ANNUAL CORPUS CHRISTI PROCESSION
 Striking Demonstrations Of Faith

A huge congregation from Dungarvan Abbeyside and outlying districts, gathered together on Sunday last to combine in one of the most striking acts of public worship to the Blessed Eucharist ever witnessed in Dungarvan. It was a striking demonstration of their faith and revealed in no uncertain manner the reverence and high honour attributed to the Blessed Sacrament by them.

Up to late on Saturday night and on Sunday morning as the townspeople were putting the finishing touches to house and street decorations, the weather was anything but favourable. But brilliant sunshine with a cooling breeze in the afternoon made weather conditions ideal as the King of Hosts was borne proudly through the streets of the town. Along the route of the procession, the streets were well decorated with bunting and flags and every house had its windows decorated with garlands of flowers in which were displayed statues and holy pictures all paying tribute in their own little way to their Saviour.

The Dungarvan Brass and Reed Band in charge of Mr. T. Costin struck up the sacred music as Ven. Archdeacon Power P.P., V.F., assisted by Rev. Fr. M. Walsh, C.C., Abbeyside, and Rev. Fr. J. Power, Port Elizabeth, South Africa, left St. Mary's Parish Church, bearing the Sacred Host in a beautiful monstrance and the procession moved off.

Along Mitchel Street where the Presentation Community had their usual magnificent display the procession turned down Wolfe Tone Road and along South Terrace and moved on to the Square, which was transformed into a place of beauty. Here Benediction was imparted.

On resuming the great body of men, women and children wended their way through Main Street, Church Street and Convent Row. The nuns of the Mercy Order, as befitting the occasion had some wonderful decorations with their little pupils holding multi-coloured flags and streamers. The processionists then proceeded to the Parish Church gates where the final Benediction was imparted before the Sacred Host was returned to the Church.

There was a Guard of Honour provided by the Garda Siochana, under Supt. P. Farnagan and the Abbeyside Boy Scouts under the supervision of Scoutmaster, Mr. L. F. Lanigan performed duties at the corners around which the procession passed. All the priests of the parish, assisted by several of the clergy from neighbouring parishes, participated in the procession and led the recitation of Rosaries and Litanies.

He had raised this matter on a number of occasions in the past 12 months he said but for some reason the explanation he wanted was always put off. If something wasn't done soon he would propose that the houses be inspected by a Department Inspector. It was an awful thing he said, that new houses had to be repaired inside two years.

Mr. Kirwan said that he had similar complaints about the houses at Bonmahon and Stradbally. It was a scandal, he added.

Mr. McGrath—What's wrong with them?

Mr. Roche—I'll tell you what's wrong. The Clerk of Works who was on the job was also engaged in two other areas and when he went off the job, anything went, anything, and that meant the concrete wasn't up to strength without being tamped. Then at 11 o'clock at night and there was no official of the Council on the job at that time.

Mr. Quirk—Whoever was wrong in this should be brought to book.

Mr. Keyes Housing Section said that there was still retention money held in respect of these houses.

The Co. Manager assured Mr. Roche and Mr. Kirwan that a full report on the houses would be prepared by the Council's Engineer for the next meeting.

Footpaths
 Senator Butler and Deputy Kyne drew attention to the shocking condition of the footpaths at Shalton, Dungarvan and the latter said that he was under the impression that the money for these footpaths had been passed 2 years ago but must have been spent on something else. It was scandalous he said that they should have been left as they are.

Senator Butler said that everyone was very dissatisfied with the position.

The Engineer said that no money had been provided to do the footpaths during the past 3 years.

Other Items
 The Engineer told Mr. Fahey that repairs would be done to the road to Knockacoola and Barranshangan.

The Secretary told Mr. Harty that no reply had so far been received from the Department concerning the proposal to erect a sluice gate at the mouth of the Brickey at Killongford.

Burial Ground for Templemichael
 The Secretary read the following report:
 The County Medical Officer has recommended the closing of the old burial ground at Templemichael (which is vested in the Representative Church Body) on the grounds that it is overcrowded and that no further burials be permitted for the protection of public health and the maintenance of public decency.

A suitable site for alternative burial ground has been selected by the County Engineer, being a portion of a field of 2½ acres the property of Mr. Siney of Boola, Templemichael, Youghal. A plot containing 1 acre is intended as a site for a new school, leaving 1½ acres for use as a burial ground which can probably be obtained for a sum of £75.

The County Engineer estimates that the cost of providing a new burial ground on the site will be £1,800.

The matter is submitted for the consideration of the Council and for their approval if thought fit, for the proposal to provide a new cemetery. It is suggested that the cost be met by way of a loan from the Local Loans Fund, repayable over a period of 25 years.

Before any Order is made by the Minister for the closing of the old cemetery a Public Inquiry should be held.

CHAIRMAN OBJECTS TO CONTRACTOR'S CRITICISM REMARK OF CONSPIRACY WITHDRAWN

The last meeting of the recently constituted Urban Council of Dungarvan had a stormy passage and nearly broke up in disorder on last Friday night...

At the request of other members of the Council Mr O'Brien withdrew his remark and the Chairman was prevailed on to resume the chair and the meeting continued.

Present at the meeting were Messrs T Lannen, Chairman, P Casey, T. D. N. Kelly, T. McCarthy, T. Lee and R. Walsh. Mr E Deery Town Clerk, was in attendance.

The matter arose when Mr O'Brien, senior and Mr O'Brien junior came before the meeting to let the people of Dungarvan know on the eve of an election what was happening to them with regard to the building of their houses.

Chairman—Now Mr O'Brien I will allow no attack to be made on our Borough Surveyor or any other official by anyone other than a member of this Council.

Mr O'Brien—At the last meeting you made a remark about a rumour you heard that the title of these houses would be 20 years.

Chairman—If you want to challenge me on any statement I made here you can stand for election, but I won't allow anyone to challenge me in this manner.

Mr O'Brien—I demand justice under my rights according to the Constitution.

Chairman—Now Mr O'Brien if you want to make a case about your houses make it, or else get out.

Mr McCarthy—You have no authority more than any other member here to say that Chairman—Now Mr McCarthy I'm Chairman here and while I am I will do things my way, but if you want to come up and have a go at me you can.

Mr McCarthy—I don't want it, but I presided over this Council for 8 years until I was done out of it wrongly and while I was in the chair I left every man talk all he likes over my head.

Chairman—If he wants to make a case for his houses he can, but I won't allow anyone to criticize me it's another thing.

Mr McCarthy—That's your opinion but you won't shut me up. You're a bully.

Chairman—This you're the out of control but you won't stop me from doing my duty or shut me up.

Purchase of Houses. A request to the Department to sanction a loan of £1,080 for the acquisition and reconstruction of five houses at King St, Abbeyside the property of the Hudson Estate was approved.

Other Items. Mr Casey referred to the footpaths at Shandon and said that they were the worst in town.

The Clerk told Mr Lee that the plan for building a cinema at Mr David Hegarty's Ballintra was in the hands of the Solicitor for the preparation of the Compulsory Purchase Order.

Mr Casey stressed the need of an early preparation of plans in connection with the winter relief scheme grants.

The Engineer is to be instructed to prepare plans and to examine the possibility of including Turkish baths at the old bathing place.
