A PROFESSIONAL RATE
 The Urban Council of Dungarvan struck its fifth and final rate on last Friday night and a full report of the bad news will be found elsewhere in this issue of the *Leader*. It took two hours to do it even though for the last hour and a half minutes that the meeting lasted, there was not a constructive suggestion forthcoming. Within ten minutes of the start of the meeting a proposal by Senator Butler for the estimate reduced by 1/2d but from there on a further farthing was pared off and for all practical purposes the meeting could have ended there.

And now we have gone from pounds to guineas—two of them—in the payment of our rates. Sure it's grand to think that we have the privilege of paying our guineas—the rate of the professional man's fees. It should give us standing and a sense of progressiveness. When you think of it, that in 1949 our rates stood at the unimpressive sum of 30/-, surely we should be thankful that instead of that pound and ten shilling note, we can now pay two fine fat guineas. Marvellous and wonderful indeed—we should be very thankful to the great honour which our Urban Council has bestowed on us.

"DEISEACH" DESCENDS FROM THE HEIGHTS

RATES INCREASED BY 2/- IN £

"WILL BE SHOCK FOR RATEPAYERS"

Dungarvan Urban Council met for the third time to consider the Rates Estimates for the coming year on last Friday night. Mr T Lannen Chairman, presiding Also present were Messrs T Kyne TD, T Lee Senator Butler T McCarthy, M J Keane and P A. Shannon. Messrs S Mounihan County Manager P Walsh Acting Borough Surveyor and E Deery Town Clerk, were in attendance.

At the outset, Senator Butler said that consideration of the estimates had been adjourned on the last occasion to allow Deputy Kyne and himself see the Minister for Local Government, to find out whether they could take advantage of the new Local Government Act under which the demand by the County Council on the Urban Council would be reduced by £1,400 an equivalent of 1/4 in the £ on the rates. They had seen the Minister and he had told them that that part of the Act under which they expected to obtain the relief was not yet in operation. It would be operative next year and thus being so said Senator Butler I think that we should take advantage of it for at least half of the demand or a sum of £700.

The County Manager replied that his original estimate had been for 42/10d but due to the Council approving an increase of 7/6 a week in the men's wages and the laying of a new water-main at Killyrush at a cost of £1,830 since he first presented a further 5d would have to be added to this bringing the total of the estimates to 43/3d in the £.

Senator Butler—Then as a first step to reducing that, I propose that the Council should not strike the full amount of the County Council demand and that it be reduced by £700.

Mr McCarthy seconded Mr Casey said that he could not see this as a good business. They were faced with the second highest rate in the country but by putting £700 on the long finger they would only be commencing the new Council for next year.

Senator Butler—We'll be putting nothing on the new Council. The Co Manager said that the relief of £1,400 if the demand for 42/10d in accordance with the new Act as estimated by the Co Accountant was correct but if the Council decided to take credit for half that amount they would have to consider that they would have to pay interest on an overdraft at the end of the year. However the matter was one for the Council to decide and he would not object provided the £700 outstanding was repaid next year.

Bad Business
 Mr Casey again said that in his opinion it would be bad business to borrow to meet their commitments as they would have the addition of meetings the interest on the overdraft. The Co Manager said that he did not think that any credit should be taken under the new Act as suggested and that no other Urban Council in the country had done so.

The Chairman asked how they were to know that the position would be the same next year as this year and Senator Butler replied that if there were any alterations they would be very slight.

Reference To Inspection Of Houses
 The Chairman referring to the report of Messrs O'Brien said that very costly Engineers had been brought in about these houses and he asked what they had cost.

Do Council Elections...
 The election campaign is now in full swing in this area and candidates of all parties are busy as the Aglish and Clashmore areas are at present without a representative a heavy poll is expected in these two parishes.

Labour—We expect to get an increased poll. The Labour Party stands for improved social services. We will continue to support P F or any party in opposition to P F.

Candidate's Address—Addressing a meeting of the Clashmore F.F., Mr C Curran (candidate) said that no direct representation on the Council, with the result that their interests were neglected. The by-roads in the rural areas were a disgrace. The new Council should do away with red tape and put the interests of the people before all other considerations. They should be prepared to work for all sections of the community. He appealed to the electors to realize the importance of the elections and to record their votes.

Only Reduction Suggested

Chairman—I am objecting to it and in doing so I am voicing my opinion and I say that in fairness to the people of Dungarvan who are paying for this it should not have happened last year.

Chairman—I don't see why those Engineers should have been brought down here at all. We have an Engineer of our own who is being paid and if other Engineers were brought in I think they should have been paid by the people concerned. Deputy Kyne said that the outside Engineers were brought in on the recommendation of the Council.

A brother of Fr Dowley Rev Martin Dowley, was P.P. of Ballyduff where he died on Good Friday 1936.

DEPUTY KYNE'S VIEWS ON BUDGET

Deputy Kyne speaking in the Dail on the Budget, stated— I normally do not base my speeches on what the previous speaker has said but because Deputy Flanagan a man for whom I have a very high regard has repeated what has been the theme of my speech, I thought it only right that I should give my views on it. He has repeatedly stated that it was the promises of the inter-party agreement that secured us majority vote at the last election. None of us in this House would dispute that. It is a Simon Pure in all the elections that are to come—as in the past election and elections before it. The average Irish elector is a pretty shrewd person who judges both parties and Deputies on what they are actually doing in the House. Deputies and that Government or as either a Government or as failure of a Deputy is based purely on the work he does here and nothing else. A man can talk a good game but he will not be returned here if he is not doing the job that he is elected to do. I suggest that it is not in 1952.

I must confess that on first hearing the Minister's Budget speech I felt certain slight disappointment. I had hoped that perhaps being a Labour Deputy he would hold certain views different from those of other people—that of a pensioner who gets a little more than he has. I had also hoped that the Minister would have some views on the National Health and Unemployment Benefit for single persons. I must confess that I do not think it can be denied by anyone, unless he is speaking with some political motive that these benefits are small and that it is difficult to get on them at present, and I agree that it will be generally conceded that if any concessions should have been given to them, they would have been given to the fact that we are not able to give to the Government to plan some system which will have the economic life of the country will be so arranged that the social welfare benefits to the needy group will be brought to a higher standard and the economic standard of Ireland raised to a higher level. This, I agree cannot be done overnight but I suggest most of us are progressive stages and it is the duty of this Government to plan these stages in office. We will be able to announce in so far as we have attained the objectives of our programme when we set out as a Government.

On reconsideration of the Budget on thinking over the Minister's conclusion that this Budget has given the people most in need the maximum that could be given. The old age pensioners and the blind and the widows and orphans have received a measure of justice that has not been given to them for a quite long time. Were it not for the insistent voice of the Labour Party I would imagine that the Minister would only now be announcing a further concession. As a matter of fact the reduction in the rate of the butler which we yelled for earlier last year would now be applauded throughout the country, because the total money required to reduce the butler was only announced yesterday. When you compare the £2,000,000 when you add £1,250,000 to the social welfare benefits, you will find that over £4,000,000 has been conceded by the Minister mainly to the group that I represent, the widows, the pensioners, the children under the income tax code from £85 to £100 is a direct help to the average working body with an income of £300 will qualify. All those who have the different time can in truth be classified as working people. The only way to look at this country will look at it is to say that it is with that of 1952. It is true that in this Budget we have not reduced the price of butter which has been enormously but the cost of living that we have not increased has given concessions to the tantamount to an increase. I do not want to dwell on what concessions were given in the Budget announced by the Minister and Newspapers carried statements about and analyses of the various things I would refer to deal with the matter from the Labour point of view. I would prefer to deal with the problems still facing the country. I would like to thank the Minister for too much complacency if he has such on the question of employment or unemployment in this country. The statement that we have 5,000 or thereabouts on an average fewer unemployed is not to me good enough. We have 60,000 or 70,000 out of

Let us be clear. If workers are given increased production they are entitled to an increased wage. If we have a political harder unless he has some initiative and the initiative is to secure for himself and his family a higher standard of living. Provided he gives that increased production there is no reason why the cost of our commodities should be any higher than they are at present. I believe that one of the causes of some of the depression here is that the Government has as a whole is on an average much too low. If we had the lower standard increased we would have a much larger market for our consumer goods. I believe that would solve to some extent the problem of emigration.

There is just one other point I would like to mention and that is on the much disputed question of tea. Whether or not we have a tea will in fact be reduced by next September. It does not interest me in the fact that tea has not risen in September we find that tea we have not fallen low enough to permit us to carry on the normal price, then one who will press that it should be subsidised in order to keep the price as it is.

Whatever the reason, tea has not risen for the past six months when we underwrite a balance for a tea company whether by direct payment we pay the difference it is subsidised. I am not ashamed to say that I think it is good policy to see that essential commodities are subsidised and kept within the reach of the people. These are part of our election promises and the promises we are now keeping.

Deputy Lemass I understand during yesterday afternoon voted much time to quotations of what I had said over a number of years here speaking as Chairman of the Labour Party. I know what the particular quotations were. I repeat them today I have no doubt, to what my policy is. I have no doubt as to what the Labour Party policy is.

I would remind Deputy Lemass that this is not a Labour Party Budget. The Inter-Party Government is not a Labour Government. At the end of his Budget speech the Minister stated quite clearly that this Budget was the first instalment of a series of measures which the Government for the next four years ensuring that that promise of the Minister is implemented. We realise that there are two sides or possibly three sides to this inter-party government and that policy cannot be all the one way. All three groups forming the Government have enough honesty of purpose and enough intelligence to know that they cannot have their own way. We have decided on an agreed programme with the aid of Providence we will be able to return to the public and say that, in so far as was possible that programme has been fulfilled. Labour is satisfied that its side of the bargain will be kept. Labour realises that if it is not a Labour Budget it does a lot better than no bread.
