CAN YOU HELP

A letter from Rev Fr F. X. Martin, O.S.A., at St. Patrick's Rome informs me that he read with interest my recent articles on "The Erin's Hope" and the part it played in the abortive Fenian Rising of 1867. Fr Martin is interested in another aspect of those historical times. He is gathering material for a life of Very Rev Fr James A. Anderson, O.S.A. who was Prior of the Augustinians at Dungarvan in the year 1869 and some years later. Fr Anderson was involved in a famous election at the time fought on the Fenian issue and succeeded in ousting the candidate sponsored by Dublin.

Fr Anderson, I understand, became known as "The Fenian Priest" and died sometime around 1902 and his obituary were written by Padraig Pearse and Arthur Griffith. Perhaps some of my readers may have in their possession or know of local information pertaining to the life of this great priest. If so I would be grateful to hear of any details, no matter how small, so that they may be included in Fr Martin's biography.

NOW AND THEN

A column in the "Cappoquin News" of the Leader dated the 7th May entitled "Dungarvan in the 1820's" has intrigued me very much since I read it, and I have been trying to visualise what the Old Boro' was like in those times. Having conjured up a picture in my mind's eye I find the comparison between then and now very revealing.

The first thing that struck me was that Dungarvan, in the span of almost a century and a half since Pigot wrote about it in his Directory, has not changed in its importance as the leading town in the County. Unfortunately the same cannot be said of several other of our County towns which flourished 150 years ago, but which have become mere shells of their former importance in the intervening years.

Getting back to the account covering Dungarvan, I was, as already stated, very interested and especially with the list of professional people and traders who carried on their professions and businesses at that time.

how many businesses are there in Dungarvan now which are being carried on by the third or fourth generation of the same family? Perhaps one or two, but no more. Count them yourself and see the passage of time indeed sees remarkable changes.

AS I SEE IT
Dungarvan Urban Councillors met on last Friday night to consider the County Manager's estimate of £210/10d for the coming year. I noted that this does not include a sum of about £100 to cover the application of the Union for a weekly increase of 7.6 to the Council's workmen nor a sum of approximately £150 to cover portion of the loan charges for the proposed new watermain at Killyrush. These additional items will push the estimate up about another 7d in the £.

However, if Senator Butler's suggestion that the County Council demand can be reduced by £1,400 holds good, this will mean a reduction of about 2/4d in the estimate at a first go. But what will the position be at any time if the fact that credit which Senator Butler expects the relief to come from will not become operative this year. I suggest that if the latter should be the case, the Council should be taken for the current period and the matter adjusted next year. The matter will be considered further on next Monday night.

There was much talk about examination panels at the last County Council meeting and I was surprised at the attitude taken by several of the members. Surely it cannot be reasonably held that just because a candidate successfully does an examination and is included on any panel that the fact of such inclusion carries with it the certainty of appointment to a position. To me such a view is nonsensical. The extension of the life of a panel which has been called is also to my mind an unreasonable view as this can cut out for years the hundreds of boys and girls who annually pass out from our various secondary schools, colleges and convents. Panels should be renewed by competitive examinations each year and candidates who find themselves far down the lists should realise that their chances of employment for the purposes of the panels are slim, and take alternative steps to obtain employment. The Civil Service Commissioners hold annual examinations for Clerical Officers and other Civil Service appointments as do most other branches where clerks are required annually. In these examinations the fact that a candidate passes is no surety that he or she will be called. Why then should our County Councillors seek to change this commonly accepted fact in the case of County Council appointments? **ATTACKS ON CORN
CROPS**
The cold weather of the past week has been accompanied in many districts by rather severe attacks by the wireworm and leather jacket grubs on corn crops. Many of the fields ploughed from ban or ley last year are apparently heavily infested with one or other type of insect pest. With the disappearance of the grass sod the pest is forced to turn attention to the growing corn crop. Growth of the crop has been slowed down and the ravages caused by these insect pests are now becoming apparent on corn, and sometimes on beet and mangel crops. If a crop is under severe attack by either jacket grub or wireworm, the farmer should take appropriate treatment consists in the laying of baits with the poisonous chemical, Paris Green. A mixture of 2 lbs of Paris Green to 20 lbs of Bran (pesticide acre) Unfortunately this material is in extremely scarce supply and may not be obtainable. The chemical B.C.C. has been proved to be very effective as a soil treatment against wireworm and other cut worm attacks on crops and proprietary forms of it are available. It should not be used in connection with potato crops because of the risk of causing unpleasant taints.

There is still another useful chemical which may be used to deter attacks by these insect pests. It is named Aldrin and is made up either as a dust or in liquid oil form in proprietary compounds. The liquid form may be used as a spray treatment for a crop under attack. Farmers should consult the Instructor in Agriculture if crops are showing signs of damage from cut worm attacks. The top dressing of a backward corn crop with Nitro lime following by rolling, is usually very beneficial in enabling it to withstand an attack by wireworm if such is present or threatening.

Reference To Free Milk Scheme
Mr T. Gallagher Vice-Chairman presided at the monthly meeting of the above held in Dungarvan on Monday last. Also present were Messrs T. D. Heskin, R. Barron, W. Kearney, T. D. N. Kelly and F. Roche.
Messrs J. Hynes Secretary, Mr M. Phelan Superintendent, Assistance Officer, Mrs P. Croke and Mr S. J. Moyinhan Co-Manager, were in attendance.

New Dispensary Doctors
The Secretary informed the members that the Co. Manager was recommending the Local Appointments Commissioners had appointed the following permanent dispensary doctors—Ballyduff S.O.—Dr Thomas P. McLaughlin, Ladyhill, 68 Ash Bank, Buckhill, Stoke-on-Trent, Kilmeaden—Dr Michael O'Dwyer, St. Joseph's Drive, Montecotte Park, Cork.
In reply to the Chairman the Secretary said that Dr McLaughlin was an Irishman born in County Monaghan in 1915.
Mr Kelly said that representations should be made by the Board to have the present temporary dispensary doctor at Ardmore who was very popular with the people appointed in a permanent capacity.
Deputy Kyne retorted that Mr Kelly was long enough in public life to know that the Board had no say in such appointments which were subject to the recommendation of the Local Appointments Commissioners and the fact that the only window dressing on Mr Kelly's part.

Dispensary Depot
A letter from the Department of Health with regard to previous correspondence on the proposal to set up a dispensary depot in the Ballymacarby district stated that the proposal was approved in principle. The Department suggested as the most suitable site somewhere on the road in the northern portion of Knockaunbrandaun.
It was decided to defer the matter until the views of the County Council representative for the area Mr P. Butler and Mr J. Fahy had been obtained as to the proposed site.

Free Milk Scheme
Deputy Kyne referring to the above said that a recipient in the rural area of Dungarvan had to cycle into town two miles each day to collect the milk from a contractor who was to deliver another contractor passed his door each day and could deliver the milk at the house. The case he said had been referred to the County M.O. who had ruled that the recipient would have to take the milk from the vendor to whom he was allocated. The position he added was typical of many others and he suggested that in the case where two vendors operated in an area that vouchers be issued to the recipients who could then exchange them with whatever vendor of the Board they wished.
The Secretary said that the matter was one for the County Council and the Board had no function in it.

Mr Phelan said that the position in Dungarvan was that there were two contractors whose areas of supply had been defined when the contracts had been made in April. Prior to that there had been give and take as regards customers between the parties but then some trouble arose and it was decided that all the urban recipients go to the Urban Contractor (Mr O'Donnell) and the rural recipients would go to the Rural Contractor (Mr Curran). The officials were not concerned as long as the recipients got the milk but the present position arose from the difficulty between the contractors.
Deputy Kyne said that the people to be considered under the scheme were the recipients and not the contractors.
The County Manager said that he would take the matter up with the County M.O. to see if some co-ordination could be worked out.

Dunmore Dispensary
The Board approved the purchase of a site at Dunmore for a new dispensary at £145.
The County Manager stated that the site was expensive but that it could not be got any cheaper.
