BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT with PENSMAN

WASHED OUT
The plans of the Dungarvan Gaelic League Pipers Band for playing out the Old Year and playing in the New on last Friday night had to be very much restricted due to the very unfavourable weather which prevailed. The Band had arranged for a Pageant with Pipers and Drummers coming from various districts of the town converging together at the Square on the stroke of Midnight. Streamers and fireworks were in readiness to make the occasion a gala one, but unfortunately while main proposals God disposes and the rain fell and the wind blew to make it uncomfortable and almost impossible to remain out of doors. The weather reverted to type with a vengeance and it looked as if it was paying a double dividend for having relaxed so much over the Christmas holidays. The old year party went out under conditions which will always be associated with it—torrential rain and high winds. Despite the rain, however, the band paraded around the town and there was quite a few hardy souls who were determined, come what may to see the Old Year out to the swirl of the pipes and the tap of the drums. It was a pity that the gaiety was so damped by the elements. Similar conditions prevailed all over Munster and the chime of midnight struck to the patter of falling rain and the lonesome sound of the blowing wind. There were no good resolutions where the weather was concerned—it had been the worst and there was no relenting. I understand that the annual house-to-house collection in Dungarvan on Friday and Saturday next, Jan 7th and 8th, and the people of the town can show their appreciation of the various occasions during the past year by subscribing generously when the collectors call.

NINE DAYS FROM DUBLIN
I received two greeting cards from friends in Dublin last week. They were intended to reach me before Christmas and had been posted in the home city on Monday December 20th but they did not in fact come to my hands until Wednesday December 28th. When a letter from Boston can come at the time between four and five days, it looks funny, even though the Christmas rush intervened, that these letters should have taken so long a time to come from Dublin—they must have got stuck somewhere.

SPECIAL MEETINGS
I have been trying to count up all the special meetings which the Waterford County Council had in 1954, but I have lost track of them. I'll venture, however to say that we hold more County Council meetings in this county than any other county of a similar size in the Republic. At one time quarterly meetings were sufficient to deal with the county administration, but by 1954 this number had at one period increased to monthly meetings and had been topped again by a number of meetings which came within a fortnight of each other. Undoubtedly there was need for some of the meetings and the urgency cropped up. I will not be so unreasonable as to say that there was no need for them, but I will say this—if the members sat promptly each day they would have the time for the meetings to start and continued to sit throughout the day allowing a mid-day break of an hour for lunch, and continued on until 5 p.m. or 5.30 p.m., there would not be a need for many of the meetings held. Punctuality, however, is not a great attribute of most of our public representatives and especially so after the luncheon recess. I have seen the resumption of meetings held up for long periods after lunch on many occasions because a quorum could not be got together. It is difficult to estimate the cost to the ratepayers of these meetings. The travelling expenses of the members must range around the £50 mark for each meeting and added to that is the fact that many officials and engineers engaged at the meeting when they might be on other more important duties. A special meeting was called last week to deal with a request by the Tramway Town Commissioners for Council to guarantee a loan of £13,000 to the Commissioners for the purchase of the Atlantic Ballroom, Tramore. The Council members, wisely decided not to commit themselves until the ratepayers of Tramore had voiced their opinions of the matter. A meeting

OBITUARY

VERY REV. D. MORRISSEY, P.P.

The diocese of Waterford and Lismore has suffered a big loss by the death which occurred at Maypark Nursing Home Waterford, of Very Rev. D. Morrissey P.P., Dunhill and Fenor who was a most zealous and revered pastor, and whose passing was earned with regret by the faithful of Waterford and surrounding counties.

A native of Ballylooby Co. Tipperary the deceased was educated at St. John's College Waterford. He was ordained on November 2nd, 1902, and went on a temporary mission to Liverpool in 1913. He was appointed curate at Abbeyside, Dungarvan and served as a military chaplain for two years during the first world war. In December 1916, he became curate at the Waterford Cathedral and three years later was transferred to Ardmore. He became curate at Ballyporeen in 1926 and was curate at Cahir from 1936, when he was appointed parish priest at Dunhill.

26th Annual Convention At Aglish

A very large number of delegates attended the 26th Annual Convention of the above which was held for the first time ever at Aglish on Sunday last January 2nd, 1955, Rev. Fr. Slattery, C.C., Outgoing Chairman, presided.

Welcome To Delegates
Rev. Fr. Slattery in the absence of the Parish Priest welcomed the delegates to Aglish. He said he was very glad to see such a large crowd present and thanked them all for attending. He welcomed them to the Glebe Hall which had kindly been put at their disposal by Miss C. O'Grath, P.P. He stated that he wished all the delegates a happy new year.

Statement of Accounts.
It was proposed by Mr. J. O'Brien, (Abbeyside) and seconded by Mr. J. Byrne (Valley Evers) that the Statement of Accounts be taken as read. This was adopted. In reply to Mr. W. Fitzgerald the Secretary (Mr. D. O'Sullivan) stated that the Munster Council insured all fields in the county in case of accidents to any spectator. This did not cover the players as it was their club who insured them. The Chairman stated that the Board was in a healthy financial position with a credit balance of £46 15s. 0d.

Secretary's Report
Arising out of the Secretary's report which was published in our last issue, Rev. Fr. Slattery said that he would like to say a few words about the part of the report dealing with referees, which read as follows: During the year the Board found on hand 100 referees. It was the Board's aim to have a sufficient number of referees to cover our games, as the lot of a referee is unenviable, I would like to see more young players come along and referee matches as in this way we will always be sure of getting some good referees. He stated that this was only too true and the lot of a referee was unenviable as there was too much interference with him. He stated that he hoped the more budding referees would come along during the coming year.

Regarding the Shield Final
Mr. W. Fitzgerald said that he agreed with the report that it could not be played this year owing to bad weather but he said, he would like to make a suggestion that the first round winners be known after the first round in June and that the Board make the second round fixtures immediately so as to have the final played before the end of September.

The Chairman said that there was always a difficulty in making fixtures. The Shield final had been fixed twice this year for Dungarvan but weather conditions caused the abandonment of the first time whilst KilmacThomas, one of the teams taking part in the final, were unable to travel on the second date. Mr. J. Quirk (Ballyduff) complimented the Secretary on his report and said that he would like to endorse the fine tributes paid to Fourmilewater in winning the Western final. He would also like to take this opportunity he said in paying tribute to all the teams which the champions beat. He said that the way to the final, as they all played the game in a sporting manner and with the aims of the Association always at heart. Concluding, he stated that while Fourmilewater did not win the major honours this year, he hoped that they would gain them in the near future. Mr. Quirk then proposed that the report be adopted and this was seconded by Mr. W. Fitzgerald and passed.

Rev. Chairman's Address
Rev. Fr. Slattery having again thanked the delegates for their attendance said that a Convention was the time for looking back on last year's work for criticism themselves and also for making plans for the year ahead. Looking back, he stated, we can do so with a certain amount of pleasure. The flag has been kept flying in West Waterford with all clubs to be congratulated on playing the game in the right manner, all of which were fine active clubs with plenty of life. He congratulated the six Western champions and stated that all brought credit to the West with their displays in the final.

Regarding the Board's activities during the year, he said that they should be thankful for the smooth way things were run, and also for the fact that they were in a strong financial position. He then thanked all who helped him and the Board during the year and also the Secretary and Treasurer. Continuing he said that the delegates should be serious concerning the Convention as they were the standard-bearers of the Association in West Waterford. They should always remember the aims of the Association which were to develop the youth of the county, both physically and morally, to restore our National customs and pastimes and also to restore our National language. He added that when the Association was first founded the country was run by a foreign government whose aim was to kill our pastimes, customs and language and had they succeeded they would surely have defeated us. But the G.A.A. fought against this and as their successors they of today should do their best to retain their aims. He also said that they were not serious about the National language and he would like to hear it spoken on the field of play and all should make a new year's resolution to do this. Rev. Fr. Slattery said that he would also like to thank on behalf of the N.A.C.A. the various clubs who took part in their races during the year and also those who had entered for the Cross-Country Championship held in Aglish, which was won by the local club, whom he would like to congratulate. Concluding he said that there was nothing more to say except that he could not see his way to contest the Chair this year. He said that he enjoyed very much the last two years in which he was Chairman and hoped that he gave justice to all and thanked them all once more.

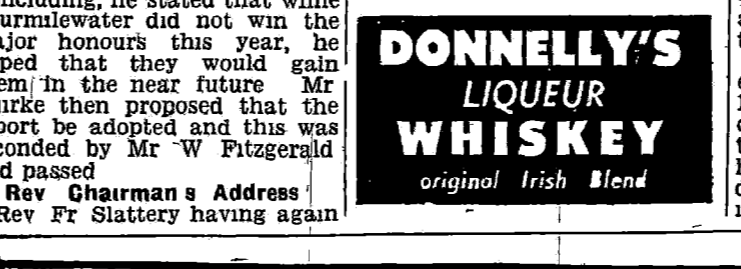
Election Of Officers

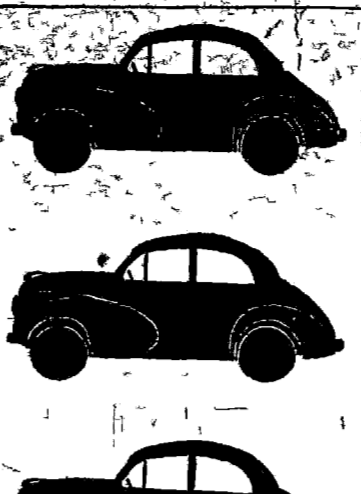

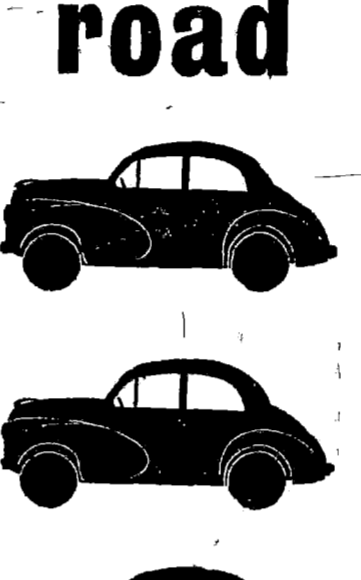

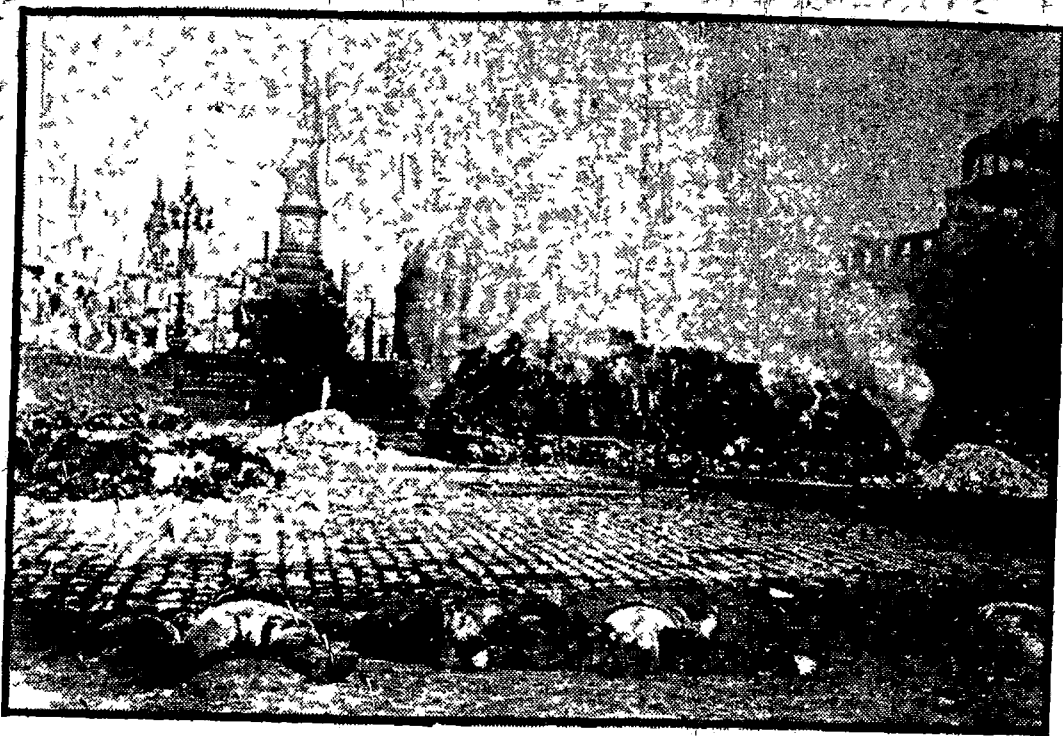

Advance To Barbarism

MOST talked of book last year was "Unconditional Hatred," which treated the last war from a completely new angle. Now a noted English lawyer Mr F J P Veale, has pierced the "Iron Curtain of Silence" in regard to the barbarisation of warfare during the Second World War and the challenge to sound legal principles in the war crimes trials.

"Advance to Barbarism" is a book which may offend the squeamish and annoy the powerful. But the author is not afraid to tell the truth. "Where are we heading?" he asks. To barbarism if the peoples follow the paths laid down during the fatal years 1939-1945 when the first global war shocked the world by its very barbarity. The indiscriminate bombing of civilians, the atomic bomb and, one of the greatest

crimes of all, the massacre of 250,000 defenceless civilians in the beautiful city of Dresden are all fully examined by Mr Veale. AND HE APPORTIONS THE BLAME. It is not pleasant to think of these things, but as the author points out, they did not end with the Nuremberg trials. In Korea similar abominations and atrocities were rife. disease, pain and starvation were all compounded beyond imagination. During the Second World War

says Mr Veale even Germany and Russia despite their mass butcheries in the East refrained from using such lethal weapons as poison gas and disease germs for fear of possible retaliation. The war trials by making it crystal clear that the losers will henceforth be subjected to such trials regarded as aggressors whether they were or not, and be hanged, make it inevitable that all the restraints that still survived the Second World War will be thrown to the winds in the third—as even the limited warfare in Korea has demonstrated. 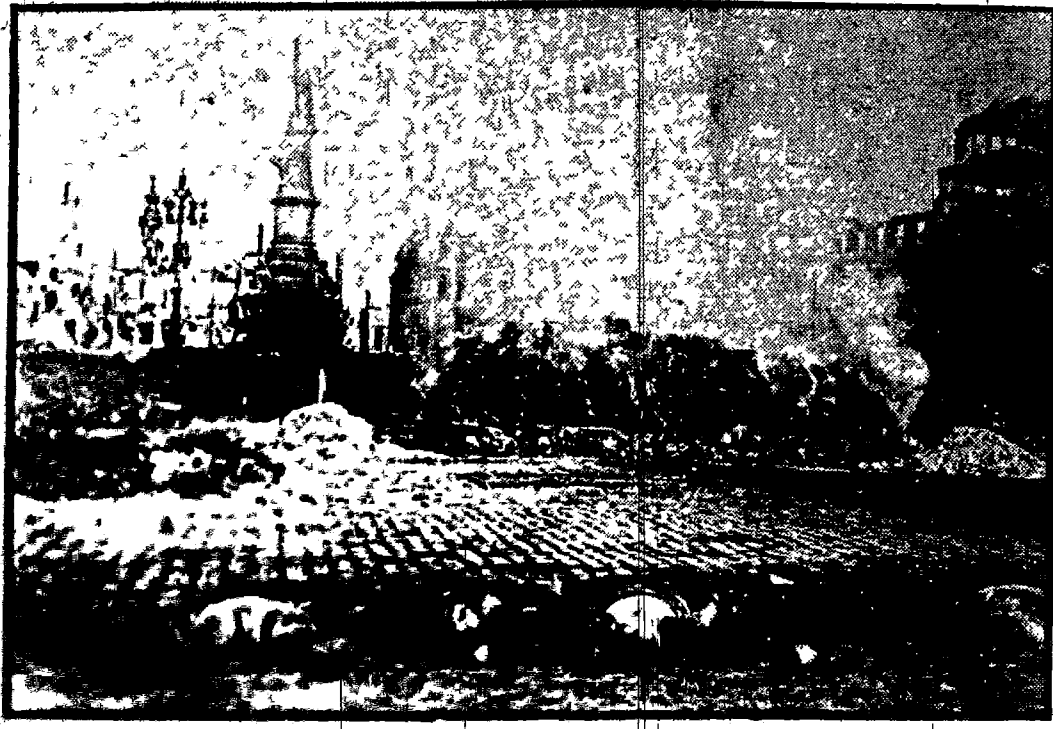
