



This very beautifully proportioned silver gilt chalice was probably made in Galway around the end of the 15th century Shrouded in the mists of four centuries its earlier history is not very clear. It is almost certain that it was presented to the newly founded Dominican Abbey at Burrishoole by Thomas de Burgo of the dedicatory inscription on the chalice and his wife Grainne Ui Mhaille a grand-aunt of Grainne Mhaol Having passed through the hands of many owners it came up for sale at a London auction (Christie's) in 1924 It was purchased by the National Museum, Dublin, where it can now be seen
