**CARAVAN OWNERS RALLY**

**THE IRISH APOSTOLATE**

**WATERFORD BOARD OF PUBLIC ASSISTANCE**  
 Election Of Chairman And Vice-Chairman  
 Reference To Plans For New Hospital In Dungarvan  
 Questions As To Appointments

At the annual meeting of the above held in Dungarvan on Monday Mr Henry Gill, a newly elected member on the Waterford Corporation representing the Ratepayers Party was elected Chairman of the Board. He was proposed by Alderman Kenneth T.D. and seconded by Mr C Curran.

Mr R Barron was proposed by Mr N Walsh and seconded by Mr P Butler.

The result of the division was: For Gill-Messrs T Lannen C Curran S O'Rourke T D W Kenneth T D, H Gill, D Fitzpatrick-(6)

For Barron-Messrs P Butler N Walsh R Barron T Kyrne, T D T Gallagher-(5)

**Maternity Unit At Dungarvan**  
 The Secretary (Mr J A Hynes) read a letter from the Architects, Messrs Buchanan and Foley submitting revised drawings of the proposed new Maternity X-Block. The unit to be attached to the District Hospital Dungarvan. The Secretary stated that the drawings were almost completed and it should be possible to advertise the job soon.

In reply to Mr T Lannen the Secretary stated that the Unit could provide for 10 beds. The estimates for the work given were: Cost of construction £30,152 Heating and mechanical services £5,500 New entrance and gate £1,200 New boiler house £2,800 X-Ray £6,051 Total £46,703

Mr Lannen referred to the proposal and plans drawn for a new hospital in Dungarvan and asked what had become of them. The Co Manager said that the plans were drawn up about 1937 or 1938 when it was proposed to erect a new hospital but then the war intervened and the plans had to be scrapped. This was the best they could get. Mr Lannen asked what had been the cost of the plans which had been scrapped. The Secretary said that he would have to have notice of that question in order to be able to answer it.

The Co Manager said that the information would be furnished at the County Council meeting in reply to a similar query there by Mr Lannen.

Mr Lannen asked what grant they would get for the present work. Secretary-Two-thirds of the cost.

Mr Lannen said that they would have got 100% grant for the new hospital if they had built it at the time. He said that he would like to obtain all the particulars about what happened at that time.

The Co Manager said that his recollection of the matter was that the Board would only have received 60% of a grant for a new hospital.

Mr Lannen disagreed with this and said that the full cost had been met out of the Hospital Trust Fund. Something should have been done about getting this new hospital, he said, and he again queried the amounts spent on the plans.

The Co Manager said that he had been discussed time and time again on the Board and all the reports had appeared in the public press.

Mr Lannen-Well what appeared in the public press does not satisfy me.

Mr Walsh-Indeed I'm glad to hear that.

The Co Manager said that the Press had always accurately reported the proceedings at meetings and that the position was that the Department would not allow the erection of a new hospital but had agreed to considerable extensive reconstruction of the existing hospital.

Deputy Kyrne said that the present plans were very far advanced and there did not appear to be any sense in scrapping these now. For that reason he proposed that the Board approved that the Department be requested to sanction them.

Mr Lannen said that Dungarvan should have got a new hospital and a patch job like this was not suitable for a town of its size.

Manager-The old Board did everything they could to get the new hospital.

Mr Lannen-There was money spent on the plans for it and they must have cost a nice penny.
