It was the only relic left of that glorious venture—all that remained of the "Naomh Níoclás" the fishing boat that was sailed in the waters around Ring and Helvick by Paid Mor O'Faolain 88 years ago and in which the American Fenian officers and men made their dramatic landing at Ballinagoul on the 1st June, 1867.

EXPENDITURE FOR KILRUSH WATERMAIN APPROVED

Increase Granted To Council Workmen

Mr N Kelly, Vice-Chairman presided at the ordinary fortnightly meeting of the above U.D.C. on Friday night, 2nd inst. present were Messrs T. Kyne, T. D. Lee, T. McCarthy, and M. J. Keane. Mr E Deery Town Clerk, was in attendance. £1,830 For Kilrush Watermain Approved. When further consideration of making application to the Minister for Local Government for sanction to raise a loan of £1,830 to lay approximately 1,020 yards of watermain to Kilrush loan to be repaid over a period of 10 years, came before the meeting, Mr Lee asked whether as decided at the last meeting, any meter test had been made to find out if there was a sufficient supply of water entering the area to meet the demands if new pipes were laid down. Mr Walsh Acting Borough Surveyor said that the tests showed that the supply was adequate in the Shandon area only. The last 830 yards of the existing, 1 1/2 inch main leading to Kilrush, was completely choked, he said, and it was his recommendation that at least this latter portion be re-laid.

In reply to Mr McCarthy he said that if this were done there would be plenty of water for everyone in that district.

Mr Lee then complained of the great scarcity of water in the Congress Villas and Cathal Brugha areas.

The Engineer said that the reason for this was the draw of the hospital. He agreed that if an alternative supply could be obtained for the hospital it would improve the position in that locality. Mr Walsh added that the water supply in the town would never be satisfactory until the supply coming in was increased. The average consumption for a town with 240,000 gallons per day but in Dungarvan it was 240,000 gallons. The draw offs required by the factory, creamery, etc. There was no doubt, he said, that the supply could not be improved purely on the basis of the existing distribution system.

Deputy Kyne moved the approval of the loan in view of the Engineer's recommendation. Mr Lee seconded and the proposal was passed with Mr Casey dissenting stating that the scheme was one which should be left to the incoming Council to decide.

Exchanges Between Contractor and Engineer

Mr E O'Brien and Mr V O'Brien (Messrs O'Brien Contractors, Abbeyside) came before the meeting and the latter who acted as spokesman said that they wanted to know what the position was with regard to their building programme and what the reasons were for the continued hold up.

The Town Clerk read the following order of the draw of 5081 Valuation, etc of houses—O'Brien (S D 3) Ref Order 5048A—Report of Mr E O'Brien Architect Cork that he had inspected two houses at Abbeyside built by Messrs O'Brien for Messrs Hogan and Griffin. The construction and workmanship generally was of reasonable standard but that—A—They do not comply with the Bye-laws in regards to the following:—

1)—The drainage system of each house should be connected by a separate drain to the main sewer in the road and a proper disconnection trap and fresh air inlet provided to the manhole nearest the sewer. The arrangements of the soil pipe and gully trap for sink bath and wash-basin wastes is so arranged as to be difficult of access for cleaning in case of blockage. 2)—A Scullery and Garage has been erected to each of these houses and the drain running underneath these two buildings should be encased in concrete suggesting that it should be checked and the piping case it necessary. 3)—That the plans, as approved for Mr O'Brien show fireplaces in the two first floor bedrooms in each house, that these had been omitted and that no adequate means of ventilation is provided to the outer air from the bedrooms. 4)—The flues are only cored with concrete and are not paved with mortar or lined with flue liners. 5)—That if the above items are attended to he was of the opinion that the valuation of each of these houses, including the normal expected life of these houses, provided reasonable maintenance is given to them, should be a minimum of fifty years.

With regard to 10 houses (including the above two houses and four pairs built by Mr O'Brien on the eastern side of (these houses) the drainage from nine of these ten houses is taken along the rear and connected into one mainhole in Mr. Hogan's garden near his front entrance. The drainage from the tenth house to the public sewer on the road that the tenth house (Mr Griffin's) is connected separately to the sewer from a manhole in his front garden. Mr Lee recommended that a new manhole should be built at the north-western corner of No 6 house and taken from that manhole to the public sewer including the provision of the necessary intercepting trap etc. that the other four houses including Messrs Griffin's and Hogan's should have a separate connection to the sewer completely with disconnection trap etc. Order That (a) the valuation of Messrs Griffin's and Hogan's houses be taken for the purpose of loans under Small Dwellings Acquisition Acts at £1,800 each and that the normal expected life of the houses be regarded as 50 years, provided that the items set out under A above are satisfactorily dealt with in accordance with paragraph (e) below. (b) Mr E O'Brien to be asked to arrange for the checking of the Acting Borough Surveyor of the drain underneath the two buildings and that the piping be replaced if necessary (as set out at A (2) above). (c) Mr O'Brien to be asked to notify the Town Clerk or Acting Borough Surveyor when the drain underneath the two buildings is replaced. (d) Valuations of other houses, for which plans will be submitted in the future, to be subject to the purpose of loans under Small Dwellings Acquisition Acts at £1,800 and expected life at 50 years, provided that the houses are of valuations similar to those of Messrs Griffin's and Hogan's. (e) Recommendations of Architect at (C) above to be carried out by Mr E O'Brien. (f) Instalments of loan to be granted on the certificate of the Acting Borough Surveyor to Messrs Griffin and Hogan, provided that the usual Agreement for the purpose of the above Undertaking in writing, as received from Mr E O'Brien that requirements as set out in this Order, will be complied with. Made the 16th day of May 1955.

The Clerk then stated that Messrs O'Brien had put up counter proposals to the foregoing and these were being considered by the County Manager at the moment.

THE "ERIN'S HOPE" MEMORIAL

Large Gathering Watch First Sod Cut On Site

There was a large gathering at Helvick on last Sunday evening to watch the first sod being officially cut from the site on which will stand the Memorial to the Fenians who landed from the Erin's Hope at Ballinagoul in 1867. The weather was ideal for the occasion and everything went off without a hitch. Game At Critical And Dark Juncture.

Mr N Whittle Chairman of the Memorial Committee said that they were present that day to honour the memory of the Fenians who had landed on the shores nearby at a critical and dark juncture of Irish history. The Memorial which was to be erected to their memory would be a reminder he said to future generations of the bravery that prompted their gallant action.

Mr Whittle also referred to the impoverished fishing industry of Ireland and the great emigration was as ripe today as it was 100 years ago. This should not be so as the people were now their own masters. The reason he mentioned this was that it had not been what the Fenians had fought and died for.

Before concluding Mr Whittle accorded a special welcome to Mrs Richard White, Passage East, a daughter of Captain John Kavanagh who had been Master of the "Erin's Hope" and to Messrs Níoclás O'Faolain Padraig O'Faolain and Batt O'Faolain of the Ballinagoul and Helvick areas. Grandfather of the Fenian leader who took the 32 Fenians ashore in his fishing boat the "Naomh Níoclás," subsequently re-named "An Finín." He also thanked the County Manager and the Waterford County Council for their generous offer of the site for the Memorial.

An Fear Mor then officially cut the first sod on the site and the Revellie was sounded by Mr M Terry. The Tricolour which was being flown at half-mast over the site was then raised to the masthead.

Their Effort Blossomed To Freedom In 1916

Addressing the attendance first in Irish and subsequently in English, An Fear Mor said: "Clárhad na nFinnín? Fe threofhad an cheist sin mor mhór dom rud éigin do mháistir d'aoibh i dtaobh an t-oidhche ar Erinn in 1867. The Fenian leader who took the 32 Fenians ashore in his fishing boat the "Naomh Níoclás," subsequently re-named "An Finín." He also thanked the County Manager and the Waterford County Council for their generous offer of the site for the Memorial.

An Fear Mor then quoted from a famous poem composed by Máire Ní Dhromma of Ballinagoul in the Famine nauid adubháil: "Nach E Dia do cheap namn an obair sin. Daoiné bochtá do chur 'e fuacht agus le fán. Iad do chur so Pur-húise do Lánamhátha. Póir is iad scarta go brath. A Dia na gloire fúir agus freagará sin. Scéal ar nglása agus reidhgh Is ar bheatha se arís do chroídh na cas oráinn. Is an Purhúise go leagair agus go brath."

Continuing in English—An Fear Mor said that in 1867 the Fenians in Ireland were unbearable and efforts were being made to organise a successful rising. Word of these preparations were sent to America and Irishmen there immediately set to work. The result was that a boat was chartered and 5,000 rounds of ammunition together with rifles, and 3 batteries of artillery—equipment for a whole brigade—was put on board. Forty trained officers and soldiers accompanied the munitions. They left America on April 12th, with their cargo of guns and ammunition and appeared on the Donegal coast a month later. They waited for signals for three days and then headed for Sligo Bay. Here a Fenian envoy contacted them and informed them of the abortive Rising and ordered them to sail south to Wexford. This they did. They were met by the dog their efforts. The weather was unsuitable and they could not land at Wexford. Later they came to Dungarvan Bay and with the help of the fishermen of Ring, thirty-two of them were landed. Owing to the sudden rising of a thick mist the landing operation was detected by the local Coastguards. Shortly afterwards, all but four of the landed Fenians were arrested and eventually put on trial in Dublin, and sentenced to periods of imprisonment ranging from eight to fifteen years. Twenty-eight men were exiled to Van Dieman's Land, where they com-

G. A. A. COMMENTS

Position of Hurling—The defeat of Waterford by Limerick in the Munster Senior Hurling Championship has focussed attention on the poor standard of hurling in the Decies. It is the general opinion however that it was not so much a defeat as a better team. Several of the selectors lacked the necessary physique while the majority of the team persisted in adopting the wrong kind of tactics—tactics that played into the hands of their opponents. Why do several of the players persist in endeavouring to lift the ball instead of striking first time as did all the Limerick men? It is suggested that the County Board give this very important matter the immediate and earnest consideration.

We suggest the following course—(1) That a panel of 25 or 30 players be selected and that only players from this panel be selected for inter-county competitions. (2) That the players chosen be of the necessary physique (do not send a boy on a man's errand). (3) That they be trained as a unit and that all players who do not carry out instructions be immediately dropped. (4) That a new selection committee be appointed, consisting of one member from each senior hurling club in the county. You may say where will this get us? Well they can't do worse and drastic and revolutionary measures are necessary if we are ever again to have a team as good as that of 1948.

Incidentally what were the outstanding characteristics of 1948 team. The answer is—physique and hurling ability.

Suspension of Johnny O'Conor

The full effects of the suspension of Johnny O'Conor are now apparent. It has done less harm to hurling in the county and has caused deep indignation amongst followers of the game throughout the Decies. The decision has been attributed to lack of concern on the part of those responsible. This is a possible explanation as undoubtedly the employment of a little tact and commonsense would have averted the crisis.

A Record?

To Waterford the first county to have deliberately deprived one of its own players the opportunity of competing in a Railway Cup Final? If so it is an unenviable record. We are informed that Johnny O'Conor more than any other player was responsible for Munster's success in the semi-final against Leinster.

The Senior Football Team

The senior football team are to be complimented on selecting what appears to be the best available XV. It is clear that the members of the committee rose above club attachments and as a result picked a team which has which can be relied upon to give a good account of itself in the Munster Championship.

Unjustified Criticism

We have heard criticism of the action of the County Board Chairman in suspending 45 players for attending foreign games in Waterford. We see no grounds for these criticisms. The Co Board Chairman's decision was in accordance with the Rules and should serve as a warning to others.

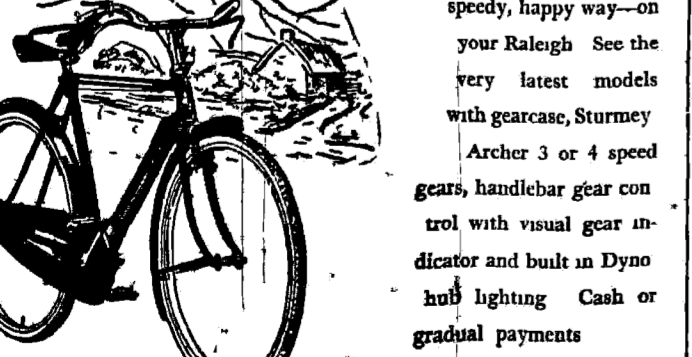

Player Suspended For Two Months

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The Chairman referred to the part of the minutes regarding the case of J. O'Connell (Abbeyside), who was suspended at last meeting because he would not sign a declaration stating that he would turn out for his county when and where they wanted. The player concerned had brought his case since the last meeting to the attention of the Board but they had unanimously upheld the decision of the County Board.

At a further stage of the meeting the Chairman in reply to Mr S. Eren (Abbeyside) stated that O'Connell was suspended for six months from the date of the offence but if he applied for reinstatement before that term had expired, attaching such a declaration agreeing to the conditions of the Board it would be granted, but after the six months had elapsed he would have to make no declaration.

Mr T. Cleary, Secretary, Waterford Old IRA Association in a letter to the Board asked if they would be willing to allocate 2 Hogan Stand and 2 Cusack's to the hurling team. The Secretary stated that they would have a draw for some money for their fund.

The Secretary stated that the Central Council were not very keen in allowing such tickets to be sold for raffish.

The Chairman stated that all should accept what the Secretary had stated, that it was contrary to practice within the Association to allocate such tickets for draws but as the cause was a worthy one they would endeavour to raise money in a suitable way.

Boundary Issue. A definition of the boundary between Eastern and Western Divisions in the coming year was brought before the meeting as a result of a letter from the Secretary Eastern Board who wanted the border defined at the last meeting regarding a number of players who played with Kilmacthomas junior hurling team at Dungarvan last year. The Secretary was instructed to write to the Secretary of the Kilmacthomas Club to seek the postal addresses of the players concerned. The County Secretary did as requested and had before him the required information which he read out to the delegates.

Mr J. O'Sullivan, Clona, stated that practically all the players named were residing in the Eastern Division.

The Chairman stated that all those players appeared on the register of the Kilmacthomas Club and he later ascertained that they also took part in a game with that team as was shown by the list of players in the programme of the game. He added that as players were affected and on the basis of evidence they had to hand that the rules were very specific in stating that a period of three months suspension was to be imposed on those who infringed the boundary rules. He stated that the players concerned as well as the Secretary of the Kilmacthomas Club should appear at the next meeting of the Board so as to get their views on the matter. He concluded that this practice has affected the Clona hurling team from getting together and proposed that the matter be investigated fully.

Mr O'Sullivan replied that Clona team did not mind so much if Kilmacthomas picked their players from around the boundary but when they were picked in the Eastern Division to get players and other players at that it was another matter.

Walk Over. The Secretary of the De La Salle senior football team in a letter to the Board stated that owing to the extreme youth of their players they had agreed to give Dunhill a walk over in the first round of the championship.

Reinstatements. A number of players were reinstated having suspended themselves for three months for attending foreign games.

A number of persons were suspended for three months for their attendance at soccer games. The Chairman stated that he would like to point out that according to the new rules at Congress that persons suspended under the foreign game ban would have to be reported on one month from the date of the offence, their names read out at a meeting of the Board and also the club of which the player was a member would have to be notified one week from date of offence.

Unassigned Letter. An unsigned letter to the Board making certain allegations against a West Waterford Club was next dealt with by the Chairman.

To Play With Stradally. Mr M. Foley, Secretary Stradally Football Club, made application that P. Sweeney, Waterford, a Kilmacthomas player, be allowed to play with this club although residing in East Waterford. The application of A. Kelly was withdrawn as he had gone to England.

In the cases of Sweeney and Power, both applications were rejected as the former was residing in Eastern Division, so he could not possibly play with Stradally. In Power's case as he had himself suspended for two years for playing foreign games, which time had not elapsed

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
