest congratulations to our Mercy Nuns and to wish them ad multos annos and a superabundance of the Blessings of God and His Blessed Mother on the continuation of their great work in the years that lie ahead.

**TELEPHONE KIOSK**  
I have been informed that a telephone kiosk is going to be placed at Abbeyside at last. The question of providing such a facility for the people of Abbeyside was first raised at a local Urban Council meeting by Deputy Tom Kyne many years ago but the matter seemed to have got lost in the doldrums since. Now it is coming to the forefront again and when I interviewed the Postmaster at Dungarvan, Mr. M. Hynes, during the week he informed me that my information was correct and that it was intended to start work on the project without further delay.

When the kiosk was to be placed he told me that it was originally intended to have it on the site of the condemned house at the Sexton Street-Sarsfield Street junction. It was decided to have it erected at the village end of the Causeway across the road from the Strand Cafe. I am sure the news that the kiosk is going up will be well received by my readers in Abbeyside and area, as it will mean that in future when they want to make a 'phone call, day or night, that they won't have to come to tramping across the Causeway, sometimes in pelting rain and howling wind.

**WATERFORD BOARD OF PUBLIC ASSISTANCE**  
**Plans For County Hospital Reconstruction Approved**  
**Consumption Of Turf In Institutions**

In the absence of the Chairman Mr. T. Callaghan, Vice-Chairman presided at the monthly meeting of the above held in Dungarvan on Monday last. Messrs T. Kyne, T. D. R. Barron, J. Browne, N. Kelly, Senator J. Butler, F. Roche, D. Heskin and W. Kennelly, T.D. were present.

Messrs S. J. Moynihan, Co. Manager, Clonville, Accountant, P. Phelan, Supt. Assistant, and J. Hynes, Secretary, were in attendance.

**Local Tradesmen.**  
With reference to the points raised by Mr. Heskin concerning the employment of local tradesmen for work at Lismore District Hospital, a report from the Engineer, Mr. Conway, stated that it was the policy at all times to employ local men to do the work where they were available to do the work efficiently and skillfully. The report added that in the case of plumbing, local plumbers do not contract, and in the case of joinery some of the work of assembling is done at the workshops in Dungarvan, but is put in by the men in Lismore.

Mr. Heskin said that he did not agree with the work done by local men as stated and he again said that local tradesmen should get a chance when they were available to do the work.

The Board agreed that the matter was fully covered by the Engineer's report.

**Turf Consumption**  
Reporting on the turf consumption in the Board's Institutions as referred to at previous meetings by Senator Butler the Engineer reported as follows -  
County Home and District Hospital, Dungarvan, 20 7/8 tons turf at £3 18s 6d per ton per week, 13 1/2 tons firewood at £2 9s 9d per ton per week, 8 tons Anthracite at £10 per ton. No coal was purchased or used.

District Hospital, Lismore - 50 tons turf (per year), 25 1/2 tons firewood (per year), 5 tons anthracite (per year).  
County Hospital, Waterford (per week) - 13 1/2 tons turf, 3 3/8 tons firewood, 1 1/2 tons coal, 25 anthracite, 163 tons coal, 25 anthracite, 163 tons coal, 72 tons turf and 3 tons coal. The total weekly average for all - 36 1/4 tons turf, 5 3/8 tons firewood, 2 3/8 tons anthracite, and 1 1/2 tons coal.

Mr. Browne referred to the poor quality of the turf at the County Hospital at present. The Secretary said that this was some old stuff that was being burned with the new stuff in order to get rid of it.

Mr. Heskin said that he had always advocated that a turf should have been sold by measure and not by weight and if this had been done a number of men in rural areas would still be employed in turf production. The County Manager said that all the turf being supplied by Bord na Mona was of good quality.

Senator Butler said that according to the Engineer's report 4,000 tons of turf had been purchased of which about 70 tons were left. The inference from that report was that the rest had been used. This was not so. I wonder he asked, if the Engineer would give us the percentage of waste, the cost of that, what happened it and the cost of getting rid of it. The report stated that 4,000 tons of turf were purchased but it does not say that 4,000 tons were used. I wouldn't be surprised if the waste amounted to 50% and for that reason the report does not convey much to the public. The Chairman said that all they could do now was to look to the future.

Senator Butler concluded the discussion by saying that if it was the policy not to use coal then no coal should be used anywhere. There should not be a turf fire in a ward and a roaring coal fire in another ward at the hospital.

**DUNGARVAN CIRCUIT COURT**  
**WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION CASES**  
**DECREE FOR YOUGHAL CONTRACTOR**

The Michaelmas Sittings of the Dungarvan and Lismore Circuit Court was held before his Lordship, Judge Roe, in the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Tuesday and Wednesday last. Counsel were Messrs Spragg and Ankle.

Michael McCarthy, County Council worker Ardmorene Killrossary was plaintiff in a Workmen's Compensation Act, against Waterford County Council, arising from an accident at Kilmilnion Quarry, Stradbally, on September 14th, 1952 in which he twisted his ankle and which he claimed had never got well since.

In reply to Mr. G. Clarke, B.L. (instructed by Messrs F. D. Keane, solicitors plaintiff, in evidence said that on September 14th 1952, he was sieging stones at the quarry at Kilmilnion, Stradbally, when the Overseer, Michael Hayes, Workmen's Compensation Act, against Waterford County Council, arising from an accident at Kilmilnion Quarry, Stradbally, on September 14th, 1952 in which he twisted his ankle and which he claimed had never got well since.

Dr. Quinn in evidence said that at present beyond what the plaintiff complained of he could find nothing wrong with the foot. McCarthy said that he was a nervous type of man and he did not think he was fit for work due to his psychic reaction to the accident as he suffered from traumatic neurosis.

Dr. O'Driscoll, Waterford, for the respondents, said that the X-Rays of the ankle which he took showed that there had been a fracture of the bone and he was of opinion that plaintiff was fit for work.

Summing up, his Lordship said that he had been impressed by the man as he gave his evidence. The Lordship awarded a decree for £40 to Denis O'Callaghan Builder and Contractor, Gurtroe Youghal, in his claim for £48 8d against John Slaney, Glendine, Youghal, for labour and materials supplied by plaintiff to defendant in the erection of a bungalow in the months of August to November 1953.

Mr. Lovatt-Dolan B.L. (Messrs Murray & Co. solicitors) was for plaintiff and Mr. G. Clarke B.L. (instructed by Mr. Macnamara solr.) was for defendant.

The defence was a denial that any money was due to plaintiff for work and materials and that there was a counter-claim for £108 13s 0d.

Denis O'Callaghan in evidence said that in August, 1953, defendant came to him about building of a four-roomed house. He agreed to erect the outside and partition walls and the chimney breasts on a time basis. Slaney was to supply the materials and was to work on the job with his man, and was to supply the castings for the concrete.

Plaintiff went on to say that he carried on the work as far as he could but due to the lack of sufficient casting the work was held up. Slaney had also failed to make payments to him as promised on foot of the account due. He then stopped working on the house. During this time he had supplied concrete blocks, etc. and the only payments Slaney made were two £5 notes and one £10 note, which left a balance of £24 10s 0d.

**Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee**  
**No Increase In Financial Scheme**  
**Crux Over Painting Tenders**

Ven Archdeacon Power, P.P. V.F. Chairman, presided at the monthly meeting of the above held in Dungarvan on Monday last. Messrs M. O'Hara, T. O'Faolain, J. Ormonde, T.D. Leamy, J. McCarthy, An Fear Mor, N. Kelly, N. Walsh and M. Morrissey, were also present. Mr. D. Cullinane, C.E.O. was in attendance.

**Hotel Staff Training Course**  
Arising from matters referred to the above course being held at the Strand Hotel, Rosslare under the auspices of the Co. Waterford Committee the C.E.O. was requested on the suggestion of Mr. Morrissey, to obtain full particulars of the scheme with the idea of holding a similar course in Waterford next year.

**Gratuity And Pension**  
A marriage gratuity of £283 3s 10d was awarded to Mrs. Maureen Manley (nee Malone) former Domestic Economy Instructress under the Committee. The C.E.O. stated that Mrs. Manley had 7 years service under the Committee and her gratuity would be seven-twelfths of her salary.

Arising from an application of Miss Kathleen O'Neill, Inter-ent Domestic Economy Instructress who retired on October 31st for a superannuation allowance of the maximum amount the C.E.O. stated that Miss O'Neill had 38 years service with the Committee and her pension would come to 38/60ths of her salary. The full pension would be applicable after 40 years service.

The Committee agreed to award the full pension subject to sanction.

**Crux Over Painting Tenders.**  
When consideration was being given to the tenders received for the external painting of the Dungarvan School, the C.E.O. stated that three tenders had been received in time in accordance with the terms of the advertisement which had been published.

Two had arrived late, one of which had been posted to the Architect in Clonmel and had been reposted back, the other had been handed in at the post box at the school.

Discussion followed as to whether the two late tenders should be considered with the others and points raised dealt with the possible objection of the tenderers who had been in time against the late tenders should one of the latter be accepted.

Finally, it was agreed to consider only the three received in time. These were (1) John Sandford & Sons, Mitchel St., Dungarvan at £176 10s 0d (2) John McGrath & Son Contractors, Dungarvan at £221 10s 6d (3) John Sandford, 13 Keating St. Dungarvan, at £208 15s 0d. The C.E.O. told Mr. Leamy that the Architect's estimate for the work had been £220. The tenderers agreed to accept the first mentioned tender, it being the lowest.

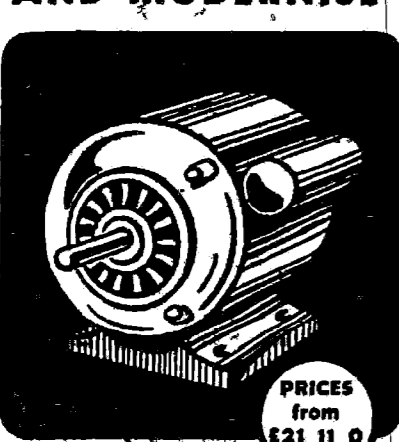

**EAST CORK COMMENTS**

**Unveiling of I.R.A. Memorial**—The Lord Mayor of Cork, Ald. McGrath unveiled a monument on Sunday, Nov 14th, to three members of the 1st Cork Brigade I.R.A., who were killed in the civil war at Stuke, Donoghmore. The monument replaced a wooden cross which for many years marked the site of the public plot at Stuke and is in memory of Vol. J O'Brien, Company, 2nd Batt who was killed in action at Knocknarragh on September 1922. Vol. Denis Creedon, E. Company, Sixth Batt who died from wounds sustained in the same engagement, and Vol. William Healy of Lackenbaton Donoghmore, who was captured and executed in Cork Military prison in March 1933.

A large attendance, headed by the Drispey Pipers Band, marched from Donoghmore across to the memorial. After the Lord Mayor had performed the unveiling ceremony, three volleys were fired and the Last Post and Reveille were sounded.

The ceremony ended with the recitation of a decade of the Rosary by Rev Fr Aherne, P.P. Donoghmore.

Ald. Sean McCarthy, T.D., addressed the gathering at some length, and said he was a fellow inmate of the late Vol. William Healy, who was one of Ireland's bravest soldiers, and who with his brother fought against the British forces in a number of engagements.

It is interesting to note that Vol. William Healy, was a brother of Mr Michael Healy of the Council, Dungourney, Middleton and the late Tom Healy, Glendine Voughal and Messrs Jerh, Matt, and Maurice Healy, of Donoghmore, and P Healy, of New York.

The Healy family according to family records can be traced back to the year 1060. The Donoghmore parish derived its name from the head of the O'Healy clan in or about the 10th century. His name was Donogh. Mr O'Healy distinguished members of the great Inch family of Mid-Cork were well known, they included the late Mr T M Healy of the Walsh & Co. firm, Cork, Mr Maurice Healy, M.P. for Cork City, and their brother Mr T Healy, M.P. for Wexford, who were members of Parnell's Party. Also their father Mr Maurice Healy, who was Clerk of the Limerick Union.

Mr Michael Healy, brother of Vol. William Healy, took an active part in the Drispey battle early in 1921, and in a number of other engagements against the British forces.

The late Mr T M Healy, referred to above was the first Governor General of the Irish Free State.

**Flannell Fall**—A meeting of the Dungourney Flannell Fall will be held in the course of a few weeks, and will be presided over by Mr Liam Aherne, the County Council representative of the district. Prominent members and leaders of the organisation, will address the meeting.

Matters dealing with the acquiring of ranch lands in the district by the Irish Land Commission will be discussed.
