**Waterford Co. Council**  
**Minister Advises Council to take Steps to Purchase Priory House**  
CHAIRMAN'S CASTING VOTE SENDS PROPOSAL BACK TO MINISTER  
Heated Discussion On Tramore Proposal

Mr M. Morrissey, Chairman, presided at a special meeting of the above held in Dungarvan on Monday last. Also present were Messrs T. Kyne, T.D., D. Leary, W. Fitzgerald, J. Fahy, J. Quirke, N. Walsh, Senator J. Butler, M. Kelly, D. Heskin, P. Butler, M. McGrath, T. Morrissey, M. Harty, J. Kirwan, S. Ormond, T.D., E. Power, W. Kennelly, R. Power, T. Power, J. Mansfield and after lunch Mr L. Morrissey, Messrs S. J. Moynihan, County Manager, Dr. M. O'Farrell, Co. Medical Officer, D. Sheedy, Co. Surveyor, J. Ormond, Chief Assistant, and J. G. Dowling, Co. Secretary were in attendance.

**Deputation**  
Mr Martin McCarthy, was spokesman for a four-man deputation which came before the Council to complain about the awful condition of the mile long road which was linked by a by-road to the road leading from Cappoquin to the Clomel-Dungarvan road. He said that no work had been done on the road since 1933 and it was now in a desperate state. There were ten ratepayers living along the road whose total valuation was £381 and besides that six tractors and four motor cars were being used by the residents there. The road was so bad that his children could not walk an inch of it to go to school. Mr McGrath and Mr Walsh endorsed the case made by the deputation and appealed to the Council to take over the road. Mr Quirke suggested that a grant be got from the Department first to repair the road properly before the Council took it over.

Finally it was agreed to take over the road (which is not at present a County Council road) provided that a grant of 100% was obtained from the Department to repair it in the first instance. A President with regard to a dispute concerning wages between the caretaker of the cemetery at Killroman and the Engineer Mr Costello, Mr Fahy asked that the caretaker be heard by the Council on the matter. The County Manager objected to this procedure and said that if it was allowed, a precedent would be created by which every Council employee who felt he was not being paid a fair wage could come before the Council. In the course of further discussion the Co. Manager agreed that he would meet the man with Mr Fahy and the Chairman in his own office during the luncheon recess and this was agreed to.

**Purchase Of Tramore Ballroom**  
The Secretary reported on the present position concerning the application of the Tramore Town Commissioners for a loan of £12,000 to purchase the Atlantic Ballroom, Tramore, for use as a Town Hall, and said that with Mr N. Walsh and Mr D. Leary he had travelled to the Minister in his own office during the meeting of the ratepayers of the town called to deal with the matter. Due to an overflow attendance at the meeting it was found necessary to adjourn it to a later date. Mr E. Power (Chairman of the Tramore Commissioners) said that they had received a letter from the vendors withdrawing from the negotiations for the sale of the hall, but the vendors had already committed themselves to their bid of £12,000 and it was proposed to hold a deputation meeting of the ratepayers probably next Tuesday night, to finalise the matter. Mr Walsh—Do I gather that the Commissioners have already purchased the hall? Chairman (a member of the Town Commissioners also)—No, we proceeded subject to the sanction of the Department and to the Council's approval of the loan. Mr Walsh—Do I take it that you offered £12,000 for the premises without consulting the County Council? I suggest Mr Chairman that your attitude in this matter all along has been both imprudent and unwise. The matter should have been put before the people of Tramore for their views first before you came to the Council to approve of not of the loan. It looks to me at any rate that you put the car before the horse. Chairman—On no We accepted the offer of the hall for £12,000 subject to sanction and did so as a statutory body and we can stand over that. Mr Walsh—You should have gone to the ratepayers before coming to the Council because the Council refused the loan then all your bidding was for naught. If you had purchased the premises then you brought the Commissioners to Tramore on a fool's errand. It appears that the premises are already bought and that you are trying to bind the auctioneer to the bid. The Council are entitled to know whether this is so or not. Chairman—The only function of the Commissioners appointed to attend the ratepayers meeting was to go there and report back to the Council. Mr Walsh—But the Council is entitled to know what the position is. Has the Auctioneer been bound and where did the money come from? Chairman—I am not answering any questions now and will give no further information until the proper time and that will be after the ratepayers meeting has been held. Mr Walsh—We are entitled to get the information now as in your statement to the Press you state that you had the conditional assent of the County Council to the purchase. I say there was no such thing. Chairman—I don't mind what was in the Press. Mr Walsh—But it was your statement? Chairman—You are not going to tell the Commissioners how to run their business. Mr Quirke—And you're not going to dictate to the County Council either. Chairman—All we want the Council to do is to approve the loan. Mr Walsh—Even if the Tramore ratepayers agree to the purchase of these premises the Council is in no way bound to approve of the loan. Mr Quirke—When this came up last day Mr Chairman, you said you'd educate me, but I'll tell you now that in six months time you'll be getting your leaving cert and I'll still be here. Chairman—Maybe so wait and see. The discussion then ended.

**Minister Advises On Priory House Purchase**  
Arising from the decision of the County Council meeting (held in camera) of 9th December not to purchase Priory House, Dungarvan, for conversion into a County Health Clinic, the Secretary read the following letter dated January 3rd, from the Department of Public Health:  
A Charr—I am directed by the Minister for Health to refer to your letter of the 14th December and previous correspondence regarding Priory House, Dungarvan, and to say that the recommendations made by the County Medical Officer, the County Engineer and your Architect Mr Thompson in regard to the use of the premises as a county clinic have been carefully considered. The Minister had also available the reports of officers of his Department who inspected the premises on the 9th November last. The Minister agrees that the premises, both from the point of view of situation and accommodation would be suitable for the purpose of the County Clinic services and considers that your local authority might now take steps to acquire them. Apart from the question of suitability, a relatively large saving of about £16,000 can be achieved by providing the clinic here rather than in the new buildings at present being planned and moreover, having regard to the stage of planning of the new building, it is likely that the services could be made available at least one year earlier at Priory House. In view of the present position of the Hospitals Trust, and the fact that substantial grants-in-aid to the Fund are being made available from the Exchequer to enable the present hospital building (Continued on Page Four)

programme to be completed, the Minister regards the possible saving here as particularly important and would have to consider should it be decided by your local authority not to proceed with the acquisition of Priory House without adequate reason whether he would be justified in making available the full grant of 66 2/3% towards the cost of a new building.

The Minister is advised that an outside valuation of Priory House would be £4,000. He considers that your local authority should endeavour to acquire the premises at a cost within that figure.

Mr Walsh-In other words the Department wants us to buy Priory House.

Mr Leamy-With all due respects to the officials in this Clinic absolutely necessary.

What will be the administration cost. We'll have specialists coming here from Harley Street and going off with fine fat cheques from the ratepayers.

When Arden was opened the then Minister for Health said that it would no longer be needed as a TB hospital in ten years time and I think that would prove an ideal Clinic.

Mr Heskin said that a dispensary was needed for Dungarvan and could be embodied in Priory House and this would save a considerable amount.

They would get a two-thirds grant towards the cost and for that reason he thought it was a good bargain.

Mr Walsh-Would the County Medical Officer tell us is a County Health Clinic a vital and urgent necessity at the moment.

Dr O'Farrell-I think so. Deputy Kyne stated that there was an urgent need for a dispensary in Dungarvan and it had been agreed to be in with the Health Clinic.

The letter from the Minister now indicated that the Council should buy Priory House within a price of £4,000 because it will gain time and the fear that the two-thirds grant might not be available for the new building.

ed that the Minister was not prepared to agree to the purchase of the premises at O'Connell Street as he considered the price excessive and due to its poor approach and structural condition and that it would not be suitable as a dispensary residence.

The letter added that a new building the plans and drawings for which were in an advanced state, would be much more suitable.

Deputy Kennelly-Then the Department have changed their minds altogether since that letter was written.

They wanted a new building then and I think we should get ahead with the new building now.

Deputy Kyne-I'm not concerned whether we have a new building or not but I'm more concerned with the Minister's threat that we might get no grant unless we do as he says.

Deputy Kennelly-Priory House will not be suitable as a Health Clinic at all. It is a fine building all right, but it is too narrow on the ground floor and it will mean that patients will have to climb a flight of stairs to get to it.

A new building is the proper thing as you will get exactly what you want and I will prove later that the reconstruction of the place will cost as much as a new building.

With regard to the estimate for the reconstruction of Priory House the Secretary gave the following figures submitted by the Architect, Mr Thompson.

Cost of premises (say) £5,000 Repairs £750 Decoration £1,250 Fees for abandoned work (on proposed new Clinic) £1,050 Alteration £3,500, fees £450 Total £12,000

It was stated that with the two-thirds grant from the Department the cost to the Council would be £3,700.

Deputy Kennelly-I think the whole thing is a bad business and the Council would be well advised to build a new Clinic. I have no interest in the matter beyond seeing that the proper thing is done.

Mr Heskin then proposed that the Council take steps to purchase Priory House in accordance with the letter from the Department and at a price to be approved by the Minister.

Deputy Kyne seconded. Deputy Kennelly-Before you take that resolution you must rescind the resolution passed at the last meeting.

The Secretary said that the previous resolution was passed by the Council in Committee and was only in the nature of a report to the present meeting.

Deputy Walsh Whether it was passed in Committee or in public that resolution constituted the views of the Council.

Charges of dangerous driving were preferred against Thomas Power Leamybrien, and James O'Brien Tournore, Dungarvan, arising from a collision between a van driven by Power and a lorry driven by O'Brien at The Burgery, Dungarvan on the evening of Dec 9th.

It was stated that Power was proceeding with two of his nieces from Dungarvan to Leamybrien in the van and O'Brien with a load of corn when the collision occurred. O'Brien in order to avoid two pedestrians walking on the road, swerved to his right and collided with the oncoming van. The lights of which were stated to have dazzled him before they were dimmed.

The Justice dismissed the charge against Power and stating that he had every sympathy for O'Brien who in order to avoid knocking the pedestrians who were very far out on the road, swerved out and collided with the van, reduced the charge.
