THE RESURRECTION

Each Easter we commemorate the greatest mystery which the Catholic Church has founded, the Resurrection of Our Lord from the dead, and for us here in Ireland this commemoration has a second significance for at this time also we remember how our country after seven centuries of domination arose and broke the shackles of British domination and how the new Republic was born.

Throughout the land on Sunday and Monday next commemorative ceremonies will be held to honour the memory of those gallant men and women who, during the seven hundred years of bondage, gave their lives in every generation to cast off the yoke of England.

Here in County Waterford we will be remembering also the noble sacrifice of the late Sir James FitzGibbon, who was executed at Rosses in 1791. While Ireland holds these graves Ireland finds shall never be at peace.

The West Waterford IRA Easter Commemoration to honour our patriot dead, will be held this year at Ardmore on Easter Sunday, April 10th, where a Memorial Headstone will be unveiled at the grave of Volunteer Hurlon a member of the local Company. Hurlon was mortally wounded at Thurles in December 1921, when he and other prisoners released from Ardmore with full military honours.

A Committee of his old comrades of the 3rd Battalion have now marked the spot where the place beside the Round Tower of Ardmore, with a suitably inscribed headstone and matching curbs, and they are availing of the Annual Commemoration until this tribute to a comrade who made the supreme sacrifice. The ceremony will begin with a parade through Ardmore to the graveside where the memorial will be unveiled by Brigadier Command Pax Whelan. After the unveiling the Rosary will be recited, wreaths laid the 1916 Proclamation read by ceremony Chairman Command Jas Mansfield who will introduce the speaker of the oration. The Last Post will conclude the proceedings.

The Parade order subject to alteration will be as follows: 10.30 am Fall-in at Irish College, No. 1 Colour Party, 2 wreath bearers, Chairman, speaker and bugler, 3 Dungarvan Gaelic League Band, 4 West Waterford I.R.A. Unit, 5 Cumann na mBan, 6 Young Old IRA and band, 6 Republican Prisoners Aid Committee, 7 Ardmore G.A. 8 Other Bodies and general public.

The parade will proceed through the Village to the burial ground. All parties taking part should carry identity cards, banners or colours, giving the name of the organisation, and they should carry flags (with the exception of the National Flag). Shalloos at the College.

STATEMENTS CONCERNING APPOINTMENT OF COUNTY COUNCIL CLERKS

Solicitor's Letter to Chairman Demands Apology And Recompense

ESTIMATE FOR URBAN ROAD WORKS ADOPTED

A special meeting of the above was held on Monday night last to consider proposals of the County Council for Urban roads estimates.

Mr T Lannen Chairman presided and also present were Messrs Casey, T. McCarthy, T. Kyne, T.D., T. Lee, and N. Kelly.

Messrs D. Deery, Town Clerk, and P. Walshe B.E. were in attendance.

Apology for his inability to attend was received from Mr M J Keane which stated that he had to attend another meeting.

Proposed works on Urban Roads for the coming year estimated to cost £23,824, including a sum of £1,200 for maintenance works before the meeting.

These were as follows—

- (1) To regrade and surface the road from Emmet Street to Quarm's Strand—£200
- (2) To surface Sarsfield Street, (Abbeyside)—£170
- (3) To regrade and surface Cathedral Brugha Place—£150
- (4) To surface dress Strand Side South (Abbeyside)—£80
- (5) To surface Dress St St. Bridget Street—£80
- (6) To surface dress from Merry's to The Square—£140

The Clerk stated that last year the Council adopted a sum of £1,105 to carry out maintenance works only.

Mr Casey referred to the re-laying of the footpath at Bridge Street and said that while the Bank was paying for the new path outside their new premises, it was being extended up as far as Frasier's corner. The footpath above the bank was as good as in Kildare Street or College Green, Dublin, and he thought that the cost of re-laying it was a shocking waste of public money whether it came through the County or Urban ratepayers. He wished he said to lodge a strong protest against the work.

Referred To Engineer

A letter from Mrs E. Morrissey, The Hermitage, Abbeyside, concerning damage to her avenue during the recent cleaning of water pipes and trespass on her property, due to bad fencing at the boundary of Murphy's Place was referred to the Engineer.

Bank Holidays For Workers

Multis de Brun Secretary to the Committee was also in attendance.

Motheil Planting Scheme - The erection of a protective railing for the trees, and the levelling of the site at Motheil, was received from the Engineer's Department.

As the total grant forthcoming from An Bord Failte was 250 it was decided to try to complete the whole job within this figure by erecting a lighter type of fence and by the use of volunteers.

The matter of trespass on the site was again discussed. Mr MacCreagh agreed to investigate the possibility of local cooperation in this matter before the Committee would decide on any drastic action.

(d) Only copy extant of the original proclamation of Napper Tandy, dated 1810, and now in the possession of a resident of Tramore.

(e) Collection of papers and documents of historical interest formerly owned by the late Dan Fraher, and now in the possession of Pax Whelan.

The Secretary reported that he had written to the Secretary of the Board of Works relative to the provision of protective railings around National Monuments in the County. He wrote on the 21st February, 1955 and on the 10th March, was favoured with a formal acknowledgment of the receipt of the letter and was advised "to go ahead with a speed as great as you can."

The Committee was critical of the delay in dealing with this matter.
