## TRAGIC DEATH OF YOUNG SCHOOL GIRL

**INQUEST PROCEEDINGS ADJOURNED**

The tragic story of how a young school girl, Margaret Barry, aged 12 years and 11 months, of Garranahish, KilmacThomas, sustained injuries from which she later succumbed, while returning from school at the Mercy Convent, Dungarvan, with her sister Mary, on last Monday evening, was told at the inquest proceedings, which were later adjourned pending instructions from the Attorney General, held by Dr. D. Healy, Lismore, Coroner for West Waterford and a jury at the District Hospital, Dungarvan, on Tuesday evening last.

**Medical Evidence**  
 Dr. J. M. O'Donoghue, District Hospital, Dungarvan, deposed. The deceased, Margaret Barry, was admitted to hospital at approximately 8.20 p.m. on 6th December. I examined her after admission and found that she was severely shocked and deeply unconscious. She had two wounds over the left temple and presented signs of intracranial damage. In addition she had fractures of both bones of her left forearm. There were no other external injuries.

**Driver's Grief**  
 Peter Egan, Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, in evidence stated: "I am a lorry driver employed by Mr. Thomas Lannen, Dungarvan, as a labourer. On Dec 6th I was assisting Peter Egan driver of the lorry in collecting a load of sheepskins in Waterford. We left for home a little before 5 p.m. The night was very wet. I dozed in the lorry until I became aware of a thud as if the lorry had struck against something. Before that I had the impression that the lorry was slowing up and immediately after the thud it stopped. I saw the driver jump out of the cab and I also got out. I went back to the back of the lorry and saw a girl lying on the centre of the road and a man whom I now know to be her father standing beside her. I helped in lifting the girl and the man told me that her name was Margaret. There was a bag on the road beside the girl. I heard no horn sounded before the thud."

**"She's Destroyed"**  
 Peter Egan then resumed his evidence and having been cautioned by the Coroner at the request of Mr. Lannen, said that he needed make no statement if he wished. I am a lorry driver employed by Mr. Thomas Lannen, Dungarvan. At about 5.30 p.m. on Monday evening I was driving a load of sheepskins to Dungarvan. As I approached the entrance to Mr. Barry's farm I saw a bus stationary on the side of the road facing towards me. I also noticed the light from a flashlamp on the other side which was my side of the road. The lights on the bus were dimmed. My speed at that time was about 25 m.p.h. and I slowed down as I thought it was a cyclist with a lamp was on my side. I also changed down from top to third gear and as I passed the bus I saw a girl between 10 and 15 m.p.h. The bus was stationary as I passed it and I saw a man with a flashlamp standing beside a milk churn on the road. As the cab of my lorry drew clear of the rear of the bus I noticed a young girl dash across the road from the back of the bus. I pulled up straight away, but I did not sound the horn. I got out on the road and saw the deceased girl lying on the crown of the road. I would say that the girl struck the lorry on the right side about centre ways back. As I saw the girl dash into the side of it I said to myself, "she's destroyed." At no time did the girl come into the beam of my headlights, and I did not alter the course of the lorry at any time after passing the bus.

**Adjoined**  
 At this stage the Superintendent applied for the adjournment which was granted.

**Overcome With Grief**  
 Mr. A. R. Farrell, solicitor, arrived at this stage and stated that he had been instructed to represent Mr. Barry, whom he said had been overcome with grief and who had left with the funeral.

**Sympathy**  
 The Coroner, Mr. Lannen, on behalf of Mr. Egan, the Sup't and Mr. Walsh, on behalf of the Jury extended deepest sympathy to the parents and family of the deceased girl, which Mr. Farrell, solicitor, stated he would convey to them.

DUNGARVAN DISTRICT COURT

Signed Farmer's Name To Letter And Got £1

The fortnightly Dungarvan Court was held before Mr. L. E. Skinner D.J., on Wednesday last.

An ad interim transfer of the license in respect of the Park Hotel premises was granted to the new licensee, Bridget A. Mait.

The application was moved by Mr. L. F. Langan, solicitor. A dance license for a dance at Coolnasmear for the Killgobnet Social Club, was granted to Mr. Laurence Condon, Ballycurran, Dungarvan.

Mr. Langan, solicitor, made the application. Mr. Farrell, solicitor, was granted an occasional exercise license on behalf of Mr. Robert Keane, O'Connell Street, in respect of the Flanna Fall Dance at the Town Hall, on December 26th.

On Driver's License—Eric Noel Browne, 14, Grattan Square, Dungarvan, was fined 10/- and the P.O. was applied in the case of Richard Walsh, Murphy Place, Abbeyside, who were summoned by Guard Lynch, Cappagh, for driving without valid driving licenses in force on October 20th.

On Books For Two Years—When an old adjourned large case against Margaret Tutty, 20 Loughmore, was called on by Mr. Farrell, solicitor, the defendant said that the sum in dispute had been £200. To date £141 10s 0d had been paid back and defendant, whose husband was earning £7 a week, had asked for a further adjournment to allow the balance to be paid.

Superintendent Flanagan said that the case was now on the books for 2 years and he would like it to be finally disposed of before the end of March.

Mr. Farrell said that he would try and get the balance due by that time and the Justice adjourned the case to the second court in March.

Signed Farmer's Name To Superintendent P. Flanagan prosecuted Patrick Wall, Ballycurran, Dungarvan, and out-lying the case said that about the last week in October, the defendant went into the shop in Dungarvan, and produced a letter which was signed by a farmer from the Mapstown area and which requested the shopkeeper to give the bearer £1. The shopkeeper did so and mentioned the fact to the farmer when he next called at the shop. The farmer stated that he had signed no such letter and when asked he admitted that the letter was an invention.

The Superintendent added that the accused claimed that the farmer who signed the letter owed him £2 in respect of work he had done for him.

Mr. Farrell, solicitor, for the defendant said that these were the facts, and said that there had been an argument between the defendant and the farmer who had employed him concerning payment for some work done. This was said to be owed £1 and thought that he could rightfully do what he did in order to get it.

Mr. Farrell said that defendant undertook not to do anything of the kind again, and asked that no prison sentence be imposed as it was so near Christmas.

Justice—What about the £1? Defendant—I'll pay it back tomorrow. Justice—Very well, I'll adjourn the case for a month and if the pound is paid back before that, I'll apply the P.O.A.
