**"AND THE SUN ON HIS LABOUR"**

**CONTRASTS IN THE PROGRESS OF EDUCATION**  
An interesting study in contrasts forms the background to an article written by my old friend Knocknagow, the first portion of which I give this week for the benefit of readers of this column. "Knocknagow" writes —  
"In these days, when education is so much stressed some sidelights, with the minimum of comments, may serve to remove misconceptions. It is almost needless to emphasise the connection between education and rational advance, or that between finance and educational progress. Here, as in other fields, you must pay for it. Other factors are important—buildings, books, programmes, some administration—but as Pearse pointed out, it is on the personality of the teacher, progress ultimately rests. It is the man behind the machine that counts. Vocational is vital, but even in the material sense, those who preach the Gospel must live by the Gospel."

**VIEWS OF PEARSE AND MOST REV DR O'DWYER.**  
In "The Murder Machine," penned forty years ago Pearse after emphasising the need for more initiative and more freedom for schools and teachers states — "Between the salaries offered to teachers and the excellence of a country's education there is a vital connection."

Twenty years previously, in his brilliant review of the diversity question, Most Rev. Dr. O'Dwyer, Bishop of Limerick, after contrasting the prosperity of Scotland, "land of brown heath and shaggy wood" with the poverty of Ireland, "with its climate soft as a mother's smile and the soil fruitful as God's love," goes on to say "If one thing is admitted as an axiom, it is that the progress of the country is education—its mainspring and its progress. His words scorching in his condemnation of the absence of co-ordination, are applicable to-day.

**EDUCATION AND PARTITION**  
It is incumbent on all who, discarding force, favour an amicable solution of Partition, to bring our various services of which education is admittedly in the front rank, to at least the level of those in the Six Counties. What is the present relative position as regards education? Taking per head of the population, all expenditure on education in the State, the inclusive figure for the current year is in shillings 95, 152, and 185 for the 26 Counties, 6 Counties and Great Britain respectively, figures in the ratio of 100, 180, and 205 in the above order. It is not surprising that 35 per cent of the total expenditure in Britain over 20 per cent in the Six Counties, 5 per cent here and of this 30 per cent goes to vocational education.

What are the rates for scholarships to Secondary and University education is relatively negligible. It averages 1/1d in the £ of the total valuation of the £ of the total valuation on education. The total aid given to students of ability by way of bursaries and scholarships, including those awarded by both the State and the universities does not reach £150,000 a year, a sum less than a fourth of the £600,000 so expended annually in the Six Counties where far greater provision has been made for Secondary education for a population of 45 per cent of ours. For our primary schools, there are neither fees nor rates aid nor, in effect, endowments.

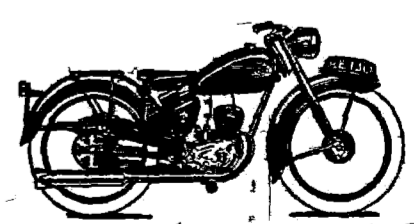

Michael Cullinan Ballyduff Dungarvan, said that at about 4 p.m. that evening he was on the Square and saw a bit of a row between Walsh and Manahan. He saw Walsh strike Manahan twice with his fist and Manahan fell to the ground and did not get up.

recovery of the lead Dealing with the receiving charges against Wyse Sergeant Liddane said that as a result of information he got he visited Wyse at his caravan and questioned him. Wyse admitted to him that he had bought some stuff from Dunne which he had sent on to a firm called Davis in Dublin. The lead was traced to this firm in Dublin. Michael Dunne in evidence said that he cut the copper pipe he took from the Council and put it in a bag and brought it to Wyse and got 35/- for it. Wyse told him that the Guards had been with him making inquiries about the pipe. He then told Wyse that he also had some lead which wasn't honest, and Wyse told him that the best thing to do with it was to bury it and hide it for the time being. To Mr. Farrell, solicitor witness said that he told Wyse that he had got the copper in Ardmore. Michael O'Brien said that when he brought the lead to Wyse he did not ask him where it came from. He got 16/- for it. He had tried to sell it to another dealer but she refused to take it when he told her that it was not honest. John W. Farrell, evidence, said that he was 35 years of age and dealt in scrap Dunne met him in the Square he said and told him he had some pipe. He asked Dunne where he got it, and Dunne told him that it came from Ardmore. He collected the pipe at the house of Dunne's mother in Wolfe Tone Road in broad daylight and took it to his own place in his van. He said that Dunne never said anything about the piping being dishonest. If he thought that it was he would not have touched it. He had sent it to Davis in Dublin. With regard to O'Brien, he said that he had told his Mrs. that he had got the lead in the dump. Mrs. Georgina Wyse, wife of the previous witness said that Dunne had never mentioned that the pipe was dishonest and she had no suspicion about O'Brien. Mr. Farrell, solicitor, said that the defendant had a very clear record and there was a great doubt in the case and he should be given the benefit of it. The Justice remarked that there would be no stealing if there were no receivers. There was, however, a doubt in the present case, not a very great one, but as it existed he would have to give the benefit of it to Wyse and he dismissed the charges against him on the merits. Sentence Suspended At this point Sergeant Liddane appealed to the Justice to suspend the sentence imposed on Dunne to avoid any possible hardships to his wife and children.
