## BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT with PENSMAN

### THE "ERIN'S HOPE" AND THE FENIAN RISING

As promised in this column last week I have prepared for my readers of the story of the voyage of the "Erin's Hope" from America with arms and ammunition for the Fenian Rising in Ireland in 1867.

In order to appreciate the background to the story readers must visualize the circumstances that prevailed in this country at the time. It was a little more than 80 years ago and about 20 years after the disastrous famine that ravaged the country and killed off the people a thousands. British despots ruled the land making the lives of our people a misery. Very little indeed, were the comforts that they enjoyed and it gave them all they could do to keep body and soul together.

Little wonder, therefore, that the urge was ever present to rise up against this enslaving system and throw off the yoke of the English tyrants. Thanks be to God that although the lot of our forefathers was one of almost constant physical misery their spirit was never broken and there were always heroic leaders available to sacrifice their all in the cause of freedom.

This then was the position as the year 1867 dawned. It was to be a year which with many others before it, left an indelible mark on Irish history.

Preparations were made during the early months of memorable '67 and on the first Monday night of March to be exact, the date was March 4th bodies of young men, wrapped in their heavy frieze coats, might have been seen moving along the country roads throughout the land. It could be seen from the grim looks on their faces that theirs was no mission of frivolity or fun as these were determined men heroes all who were wending their way which had already been trodden by the dead heroes of the past, and their aim was to raise the Sunburst, Ireland's National flag at the end of the road and blow for the freedom of our land.

As the groups of men converged on their allotted meeting places throughout the country they did not know that the spies of England were already in the Dublin Castle gang. At one fell swoop the chiefs were arrested and imprisoned and English soldiery dispatched to various vantage points to deal with the peasant heroes of Ireland at the dawn of the day.

This then was how those brave sons fell. Some groups met with a fleeting success but with the leaders in shackles concerted action was lost and a fierce snow-storm which lashed the country on March 5th for five days covering the land with drifts up to seven and ten feet making roads impassable and turning gurgling streams into turbulent torrents wrote the end to the effort. What was practically over before it began and the frozen and bewildered men who had set out so manfully on the 4th of March realising that they were beaten made for their homes over the frozen and snow-covered roads and great numbers fell to the bullets of the English soldiers who were everywhere on the watch for the returning "rebels".

Meanwhile word had spread in America of the Rising in Ireland and the exiled Irishmen there as always set about sending help to the Motherland. There was a strong organisation of the Fenian Brotherhood there and prominent among them was a Passaic man named Baston Arms and ammunition were purchased and by the 12th of April following plans were completed for the dispatch of a ship loaded with rifles, sabres, artillery, and millions of rounds of ammunition. The task of sailing the ship successfully to the shores of Ireland was entrusted to another Waterfordman, Capt John F. Kavanagh, and on April 12th the "Erin's Hope" left New York in strict accordance with instructions to proceed to Sligo Bay or any other part of the coast where the cargo and passengers could be safely landed to the persons authorised to receive them.

Now you'll wonder what the "Jacknell" has to do with the story. Let me continue. To avoid contravening the strict neutrality laws of America at the time it was necessary to resort to a subterfuge. A ship sailing under an Irish flag with such a cargo, from an American port, would have immediately aroused suspicion and been arrested but the "Jacknell" left port flying the American flag and looked anything but what she was. She reached Sandyhook safely and was immediately approached by a small steamer in which were about forty men who, had left New York on a pleasure trip. In

truth they were all Irishmen who had rendered distinguished service during the American Civil War, and who were bent on returning to their native land to assist in their own fight for freedom. Soon the men were all aboard and the "Jacknell" once again was under weigh. After a week's sailing, Capt Kavanagh called a meeting of the principal officers aboard on April 21st and at this meeting it was unanimously decided to christen the ship, the "Erin's Hope" and at noon that day the crew and officers were mustered on deck.

The Captain addressed them and read aloud his orders from the Chief of Naval Affairs of the Fenian Brotherhood in America, John Powell, then as solemn since since raised the American flag was hauled down and the Sunburst was sent to the masthead. A salute of 32 guns echoed over the ocean one for every county in Ireland and the vessel was given its new name.

Thus began the epic voyage of the "Erin's Hope" of which I will have more to tell you next week.

(Funds are at present being collected for the erection of a memorial to the "Erin's Hope" which it is hoped will be completed for the summer. The site chosen overlooks Dungarvan Harbour just over Helwick pier).

### THE VANISHING HORSE

Dungarvan Horse Fair held on Friday last, was but a ghost of the fairs of old and spells out the fact that the horse is fast fading from the agricultural scene in Ireland. Mechanisation has superseded doblin and as one Irish farmer observed at the fair—John Duffy will be coming to me within twenty years to get a horse for his circus to show it to the public. It is a pity to see the era of one working horse so but the need for speed up production which is the modern urge leaves no room for sentiment.

### NO INTEREST

Only a handful of farmers turned up at the Town Hall Dungarvan on Sunday last for the scheduled meeting to protest against the cut in the price of wheat. Present were addressed by Mr J. O'Dwyer the South Kilkenny member on the Executive Council of the Creamery Milk Suppliers Association and a resolution was passed challenging the Government to reduce the incomes of any other section of the community by 16% as has been done to the farmers.

The policy of the present Minister of Agriculture, Mr James Dillon, was severely criticised.

## DUNGARVAN CIRCUIT COURT

**WORKMAN WHO MADE REMARKABLE RECOVERY GETS £1,000 COMPENSATION**  
**SETTLEMENT OF £1,650 IN TOURANEENA CASE**

The Hilary Sittings of the Dungarvan Circuit Court opened before his Lordship, Judge Roe, at Dungarvan on Tuesday last.

**Registration of Title**  
Nora Meade, Ralph, Glencarr, Lismore, was registered as owner of 4 acres and 3 roods of land jointly held by her and her brother Patrick until the latter's death on April 4th 1949.

Mr Michael O'Keefe was registered as full owner of 13 acres and 7 perches of land at Bohadon North, Dungarvan, of which he has been the sole and undisputed occupant since 1933.

The application was moved by Mr Hayes, B.L. instructed by Messrs J. F. Williams & Son, Solrs.

**Charge on Holding**  
Mr Hayes B.L. (instructed by Mr Williams) in an action brought by Michael Curran, Hardware Merchant, Graitan Square, Dungarvan, against William Burke, presently residing at Lagos, Nigeria, announced that defendant was consenting to a decree that plaintiff was entitled to a charge on his land at Ballyneety, Dungarvan. The charge was for £542 with interest which amounted to £574 10s 5d until defendant reduced it by £150 leaving a balance of £424 10s 5d now due. They wanted an order for sale from the Court to realise this balance.

Mr J. F. Kenny, solicitor for defendant, said that Burke had built a house at Ballyneety and had applied for two grants for it and had then left for Lagos. He was ignorant of the fact that one of the conditions governing the payment of the grants was that the applicant would have to reside in the house for five years. He had contracted a debt with Mr Curran for building materials to the sum of £550, the amount of the combined grants but the trouble arose when these grants were not forthcoming. Defendant had paid on £150 of the debt at Christmas and admitted that he owed the balance and also admitted that the amount of this balance was well charged on his land at Ballyneety.

Mr Hayes said that they wanted an order for sale to realise the balance now due and the payment of the grants was well charged on defendant's land and that it could be realised by an order for sale.

**Payment Out**  
An application on behalf of John Vincent Collins, 38 Grove Park, Rathmines, Dublin, formerly of Clonmel for the payment out of court of £63 12s 2d lodged to his credit was granted.

**Injunction In Trespass Case**  
In an application moved by Mr Eason, Solr, on behalf of Edward Finner, Glencorner Road, Clonmel, his Lordship granted an injunction against Patrick Fitzgerald Knockeylon, Killossanty, restraining him and his servants and agents from trespassing on the lands at Knockeylon. He decreed the matter of the amount of damages to be awarded for previous trespass and damage to the Co Registrar to be measured.

In an affidavit plaintiff swore that defendant had entered on the lands in question, had depastured them and had ploughed them up and taken crops off them and had threatened to continue to do so.

**Echo Of Youghal Road Crash**  
A collision between two cars at the Youghal Road, Dungarvan on Sunday, September 19th last had an echo when his Lordship granted Mrs Bridget Donnelly, Glencorner, Dungarvan, a decree for £94 8s 11d with costs.

Mr Lovat-Dolan B.L. (instructed by Messrs Farrell & Morrissey solrs) was for Mrs Donnelly, and Mr G. Clarke, B.L. (instructed by Messrs Williams, solrs) defended.

## WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL

**PURCHASE OF PRIORY HOUSE SELECT COMMITTEE TO NEGOTIATE PRICE**  
**TOWN COMMISSIONERS AND PUBLIC LIGHTING**

Mr M. Morrissey Chairman presided at the quarterly meeting of Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan on Monday last. Also present were Messrs T. Kyne, T. D. E. Power, J. Fahy, S. Ormonde, T. D. Leahy, F. Roche, W. Kennedy, T. D. McGrath, N. Walsh, J. Quirk, T. Morrissey, J. Kirwan, Senator J. Butler, W. Fitzgerald, Mr Hart, L. Morrissey, D. Heskin, R. Barron, N. Kelly and T. Power.

Messrs S. J. Moynihan Co. Manager, D. Sheedy Co. Engineer and J. G. Dowling, Secretary, were in attendance.

**Overdraft**  
Overdraft accommodation of £340,000 for the quarter ending 31st March was approved.

**Youghal Bridge**  
Arising from a letter from Cork County Council stating that Mr W. J. L. O'Connell, South Mall, Cork, had been appointed Consultant Engineer for Youghal Bridge, Mr Sheedy told Mr Leahy that plans would probably be ready by the end of the year. He added that in a little over twelve months at a guess work on the bridge would begin and it would take about two years to complete.

**Scholarship**  
A letter from S. Duggan, Abbeyside, Dungarvan, stated that as he had taken up a Civil Service appointment, he was relinquishing his University scholarship.

A letter from Guard P. Moynihan, Lismore, father of Sean Moynihan, next on the list applied for the relinquished scholarship on behalf of his son.

The application was approved on the proposal of Deputy Ormonde seconded by Mr Walsh, the scholarship to commence next October.

**Town Commissioners and Public Lighting**  
With reference to the opinion of Senior Counsel obtained with regard to the responsibility of Town Commissioners to pay for lighting on the streets, Mr E. Power, Chairman, Tramway Town Commissioners, asked if they decided to pay the cost of their own lighting would they also be asked to pay towards the lighting of the streets in the county.

He further asked what the effect on the agricultural rate of the County of the decision to make the Commissioners pay this cost would be.

The County Manager replied that the Commissioners would have to bear their share of the cost of lighting other places while the loss to the County on the agricultural rate if it was so decided would be about a year.

In reply to Mr Walsh, the Co. Manager said that the annual cost for lighting Tramway was £2650 and for Lismore £138.

The Chairman said that it was not fair that if Tramway paid for their own lighting they should be asked to pay towards other places.

Mr Quirk—The man up on the hill is paying for Tramway and is getting no benefit from it. The Council's Solicitor was asked that if the Commissioners paid for their own lighting the savings to the County would be roughly £700.

After further discussion it was decided to adopt the decision of the Council's Solicitor in taking the matter in order to give Tramway Commissioners an opportunity of securing independent legal opinion and also to look further into the effect of the decision if taken, on the county agricultural rate.

**Purchase Of Priory House**  
With reference to the Council's resolution at its last meeting requesting the Department of Health to advise them as to which of the two buildings Priory House and Irish Chemical Industries, Dungarvan, would prove the more suitable for reconstruction as a Health Clinic a letter from the Department stated that Irish Chemical Industries had been inspected in 1952 with regard to the provision of a dispensary and residence and had been found unsuitable for that purpose at that time. He therefore felt that it would prove more unsuitable for the more elaborate requirements of a health clinic. The letter added that the Department, therefore felt that the Council should proceed with the proposal to purchase Priory House as a Health Clinic.

Mr Walsh said that this meant that the Department had ruled out the premises at O'Connell Street so that the question before the Council was whether they would buy Priory House.

The Secretary told Mr Leahy that the Clinic would include a dispensary for Dungarvan.

The Chairman suggested that the matter be deferred until next meeting when it could be fully discussed.

Mr Heskin said that he could see no point in the Chairman's suggestion. The matter was one that should be dealt with with-

out further delay and for that reason he proposed that the Council adopt the resolution to purchase Priory House in accordance with the terms of the Department's letter and at a price within £4000.

Deputy Kyne seconded said that if he could be sure that the Council would put up the money for a new Clinic and that the Minister could be got to change his mind and not refuse a grant for it he would be in favour of such a building but as far as he could see in following this line the Council was running against a stone wall. A dispensary was badly needed in Dungarvan and there was no point in going against the Minister in the matter.

Deputy Kennedy said that he did not see why the Council should not build a new Clinic. Senator Butler said that the people of Dungarvan had been crying out for a dispensary for years and now a health Clinic was needed for specialist accommodation. The dispensary and clinic could now be got for a price which would be less out of rates than the cost of building a new dispensary. He could not see any sense in embarking on a scheme which would cost the ratepayers £10,000 when they could get it for £4000.

Mr Harty agreed that a dispensary and health clinic were needed in Dungarvan but he felt that the clinic should be as near as possible to the hospital. An amendment to Mr Heskin's resolution that the matter be deferred to the next meeting was then proposed by Deputy Kennedy and seconded by the Chairman.

A vote resulted as follows:  
For amendment—Messrs Kelly, L. Morrissey, Leahy, Kennedy, Kirwan, M. Morrissey and E. Power—Messrs Harty, Senator Butler, Kyne, McGrath, Fahy, Ormonde, Fitzgerald, Heskin, Walsh, Barron, N. Kelly, Quirk did not vote.

The Chairman declared the amendment lost and the resolution to purchase the Priory House carried on a similar vote.

**To Negotiate Price**  
Mr Walsh asked who was going to negotiate the purchase of the premises. Mr Quirk proposed that Mr Heskin and Mr Walsh with the Co. Manager act for the Council.

The Co. Manager said that he would prefer to see the Council's Solicitor with some members of the Council appointed for this purpose.

Mr Leahy said that if the premises were bought the Council should put a limit on the cost of its reconstruction.

Finally Messrs Walsh, Kyne, McGrath, Leahy and Kelly, with the Council's Solicitor were appointed to act for the Council in the negotiations and to report back to the Council.

Messrs Kirwan and L. Morrissey dissented from the decision.

**Extra Rooms For Rural Cottages**  
On the motion of Deputy Kyne the Council unanimously decided to include a token sum of £1,000 in this year's Estimates to meet the cost of providing extra rooms for Labourers Cottages in cases of overcrowding. The Co. Manager said that the cost of providing an extra room would be £320 towards which no grants were at present available.

On the proposal of Deputy Kyne the Council agreed that all road workers and similarly employed employees of the County such as lorry drivers, yardman etc. be granted the same free days as the clerical staff of the Council.

With Church holidays this means that the workers will also have Good Friday, Easter Monday, Whit Monday and the first Monday in August free with pay.

**Proposed Increase**  
Arising from an application by Mr J. Fahy for an increase in the wages of roadworkers of 5/- per week the Council decided to defer consideration of the matter to the Estimates meeting when Deputy Kyne said that the Union would have an application for an increase for its members in by then.




BODY FOUND ON STRAND AT BALLINACOURTY

Accidental Drowning Verdict At Inquest

Following a search by her nephew and a number of neighbours the body of Miss Ellen Walsh 71 year-old retired housekeeper who failed to return from a walk on Sunday evening was found on the rocks at the Strand at Ballinacourty, Dungarvan, early on last Monday morning.

An inquest into the sad tragedy was held at the Golf Clubhouse Ballinacourty on Monday evening by Dr. J. C. Walsh, Coroner for East Waterford sitting without a jury. Supt. P. Flanagan, Dungarvan, represented the authorities.

Went For Walk Mrs Catherine Power Ballinacourty sister of the deceased, stated I recognise the body as that of my sister Ellen Walsh aged 71. She was a retired housekeeper.

I last saw her alive on Sunday evening at about 5 pm. She then left the house to go for a walk. She lived with me. That was the last time I saw her alive as she didn't return. I went to see if she had gone to a neighbour's house but I got no word of her.

I then sent for my son and he with a number of neighbours went to look for her. On Monday morning at 9 am I was told by my son that he and Deuglan Terry had found her body on the Strand at Ballinacourty.

For about nine months she had been in indifferent health and was forgetful at times. She had been accustomed to going for a walk on the strand on fine days.

Was Drowned Dr M K Cusack, Dungarvan, deposed that he examined the body which was fully clothed except for shoes. The clothes were soaked in water. There were no external marks of violence. Rigor mortis was present and in his opinion death was due to drowning.

Saw Body On Rocks William Power Ballinacourty nephew of the deceased stated that he had gone with neighbours to search for her on Sunday night when she failed to return. He got no account of her at that time. He continued the search with Declan Terry on Monday morning and they saw a body on the rocks which they found was that of his aunt. She had been forgetful at times but had never threatened to do herself any harm. The place where they found the body was very rocky and uneven and it would be hard for a person to keep a footing.

Accidental The Coroner said that it was a case of an old feeble woman accustomed to going for a walk who on this occasion had slipped on a rocky uneven surface and fell into the tide. He accordingly returned a verdict of accidental drowning and expressed sympathy with the bereaved sister and relatives.

FATAL ACCIDENT AT KILMATHOMAS

On last Friday morning 21 year old Michael Walsh Ballybanogue Kilmathomas died when a new tractor overturned in a few hundred yards from his home and ploughed him underneath as he was taking milk to the roadside stand to be collected by a creamery lorry.
