Waterford County Council Special Meeting

Mr Lannen stated that any defects in the various schemes had now been listed and arrangements had been made with various contractors to start work on making good the defects at Poulaw Cappoquin Lis-more and Stradbally within a few days.

Mr Leahy termed the report an unsatisfactory one and asked why the defects had not been remedied instead of just listed.

Mr Foran said that it was scandalous and something was radically wrong that new houses had to be repaired within 2 or 3 years of being built.

Mr Lannen stated that any one who did unsatisfactory work for the Council should not be considered for contracts again.

Mr Dowd referred to the defects in the houses at Lismore and Mr Walsh said that he was sorry to say that the scheme in Cappoquin was the worst ever.

Mr Kiersey said that the trouble was that there had been no supervision at the time the schemes were being built and he held that if there had been proper supervision they would not find themselves in this mess now. Whoever was responsible should be dealt with he said.

Mr Leahy said that they should demand an explanation from the Architect.

Mr Curran pointed out the lead planning of the houses at Clashmore stating that originally the houses had no access to their back gardens.

Mr Keane then proposed that the Architect be asked for an explanation and that he attend the next meeting.

This proposal was approved and Mr Leahy referred to two condemned houses at the lower end of West Street Tallow, which were owned by the tenants and which were subject to schemes being built and suggested that houses might be provided for them by the Council.

Mr Leahy also referred to the dump at Cappoquin and said that it was a shame to have it at the side of the road. It was intended with rats he said.

Mr Walsh said that he had already reported the matter to the Engineer and had suggested a site at the Rock road, a couple of miles outside the town.

Purchase of Priory House
The Chairman said that Mr Hally Solicitor was present in connection with Mr Lannen's request regarding the signing of the contract dealing with the purchase of Priory House Dungarvan and in order not to hold the solicitor he suggested the Council deal with the matter at that stage.

Mr Lannen said that he had not asked Mr Hally to be present.

Mr Walsh—I did as I thought it would be better to have him there when the matter was being discussed.

Mr Walsh then referred to the history leading to the final negotiations at which the purchase price had been agreed. He said that the agreement had been sent to him for execution by the purchasers and he had signed it. Subsequently Mr Dowling phoned him to say that when he submitted the document to one of the Councilors appointed for the signing of the contract the member refused to do so. This member had been a member of the old Council he said but had not been returned to the new one.

Mr Dowling to send the agreement back to me, continued Mr Hally saying that I would sign it myself as agent for the County Council. I did so and sent it duly signed to the vendors Solicitor on June 22nd last. It was then my authority to sign such a document as solicitor to the County Council, as I had acted in the matter with your authority on the previous occasion without any objection.

Mr Walsh—Are we now committed to the purchase as a result of this document being signed?

Mr Hally—Yes. Mr Walsh asked the Solicitor to read the letters which he had received in connection with the matter, and the Chairman said that he did not think that Mr Lannen could call for the reading of the correspondence at this stage. If there was any specific letter that Mr Lannen required it could be read.

Mr Lannen said that what he wanted read was the last half dozen letters which the solicitor had received.

Mr Hally—Is Mr Lannen suggesting that I did anything wrong?

Mr Walsh said that the County Medical Officer in reply to a question by him at a previous meeting had stated that a dispensary and clinic was an urgent and vital necessity.

The Chairman said that if Mr Lannen's notice of motion succeeded they would be faced with the costs of a High Court Action and in this respect Mr Lannen might consider the ratepayers.

Mr Lannen—Can we consider the ratepayers' money when we purchased the place I am only interested in getting a suitable dispensary for the people of Dungarvan and Priory House is not a suitable place.

In reply to Mr Dowd the Chairman stated that Dr O'Farrell had said that Priory House was a suitable and central place for the dispensary and clinic.

Mr Keane—Can we read the resolution to purchase at this stage?

Chairman—If you do it's going to cost a lot of money.

Mr Keane pointed out that a site for a new hospital in Dungarvan was available and he asked if the Clinic could be built on that.

Mr Lannen—That's bought since 1928.

Mr Lannen—And all ye can show since then is Priory House. Ye got a ceiling price of £4,000 from the Department but ye early broke ye necks getting up to £8.

Mr Walsh—That's not true and I strongly object to that remark by Mr Lannen.

Mr Hally said that the deal about Priory House was as hard fought as any he ever had.

Mr Walsh—You put a value on Priory House Mr Hally will you tell us what it was?

Mr Hally—I can't say now but the premises cost a good deal more than I thought it was worth.

The Chairman said that the cost of a new clinic excluding legal fees would be £25,500.

Mr Walsh—If we didn't purchase Priory House the Minister said we'd get no grant for it.

Mr Lannen—It's an extraordinary thing that a Minister should write such a letter down here. Ye're writing to him for decisions on many other things and ye can't get them at all.

Mr Walsh—We must be level-headed in our approach to this matter. We are committed to the purchase now and no notice of motion can affect that only that it might involve us in a legal action.

Mr Lannen said that he would hope in the notice of motion.

One other question, said Mr Lannen, has the County Secretary received any offer for the purchase of the Shambles (Dungarvan) site? Yes or no will do.

Secretary—Certainly not.

Mr Lannen—Will you find out if any other official had a verbal offer about it?

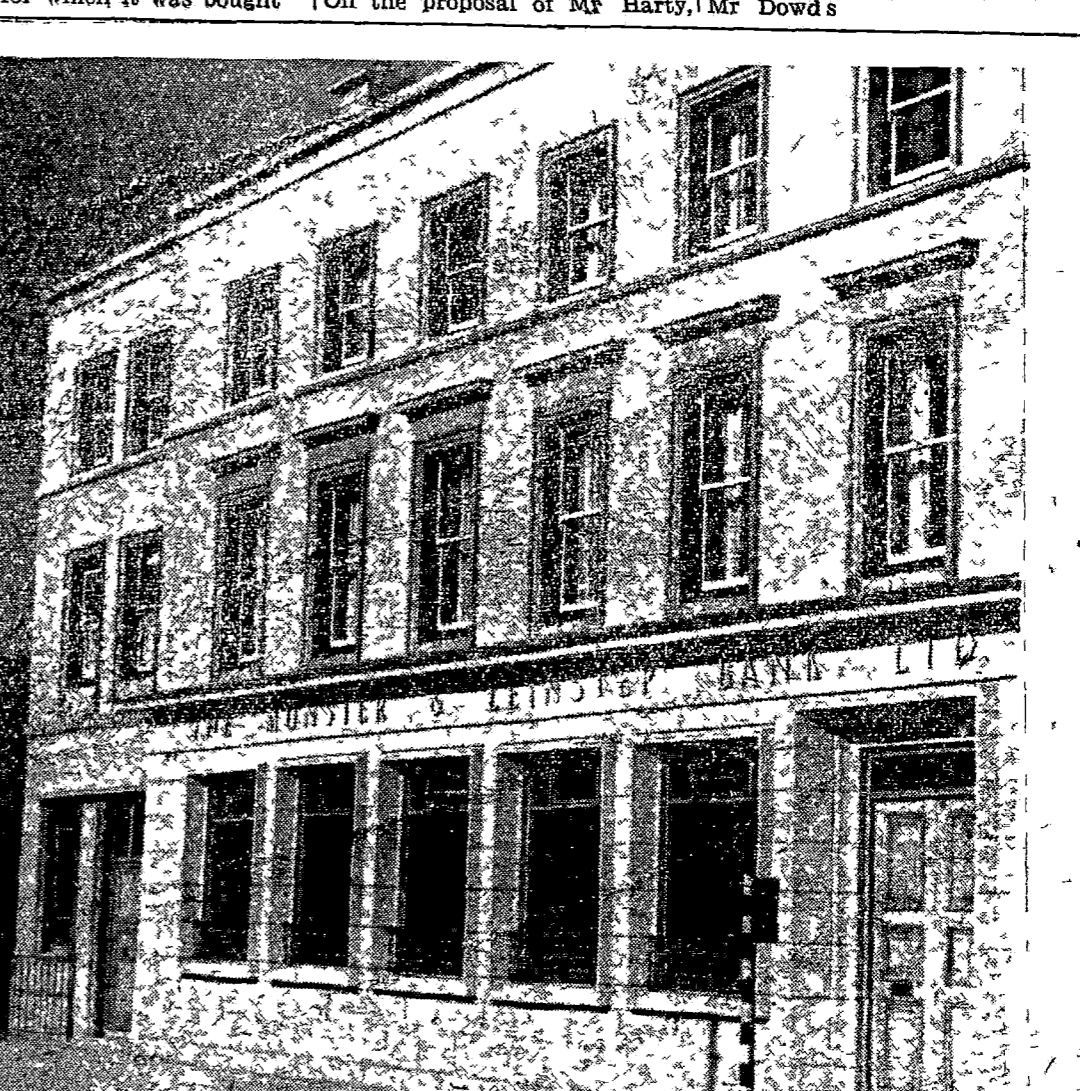
Co-Manager—I was not approached by anyone on the matter.

Mr Lannen said that he would be satisfied with that and stated that his reasons for referring to the matter were that Priority House was not suitable for a dispensary and clinic being situated in the busiest part of the town where sensitive poor people would not like to go.

He would hand in notice of motion concerning the matter, he said.

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DUNGARVAN U.D.C. SUGGESTIONS FOR IMPROVEMENT OF DUNGARVAN

New Member Suggests Acquisition of Cunnigar

Mr T. A. Kyne, T.D. Chairman, presided at the fortnightly meeting of the above held on last Friday night. Present were Messrs. Moloney, R. Keane and J. McCarthy. Mr E. Deery, Town Clerk, and Mr P. Walsh, Acting Borough Surveyor, were in attendance.

Only Solution—Twin Main from Deelish

Complaints were made that there was no water in the Cathal Brugha area and the Engineer said that the existing distribution system to Cathal Brugha and that side of the town were inadequate unless the supply to the County Home was cut off, and the solution to the problem was the laying of a twin main from Deelish.

The Engineer remarked that it would be worth thinking for the Hospital Authorities to investigate the possibility of an alternative supply to the County Home, as if there was a major break in the town they would be left without water.

Mr Keane said that it was an extraordinary state of affairs that so many places were left without water in the town.

The Clerk told the Chairman that the question of laying a twin main from Deelish at an estimated cost of £15,000 had been left to the new Council.

The Engineer said that in this regard it would be desirable to have a Consultant to prepare the scheme.

Mr Keane said that he had been informed that the D.C. were going to sink their own wells so as to have their own water supply. If this happened he asked if the supply to the rest of the town would improve.

The Engineer stated that the Dickens Leather Co. used 13 million gallons of water a year and naturally if they did not draw this it would improve the supply.

Chairman—I would be well to find out if the Company intend to sink these wells.

Mr Keane said that the factory was getting plenty of water but they had to pay £500 a year water rates and they felt they could get it cheaper by sinking their own wells.

It was agreed that the Town Clerk get in touch with the D.C. to find out what they intended to do, and it was proposed and seconded by Mr Keane that the Co. Managers be asked to submit a Consultant to draw up recommendations in connection with the laying of a twin pipe from Deelish.

Houses At Abbeyside
The Chairman asked whether anyone had been present about the houses at Abbeyside being built at Abbeyside and the Clerk stated that a letter had been received accepting the Council's requirements in the matter which stated that they would insist on a separate connection in the cases of houses already erected but that in the case of future houses all the bye-laws would have to be complied with.

The Clerk added that Messrs. O'Meara had been acquainted of these facts.

Overdrafts
Overdrafts of £2,700 on general account and £5,840 on capital account were approved.

The Council agreed to hold fortnightly meetings for the present and to review the position after six months.

Housing
In reply to questions by Mr R. Keane the Clerk stated that with regard to the present position of the proposed housing scheme the documents in connection with the Compulsory Purchase of the site at Bohernabroja were with the Council. Mr Keane who hoped to have them ready at the end of the month.

The Chairman said that it might be possible to finish off the preliminary work and put the tenders out so as to be able to start by the Spring.

Mr Keane said that this was a long time, especially when there was so much unemployment in the town. He asked if it was intended to erect 100 houses.

The Chairman said that if they got the land they might be able to start the development work towards which the special employment grant might be used and this would help to reduce the rents. It was intended to erect a total of 100 houses in schemes of roughly 30 each.

Mr Keane—How many houses will be put up down there or have we enough land?

The Chairman said that that was a matter for the Architect.

Mr Keane then asked if in the event of the Council acquiring Bohernabroja, they would sell that portion of the Convent which the latter required.

The Chairman said that this had already been agreed to by the old Council and when the matter arose they would give it every consideration.

Acquisition Of Cunnigar
Mr D. Moloney advocating that the Council should do more to encourage tourism in Dungarvan, said that they should have cog tracks and races like they had in Youghal and Tramore.

Mr Keane said, as there they had a glorious beach with great possibilities. A Marquee could be put there to hold dances and he suggested that a weir be constructed across the mouth of the Western Bay with a footbridge on top for pedestrian traffic.

The Engineer quoted the opinion of the Cork Harbour Engineer, Mr Saunders, that any wall bridge in the position would silt up the harbour.

Mr Moloney then suggested cutting the Cunnigar at the top to let the tide run over it and so wash the sand into Quann's.

The Chairman pointed out that the owner would have something to say about that.

Mr Moloney said that they could get over this difficulty by acquiring the Cunnigar.

The Chairman said that as far as tourism was concerned a far more urgent need was a public convenience at the Square.

Mr Moloney said that the only place for it and suggested that a "round-about" be put on top of it so that there would be no crashes in the Square ever again.

Mr Keane agreed that the convenience should be on the Square and he also suggested that as there did not appear to be a whole lot of need for the neighbours that it be done away with.

It was agreed to put the matter of the public lavatory and the weighbridge on the agenda for next meeting.

Other Items
Mr Keane referred to a house in Caseville in which 16 persons were living and said that the next house should be allocated to people in the house to ease the overcrowding.

On the suggestion of Mr Keane it was agreed that tenders be got for the supply of chairs for bands playing at dances at the Town Hall.

Adjournments
On the suggestion of the Chairman it was agreed that as the new Council was now commencing its term of office it would be as well to decide the matter of adjournments in the event of certain people dying, it was decided to place the matter on the agenda for the next meeting.

Chairman Congratulated
Mr Keane congratulated Deputy Kyne for the grand way he had presided at the meeting and said that he hoped they would continue to get on harmoniously for the future. All the other members joined in similar tributes and Deputy Kyne replying thanked the members for electing him in his absence and said that he would be fair and impartial to all as he could while he occupied the Chair.
