WELL, ISN'T IT?
As I surmised in this column a couple of issues back, the proposal made by Mr. Donal Whelan at a meeting of Dungarvan Urban Council to have a roundabout at the Square to solve traffic problems, was not left long without being severely criticised.

Mr. Moloney following the publication of my comments on the matter wrote to me and claimed that my criticism of his project was unfair. What I said was mild compared with what Senator Butler had to say about the idea crazy and ridiculous. I wholeheartedly agree with him in this, for although Mr. Moloney has drawn some very artistic plans showing his ideas modernized, I am not convinced that these ideas could be reduced from paper drawings to hard facts just for a few hundred pounds as Mr. Moloney claims.

FOR PASSERS THROUGH
For the life of me I cannot understand all this hullabaloo about erecting a public lavatory for the benefit of bus users and passers-by, or why a burden of anything up to £3,000 should be put on the local ratepayers just as they would have the honour and glory of boasting of that fact. If bus users are to be facilitated in this respect, let the C.I.E. authorities look after it as Senator Butler suggested, and let them erect a proper bus depot with waiting room and lavatories in Dungarvan as they have done elsewhere.

With demands such as they are and the rates at such a pinnae, I think that if £3,000 is to be spent in the Urban area, it can be spent on many other more pressing matters than a public convenience.

Perhaps Mr. Moloney was nearer the truth than he realised when he stated in reply to a remark by Mr. Lannen that people resident in the Square would object to the lavatory there that if that attitude was adopted the lavatory would wind up a mile outside the town as everyone would object to it.

Well, if Mr. Moloney is afraid that the people would object to so generally, why think about putting it up at all!

Irish Scholarships Awarded
Twenty-four students presented themselves for examination for the 20 scholarships value £133 each (one month at Ring Irish College), awarded annually by the Committee, and the C.E.O. pointed out that if 50% as taken as the qualifying mark only 19 would qualify. It had previously been decided by the Committee that applicants should get 60% in the oral and 40% in the written tests he said, but it was a matter for the Committee to decide.

Travel Expenses
A letter from the Department in reply to the Committee's resolution requesting sanction for the payment of 10/- per return journey from Dungarvan to Portlaoise to Mr. Pilib O'Foghliu temporary teacher of Irish stated that it was regretted that such a proposal could not be sanctioned. Sanction would however, be given to the payment of £1 per week, retrospective to October 1st last.

Travel Scholarship Scheme
With regard to the existing travel scholarship scheme operating in the Dungarvan and Cappoquin school districts a letter from the Department with regard to the continuation of the scheme for the coming year stated that as the scheme did not conform with the draft drawn up by the Department, it could not be sanctioned.

The Committee approved the starting of day classes for girls at Tramore as from next September.

Wage Increase
An application by the A.T. & G.W.U. for an increase on 7/6d per week was approved by Mr. Lynch. Caretaker was approved.

Institutional Management Scholarship
The Committee approved the award of the two year scholarship valued £100 a year at Cathal Brugha Street, to Miss Christopher, Ballylemon.

Grants
The Committee awarded grants of £5 to Ardmore, C.A. for their Exhibition, £10 to Miss Christopher, Ballylemon, and £10 to Fels Ceapach Culin.

DUNGARVAN U.D.C. ROUNDABOUT AT SQUARE A CRAZY IDEA

Could Involve Town In Huge Expenditure Says Senator Butler

Mr. T. Kyne, T.D., Chairman, as to the need of the scheme and the cost. This was agreed to. A Crazy Idea. With regard to the proposal made at the last meeting to erect an underground or semi-underground lavatory at the Square and to put a traffic roundabout supported by struts over it to make the Square a safe place for traffic the Engineer reported that the cost of erecting an overground lavatory at any of the sites previously mentioned at the Square at the "Linney" or near the Bridge would be £2,500.

The Engineer gave it as his opinion that the erection of an underground or semi-underground lavatory at the Square would not be feasible. The report stated that the matter of the erection of the roundabout would have to be dealt with by the County Council as it was on a main road. Senator Butler referred to the minutes of the last meeting at which he said he saw that a proposal to remove the weighbridge at the Square and erect a roundabout on top of an underground lavatory had been made by Mr. Moloney and a resolution had been passed by the Council to place the matter on the agenda for this meeting.

Mr. Moloney pointed out that placing the public lavatory at the Square but the Chairman He then went on to say that he disagreed with Senator Butler on all points. He produced a plan of the Square showing the effects a roundabout should have on traffic passing through it and said that a small 2 feet high brick wall be erected at the end of Mary Street and at the Bridge Street entrance. He could not see how this could cost more than a few hundred pounds. With the roundabout and lavatory on the Square he said his plan showed that there would still be plenty of parking space there.

Mr. Moloney then went on to say that there should be no objection to having the lavatory at the Square pointing out that there was one in O'Connell Street in Dublin. Mr. Kelly—in my estimation it would be a physical impossibility to have an underground lavatory at the Square it was proved before that half the town is undermined by the sea and

roundabout is put there. We have the grandest square in Ireland continued Senator Butler and no other town in the country offers such facilities for passers-through to park their cars. I don't want to run this town, but if there is a roundabout put on the Square it will ruin it. Then there is another aspect of the matter — if the Council have to provide a suitable convenient place to hold fairs it could cost £10,000 to provide it.

It is all very fine for Mr. Moloney to say that these things can be done overnight, but in my view it is ridiculous. Those who are elected here must have foresight and must give consideration to every matter that comes before them and I must say that I am completely opposed to this resolution as it shows no consideration of the people of Dungarvan. I think the thing is a crazy idea. The public Square is a public right of way and is the responsibility of the County Council and I for one would not like to see a public lavatory there. I would not object to one adjacent to the Square.

the place would be flooded out. Senator Butler—We have been given no idea of the cost of all this. I have the plan drawn by Mr. Moloney here. It is a very fine plan, considering everything but it is not one that would convince me that it would be accepted by our Town Planning Consultant. I see here that there would be trees on it. Well we should be more concerned about keeping the Square a business centre instead of trying to turn it into a park. There are plenty other places around the town for parks. I can see that a scheme like this could involve the town in an expenditure of something like £50,000 and I don't think it could be worth that. I'll agree that you, Mr. Chairman and the Council, can consider the matter but for God's sake don't commit yourselves.

Mr. Moloney—I'm prepared to have a wager with the Senator that my plan will not cost the thousands he says. I wonder does he realise how dangerous the Square is for traffic at present. There have been two crashes there recently.

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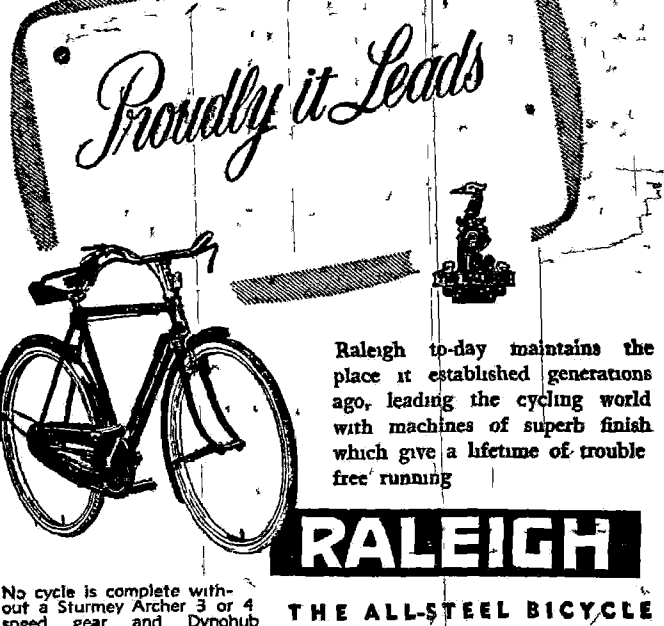
