MEMORIAL TO THE "ERIN'S HOPE"

Since Mr Pax Whelan Dungarvan came before this year's County G.A.A. Convention a couple of Sundays ago to appeal for funds for the erection of the memorial to the "Erin's Hope" I have heard many inquiries as to the part played by this gallant ship in the abortive Fenian Rising of 1867 and its association with Dungarvan Harbour.

Before I go any further let me tell you that a Committee has been formed under the aegis of the National Monuments Advisory Committee of this County who have undertaken the task of erecting the memorial. The site chosen is on the roadside just above Helvick pier overlooking the expansive stretch of the

harbour into which the "Erin's Hope" sailed so many years ago looking for the contacts who were to take the arms and ammunition for the Fenian Rising. As the cost of the memorial has to be met by public subscription, the first task of the Committee is to collect sufficient funds and this was the reason for Mr Whelan's appeal to the Gaelic of the County.

A small subscription from each Club in the County would be a great start and in order to give the youth of the Deise an insight into the significance of the memorial, I will be commencing next week, and during subsequent weeks, give the story of the voyage of the "Erin's Hope". For this information I refer you to my thanks to Mr Whelan, who has a deep interest in this project as being a man with such a great National record as he possesses. Look out, therefore for the start of this great story in this column next week.

DUNGARVAN'S DAY OUT

Doubles For Owners And Riders At Dungarvan

The opening of the point-to-point season at Lismore on Wednesday, February 2nd, was anything but an auspicious one for it rained almost without cessation during the entire proceedings. Naturally the conditions interfered with attendances and those who forsook the shelter of their cars while the races were in progress had to wade through a sea of mud.

The biggest disappointment was the fact that only two of the fourteen entries faced the starter for the Open Maiden Race, the best-endowed event in the programme. M.B. Kinora II and Errand Lass kept close company for the first round and when half way had been completed in the final circuit Mr M. Moloney on M.B. Kinora II drew away and won by a distance.

Mr. Moloney who is one of the most promising of the younger riders taking part in the point-to-points, had not long to wait to complete his double, and also a double for Mr Morrissey, for in the next race the Confined Race, he again got home first on Glenwilliam Rover II. He was always lying handy and kept out the finish, to win by ten lengths from Archa III with Coolagh II, a distance away.

The Open Heavyweight Race resolved itself into a match between Mr T. Fletcher on Queen's Lad and Mr P. O'Donnell on Lady Colina III. It was a well-judged race, Mr Fletcher was a distance in front when he passed the post. Mr Fletcher completed a double for himself in the last event of the day when he got Jackaroo home as winner in the last event of the day.

The Open Lightweight Race, after a mistake by Royal Waters, Mr Fletcher drew away by a distance.

This was Mr Leahy's third success in the Cloncoskraine Cup so that it now becomes his absolute property. Jackaroo is an own brother to Sweeping Queen's Lad and Jackaroo, Mr Leahy appears to have the material for gaining further successes. Results—

MUTINY AND MURDER AT SEA

When the barque Caswell arrived at Cobh in tow of H.M.S. Goshawk it was stated that at Buenos Ayres the English crew were discharged, except the captain, the chief mate the second mate the carpenter and two apprentices.

A crew were shipped consisting of three Greeks, Big George, Nicholas and Christo Sambo, two Maltese (brothers) Jasper and Giuseppe a Scotsman, Carrock, and an Englishman Dunne. Some quarrelling occurred after the ship left Antipogasta for Cobh and the captain on one occasion went into the fore-castle with a revolver.

On January 4th the log states—Big George was in the starboard main rigging, and the captain immediately under him showing him how to put on a seizing. Suddenly George sprang off the rigging and plunged his knife into the captain's stomach. The mate, as he sprang to the captain's assistance, was seized by Christo Sambo and Nicholas, and the latter plunged the galley knife into him. The Maltese, Jasper and Giuseppe, rushed forward with the revolver and shot both the captain and the mate. Big George called up the steward Griffiths from below, seized him by the hair of the head, struck him and put his heart out. The second mate came on deck, calling to the boy at the wheel to put the ship about. Giuseppe shot him and as Dunne was attempting to staunch his wounds they drove him forward. Jasper shot him, and the three others stabbed him with their knives. The carpenter had shut himself up in the round house and the mutineers appeared to hold a consultation, and resolved to kill no more but made the Englishmen promise to help them.

It is hoped to be able to give further details next week of this amazing incident which was previously reported in the Irish Times in 1876. Needless to say there was considerable excited discussions over fragrant bits of Musgrave Tea incident—how often the Irish drive their graves famous blends arise in association with events in the Irish scene over the last century.

She was a saintly lady who enjoyed widespread esteem and her popularity and that of her highly respected family was testified by the very large and representative cortege which attended the removal of her remains to St. Mary's Parish Church on Friday evening, and the interment in the adjoining cemetery on Saturday last.

I do think that this Tallow team who have received their medals here tonight, were the nucleus of the grand hurlers which we had in subsequent years.

In conclusion he said: "I hope to see Tallow winning again one day, but senior honours have to wait for 25 years for their trophies."

Mr. O'Donoghue received a great ovation at the conclusion of his address.

James Cunningham then spoke a few words of thanks to the officials and said that they all missed Michael Mulcahy and that they regretted his death. "A grand fellow and a grand hurler, may he rest in peace."

The members of the old team then joined hands and sang "Auld Lang Syne, with Frank Ryan in the middle of the circle."

At the end of the very enjoyable cell which followed Mr. P. Collins who acted as M.C. in a very capable manner thanked everyone and stressed upon the younger hurlers to take example by the 1930 Tallow hurling men.
