WHEN YOU'RE RIGHT YOU MIGHT BE WRONG
Many road accidents, and there have been quite a number of them in recent months, have been attributed to the fact that people, particularly in unlighted areas walk on the wrong side of the thoroughfare.
This fact was drawn to my notice at the last sitting of the Dungarvan District Court in a case in which a lorry driver, in an effort to avoid two pedestrians proceeding in the same direction as himself, swerved and collided with an oncoming vehicle. Had the driver not seen the pedestrians in time, it is quite possible that they would have both been at least seriously injured. The accident occurred at night and the pedestrians were both dressed in black.
Now for some reason or other, perhaps just habit, the general tendency for pedestrians is to use the left-hand side of the road by doing so they leave themselves open to greater risk especially as in the case I have just quoted, when two motor vehicles approaching from opposite directions have dimmed their lights to pass.
Then there is the ever present danger that the motorist may not see the pedestrian immediately ahead of him, or that he is dressed in dark clothes or that there is nothing in the traffic code to direct people in this matter. It is always safer for all concerned if pedestrians use the right hand side of the road. Then they can see the traffic approaching them and take precautions. It is also easier for the driver of a vehicle to see a person approaching him at night since his headlights pick up some of the article of clothing or the person's face.
In this respect it is interesting to note that the Safety First Association recommend that in countries where the left-hand rule of the road operates, pedestrians should walk on the right. Against this I have heard many an old dog say "keep on the compo side".
There it is then if you're right you might be wrong, while if you're wrong you may be safer.

SUCCESS THE REWARD OF PERSEVERANCE
At last Monday's monthly meeting of the Vocational Education Committee another success story was unfolded. It was not a success drawing any spectacular headlines, but rather one bearing out the old saying "If you keep at it you're bound to succeed".
Subsequent to the meeting I asked the Chief Executive officer of the committee, Mr. Denis Cullinan, B. Agr. Sc., Dungarvan, for more particulars of the matter. He willingly gave them to me.
A few years ago a young student enrolled himself in the Technical Class at the Technical School, Dungarvan, under Mr. Sean Kelly the Instructor. For two years he applied himself to his studies and as usual things were tough at times but then again things went smoothly. At the end of the two years at the day classes the student left and became an apprentice fitter at the local Co-Op Creamery. He did not, however, abandon his technical studies, and continued to attend the night Engineering Classes.
Recently an examination was held for scholarships to train as metalwork teachers. The student sat with hundreds of other youths from all over the country at the examination. He was successful and now has gone to Dublin for his final training where after a year and a half he will qualify. A certain amount of help, as far as I understand, there are at present three jobs for every trained instructor. During the training period his scholarship is worth £4 5s 6d per week.
There is no doubt but that the student is entitled to the success which was the reward of his persevering studies.
The student is Mr. John Straine son of Mr. and Mrs. Pat Straine, Sexton Street, Abbeystead, Dungarvan, and I congratulate him for setting a high example which other young men might most beneficially follow.

DUNGARVAN U.D.C. PROTEST AT ERECTION OF POSTER BOARDS

Mr. N. Kelly Vice-Chairman, presiding at last Friday night's meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council. Also present were Messrs T. McCarthy, R. Walsh, Senator J. Butler and P. Casey. Messrs P. Walsh, B.E. Acting-Borough Surveyor, Mr. Keery, Town Clerk, were in attendance.

Reparations
A letter requesting repairs to this house from Patrick Hurton, 56 Congress Villas was referred to the Engineer.

Exorbitant Rate Demand
A letter from the Reps Agnes Nugent Abbeystead read by the Clerk, stated that the rate demand of £69 in respect of 16 acres of land was exorbitant. The letter added that in connection with the Council's housing scheme at Murphy Place, Abbeystead 5 acres of land had been acquired from them at a price which represented half their market value.

The Clerk stated that the question appeared to be one for the Valuation Office as the Council had no function in the matter.

The members agreed that the rate demand was a stiff one but unfortunately there was nothing that could be done by them to ease the matter.

Erection of Poster Boards
Referring to the following order made by the County Manager on the 16th December—
Application of Messrs David Allen & Sons, Ltd. Cork, of the 3rd December, 1954, for permission to erect poster boards (3) at O'Connell Street (Mitchell Street and Davitt's Quay).

Report of Acting Borough Surveyor of the 9th December, 1954 that there was no objection to the erection of the proposed poster boards.

Interim Reports of the 13th December, 1954 from the Planning Consultant Nos. 123, 124 and 125 recommending that permission be granted for the erection of the proposed poster boards subject to the conditions that should they become injurious to the amenities of the area by reason of display etc the Council may cause them to be removed on one month's notice.

Order that plans as initiated by this day be and they be hereby approved and that the necessary permission under the Town and Regional Planning Acts be and it is hereby granted subject to the above conditions.

Senator Butler said that there were people in Dungarvan who had derived a living for generations by posting bills and the Council should make sure that nothing injurious was done to them by the granting of this permission.

Outside of that aspect of the matter at all he said that these poster boards should not be put up at all in certain areas of the town especially in the centre of it.

Mr. Kelly said that Messrs Allen must have got the permission of the people where they were going to erect the boards.

Senator Butler—Well I object to it.

Mr. McCarthy also objected to the permission which was granted as it might do harm to the local man in that business.

Mr. Casey said that while the objection mentioned by the Senator, Mr. McCarthy had his full sympathy, the County Manager had no power to change the matter provided the Town Planning Consultant agreed with it.

Mr. Butler—I think we should send the order back to the County Manager expressing our disapproval of it.

Mr. Walsh seconded this suggestion.

Mr. Casey—Well Mr. Chairman, what's your ruling on it? Chairman—These people must have got permission to erect these boards, and I rule that the County Manager's order in the matter stand.

Harbour Dues
The report of the Harbour Master stated that dues collected for November totalled £85 6s 6d and for December £44 18s 6d. In December last year, he said the dues had amounted to £100.

Mr. Casey—I think the best thing to do is to get rid of the harbour dues.

The Harbour Master said that the drop in the December dues was caused mainly by the very bad weather during which ships could not go to sea.

Overdraft accommodation of £473 to the 31st January on the Harbour Account was approved.

DUNGARVAN MAN AGAIN IN CUSTODY
Exactly a week after his release from jail he had served a month's imprisonment for assaulting his daughter Patrick Street, Cathal Brugha Place, Dungarvan, was arrested on Saturday last at his home by Sgt. M. Deasy and Garda T. Winters following an assault on his daughter Mary, with a jam-jar.

At a special court on Saturday afternoon Street was charged before Mr. C. Murphy P.C. with the assault on his daughter and also assaulting Sgt. Deasy.

He was remanded in custody to Cahir District Court which will be held today (Thursday) January 20th.

Trees At Murphy Place
The Town Clerk stated that only two replies (both favourable) had been received to the Council's circular to the tenants of Murphy Place offering to supply trees free if the tenants would plant them themselves.

Health Act Does Not Cater For Middle Income Group

Straddally Dispensary
The Board on the proposal of Deputy Kyne seconded by Mr. Kelly approved the recommendation of the Engineer to purchase from Mr. James Whelan Square, Straddally a site of 3 rods and 10 perches for £100 with all expenses paid for the proposed new dispensary at Straddally.

Monag Dispensary
Mr. Heskin asked if there was anything fresh about the Monag (Tallow) dispensary. Mr. Kelly said it is going on for over 30 years and was mooted by his father's time. The existing premises which are being used as temporary dispensary have been held despite many protests from the owner to be released. I think it is a terrible injustice to the owner Mr. Collins, who could have sold this property many times only for the Board holding on to the ground and I think that the Board should either hand it back to him or pay him a fair rent for it.

The County Manager said that proper title could not be got for the original site registered as dispensary and it had to be abandoned, but negotiations were now proceeding for another site.

Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture Price of Wheat Again Discussed

Land Commission Lettings "A Racket"

Mr P R Power Chairman, presided at the monthly meeting of the above held in Dungarvan, on Saturday last. Also present were Messrs D Leahy, W Dowling, A Coughlan, M Quirk, P Butler, N Walsh, M McGrath, D Heskin, T Power, M Harty, J Mansfield, R Barron, J Fahy, and L Morrissey.

Several members referred to payments made under the above and stated that more caution should be exercised so that not more than one payment be made in respect of each fox killed.

The Committee decided to set aside an amount of £220 to finance an entry and expenses in case a ploughing team would be entered from the County in the forthcoming National Ploughing Championships to be held in Athy.

Wheat Price Unreasonable. Arising from a letter from the Minister for Agriculture, in reply to an earlier resolution of the Committee it was stated that the Minister did not propose to make any amendment in the prices already announced for the wheat crop of 1955.

Mr Walsh said that wheat bushelling 57 to 60 lbs realised £3 17s 6d last year and the Minister's price for wheat of this quality for the current year was £3 5s 0d. He suggested that the Minister be asked to fix the price for wheat between 57 and 60 lbs at £3 12s 6d which would be a cut of 5/- a barrel on last year's price.

Mr Harty held that it was tantamount to persecution that growers should be penalised for selling their wheat in August or September, and that those who held the wheat over to a later date should get a higher price.

Mr Leahy disagreed with Mr Harty, saying that there was no question of persecution, and that the idea of holding this move was to give some relief to the mills.

Mr Quirk said that the farmers who held over their wheat gained nothing. The half-crown a barrel would not compensate any farmer for holding it.

When Mr Leahy asked if the employment of three Poultry Inspectors in the county was justified the CAO said that interest in poultry were re-awakening and prospects for the future looked good.
