THE SPIRIT OF THE NATION
Congratulations to the organising Committee of Feis na nDeise for the wonderful success which attended their efforts this year. The growth of this festival of Irish Culture since it was first started five years ago has been phenomenal and the number of entries received for all competitions must mark a new not only as the biggest of its kind in the Province, but in the country.

Popular competitions this year were the step dancing, and here again there has been a wonderful growth in the number of entries. Five years ago a mere handful of dancers entered the competitions but despite the fact that dancing competitions had been held on five previous occasions it was the principal whole day and half the night had to be given over to the final dancing sessions on last Sunday. I watched dancing costumes the colours of which must have represented all the principal dancing schools in Munster and Leinster, while nimble feet wove the intricate patterns of the various beautiful dances it amazed me to see with what lightness precision and energy the dancers took the stage at a very late hour and the enthusiasm displayed by the competitors was infectious—I found I didn't want to leave even though my watch told me that it was past midnight.

How the musicians struck to their posts the whole day was a mystery to me and greater still was the mystery of how champion dancer Rory O'Connor sat through the long hours adjudicating one competition after another. That the huge entry was dealt with in a non-stop fashion was a tribute to the organising ability of Liam Comartin and Eridín O'Riordan whose job it was to deal with the competitors whose number ran into hundreds and their untiring attention throughout the entire time (more than 12 hours) cannot be praised without the highest praise.

In the other competitions Singing Poetry and Verse-Speaking we also had wonderfully high standards and variety and now that the Feis, as the organisers must feel justifiably proud of their efforts. One thing that struck me throughout the course of the Feis was that in all competitions Irish music was the dominant feature and it would appear that the girls mind facing the public less than do our shy young boys.

Feisanna are run to encourage Irish Culture and embrace every tradition of Ireland—language customs, dress. One should not be stressed to the detriment of others. I heard very little Irish spoken by the dancers. Perhaps the teachers could, for the future, encourage it more.

Again I say a thousand thanks and heartfelt congratulations and may Feis na nDeise long prosper.

Dungarvan Urban Council DEPUTY KYNE ELECTED CHAIRMAN NEW MEMBER IS VICE-CHAIRMAN

The Annual Meeting of the newly-elected Urban Council of Dungarvan was held on Monday last. Only six of the nine members were present. Messrs T. Lannan, Senator J. Butler, J. McCarthy, D. Moloney, E. Keane, the absent members were Deputy Kyne, Messrs P. Casey and N. Kelly.

Mr Lannan the outgoing Chairman presided at the meeting and Mr E. Deery, Town Clerk was in attendance. The Town Clerk informed the meeting that Mr Kelly was absent from the meeting due to illness. Mr Kelly was unable to attend due to illness. I heard someone remark that it was diplomatic, but I know nothing of that. No reason was given for Mr Casey's absence.

In his maiden speech proposing Deputy Kyne for the Chair Mr Johnny McCarthy spoke extremely well and I am sure that he will make a sound and very able public representative.

A legal snag cropped up during the election of vice-chairman, as following the proposal of Nicholas Kelly for the position Senator Butler challenged Mr Kelly's eligibility. He had not signed the declaration of acceptance of office. Clarification of the position was sought from the Legal Adviser over the phone and his opinion upheld Senator Butler's point. A new business associated with the whole day and half the night had to be given over to the final dancing sessions on last Sunday. Deputy Kyne, New Chairman
Mr J. McCarthy the new Labour member on the Council proposed Deputy Kyne as chairman. Deputy Kyne, said Mr McCarthy has the distinction of being not only a deputy in Dail Eireann representing the Waterford Constituency, but he is the only man in the country who is an Alderman of his Corporation, a member of his County Council and a member of his Urban Council. He is said Mr McCarthy is eminently suited to carry out the duties of Chairman and would by virtue of his position add weight to any requests sent by the Council to any Government Department during his term of office.

His absence today from his meeting continued Mr McCarthy is the result of his instructions to attend the Corporation meeting in Waterford held at the same hour as this meeting. This will be the only occasion on which such a clash need occur as statutory with a date and hour fixed. He has agreed to forego the chance of voting for himself, that he might vote for a worthy colleague as Mayor of Waterford.

Mr McCarthy's proposal was duly seconded by the Independent Labour member.

Mr D. Moloney (Ind) proposed Mr D. Moloney (Ind) for the position, but there was no contender and as there was no further proposal, Deputy Kyne was declared elected Chairman in his absence.

Mr Lannan congratulated Deputy Kyne, who, he said, would make an excellent Chairman and he wished him every success.

Mr McCarthy on behalf of Deputy Kyne thanked the members.

The Vice Chairman
Mr R. Keane (FF) proposed Mr N. Kelly (FF) for the Vice Chairmanship.

Senator Butler (FG)—On a point of order, has Mr Kelly signed the declaration of acceptance of office?

Town Clerk—No.

Senator Butler—Then he is not a Council member and until he does so he is not eligible.

The Town Clerk said that he understood that although Mr Kelly had not signed the declaration he was eligible for proposal but he suggested getting in touch with the Council's legal adviser on the matter.

The Clerk was then directed to inform Mr Farrell, Soir, and later informed the members that the Solicitor's opinion was that a member was not eligible for election until he had signed the declaration.

Mr Keane then proposed Mr Moloney and Mr McCarthy seconded and there being no other proposal Mr Moloney was declared elected Vice-Chairman and took the Chair, and thanked the members for the honour they had conferred on him.

Before vacating the Chair Mr Lannan thanked the Town Clerk and officials for the cooperation they had given him during the past five years.

Members on Vocational Committee
The two members elected on the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee were Mr P. Casey (proposed by Mr Lannan) and Mr T. McCarthy (a defeated member of the Council) (proposed by Mr Keane and seconded by Mr J. McCarthy).

On the proposal of Senator Butler it was decided to save the expense and not appoint any delegate to the Association of Municipal Authorities. Mr Keane seconded the proposal said that he did so as it saved money.

The meeting then ended.

FEIS na nDEISE Results Of Concluding Competitions

Adjudicating at the Verse Speaking Competition, Professor D. O'Donovan Cork referred to the remarkable all round improvement achieved since the previous Feis.

He paid a special tribute to the choir and their teachers but warned against overdoing the effects which he said were strictly subsidiary. The Senior Choir was excellent and their pieces were excellently rendered showing intense hard work and preparation.

Professor O'Donovan said that he regretted the small entry in the adult section compared with the junior, but it was pleasing to see the greatly increased entry in the Irish section.

He warned the competitors against exaggerating their vowels and hitting rhymes too hard. This was bad in English, he said, but when applied to Irish was atrocious. Acoustic competitors to be natural he reminded them that they were Irish and phony accents and affected should be completely eliminated. He concluded by saying that the Irish section would rarely should be taken with the phonetics to get full value from this highly musical language.

Dungarvan & Lismore Circuit Courts ECHO OF COLLISION AT DUNGARVAN

DAMAGES FOR GIRL PASSENGERS
The Trinity Sittings of the Dungarvan and Lismore Circuit Courts were held before the Lordship Judge Roe, at the Courtroom, Dungarvan, on Tuesday and Wednesday last.

Decree For Mackey Car Owner
His Lordship awarded a decree of £100 by consent to James Crotty, Mackey car owner, New Lane Abbeyside, against Richard Lucey Durrow Strabally arising from a collision between plaintiff's and defendant's cars at Carrigahulla on the 14th May 1953.

A sum of £22 for costs was included in the settlement.

Damage To Racing Boat
Mr G. T. Eason, solicitor, announced a settlement of £200 with taxed costs in the claim brought by the Waterford Boat Club against C.T.E. Plamonts, claimed damages against defendants for alleged negligence and breach of duties on June 30th 1954, when a bus was driven into and collided with a clinker eight racing boat. The settlement included the taking over of the damaged boat by the defendants.

Application For Committal
Mr G. T. Eason, solicitor, Waterford, on behalf of Edward Power, G'Conner Road, Clonroche, applied for the committal to prison of Patrick Fitzgerald, Knockyellon, Kilrossanty, for contempt of court in that the defendant ignored the Court's order granted on the 15th February last restraining him from trespassing on plaintiff's lands at Knockyellon.

There was no appearance for the defendant.

Sergeant Tierney Leamy, gave evidence of meeting defendant on the lands at Knockyellon on last Saturday and said that he knew that defendant had stock and tillage on the holding. He had a conversation with him and told him the serious consequence of his action and that he would likely end up in jail if he ignored the Court's order.

Witness said that the defendant replied that he knew that.

Patrick Mansfield in evidence said that he was the summons served for the area. When he was on the defendant's land he found him in the yard on the lands. He saw mangels and turnips sown which could not have been sown more than two weeks, and also some cattle.

The Judge then asked Mr Eason if the plaintiff was present to give evidence.

Mr Eason replied that he was not.

Judge—The only one to prove that there has been trespass on the holding is the defendant. I heard that defendant has been on the lands but he could be there with the owner's consent.

Mr Eason then asked his Lordship to let the case stand over until the following morning when he would have the plaintiff in court.

His Lordship again called Sergeant Tierney and asked him to take a note from the position to the defendant informing him that the application for his committal to prison was before the court and that it would be wise for him to attend if he doesn't attend said his Lordship, tell him that he will go to jail.

Sergeant Tierney said that he would do so and the case was then left stand over.

Prizes For Young Girls
Arising from a collision between two cars owned respectively by Mrs. Donnelly, Glenmore, Dungarvan and Michael Moloney, Burgery, Dungarvan, which occurred at Youghal Road, Dungarvan, on September 16th 1954, settlement was announced in the personal injuries claims brought by Winifred (16),

and Margaret Donnelly (15) both of Glenmore who were passengers on the mother's car on the occasion against Michael Moloney.

Mr Lovatt-Dolan, B.L. (instructed by Farrell and Morrissey) for the plaintiffs, said that Winifred Donnelly had sustained a severe blow on her forehead and shoulder but had made excellent progress since in that case the settlement was for £41 plus 20 guineas costs out of which a sum of 12 guineas would be paid for medical expenses.

In the case of Margaret Donnelly she had suffered severe concussion, one tooth had been knocked out and three loosened as a result of which six had to be extracted. Later all her upper teeth decayed and all would have to be extracted. Medical fees due to her on Thursday estimated £22 for further dental treatment required.

Mr Browne, Dentist, gave evidence of the dental treatment.

Mr Lovatt-Dolan then stated that the settlement in his case was for £250 less the medical and dental fees together with taxed costs.

His Lordship approved both settlements and ordered that the separate credits in court to the plaintiffs, to be lodged in the Waterford Savings Bank.

IRISH TREASURE



The shrine of St Maelruain's Missal better known as the "Stowe Missal" was made in 1023 by Dunchod O Tagan of Clonmacnoise for the King of Cashel and Donnchad O'Brien, King of Ireland, to contain one of the old Irish manuscripts dating from 6th or 7th century. The cover was made at a later date about the end of the 14th century. The shrine which was kept at Tallaght Co. Dublin, was lost to Ireland for some time but fortunately was found again in Bavaria and is now one of the treasures of the National Museum Dublin.
