**RESIGNATIONS AND OPTIMISM**  
When anyone stands for election to any of our Public Bodies and having stood, is elected, he at once takes on many responsibilities as a representative of the electorate which cannot too easily be taken for granted. In these responsibilities is his attendance at the meetings of the Council or Board to which he is elected and his constant and consistent attention to the interests of the people he represents.

It is immaterial whether a representative is elected with two quotas or just with a bare sufficiency of votes. In the final analysis the one has no more power than the other as an elected member and popularity at the polls does not always reflect the ability of the candidates in the realms of Local Administration.

Short of the most cogent reasons therefore, an elected member of a Council should take his seat and keep faith with those who elected him, and even though that number might not be overwhelming, his moral obligations to them are nonetheless important or pressing.

My comments on this matter are prompted by a discussion at the last meeting of the Council which could or could not be the preamble to the active implementation of a resignation by a member who since the new Council took over control has been passive in this respect.

The members' reasons for resigning may fully warrant his action. I cannot say whether this is so or not as none were given when the matter was raised. There was, however, a stipulation that if the resignation move this was that the resignation would be actively and officially made if an assurance was given that the member would be a member of the party as the resigning member.

The Labour Party were explicit on this point when their spokesman on the Council stated that the Party could give no such assurance. The Fianna Fáil Party members on the other hand stated that they would have to await instructions from the Party before making any statement as to the line which they would follow in an opinion on how they would not give any such assurance as looked for either.

The point I want to make in this regard is that if the member in question insists in going ahead with his resignation, and if a vacancy accordingly arises on the Council the members should be big enough and intelligent enough to revert back to the old friendly gentlemen's agreement which allowed the Party which was affected by the loss of a member to nominate the person for co-option.

Unhappily this procedure which was always adopted by the old Councils was broken during the firing line last year when Fianna Fáil lost a seat by the regretted death of Mr. P. O'Donoghue and the man who came on was a Fine Gael representative.

The attitude of the Council to the present case is undoubtedly the result of what occurred then but two wrongs never made a right and continuing the wrong now will not write off what occurred a few years ago. Certainly it may give some members the satisfaction of saying that they have 'got even' but these little spleens which for the most part are personal and Party, should be forgotten in the common interest.

Local Councils are no place for the exercise of Party Politics. Members should sit together as a happy family with the welfare of the sole interest and welfare of the people at heart. Big parties or coalitions should not, by virtue of their ruling power on a Council grab further seats and so disfranchise certain sections of the community—that is not practical democracy but rather a move towards totalitarianism. Surely the members of our Urban Council would not like to be accused of this.

It can be said if a seat is grabbed off now. The excuse that it was done before cannot wholly relieve their consciences, so why not bury the hatchet and if a vacancy occurs now or at some future time, why not let it be filled by the same party—that I think could be the best for all in the long run.

**BRICKEY RANGERS TRIUMPH IN REPLAY**

The gate at last Sunday night's game was \$295 3s net representing an attendance of approximately 3,500. At the drawn game on the previous Sunday, the gate was \$538 3s 2d, for the two matches.

In the replay game between the Brickey Rangers and Kilrossanty played in the Gaelic Field, Dungarvan, on Sunday evening last (7.30) one of the best games of football yet seen in the County was witnessed by a large attendance of 3,500 people. Weather conditions were ideal and spectators indeed felt fortunate to be present on such a calm evening, as the weather during the previous few days was not very promising.

From the start the match was a close-tackling robust affair with every man of the thirty endeavouring to gain the upper hand for his side and putting every ounce of skill, stamina, and honest-to-goodness effort that he possessed against his opponents. The play swayed from one goalmouth to the other, each side striving unsuccessfully to raise the green or white flag from either side. Preliminary tactics were being employed by both sides, and the play was a constant struggle for possession of the ball. Several attempts on the goalmouth but each time was foiled, once by the upright.

## Waterford County Council Motion To Rescind Purchase Of Priory House Defeated

HEATED EXCHANGES MARK DAY LONG DISCUSSION

The adjourned quarterly meeting was held in Dungarvan, on Monday last, Mr. M. Morrissey, Chairman, presiding. Also present were Messrs. J. Kyrne, D. J. Feely, J. Power, E. Keane, H. Dowd, J. Ormond, T. D. K. O'Ryan, C. Curran, N. Walsh, E. Barron, W. Foran, Senator J. Butler, T. Lannen, J. Quirk, M. Harty, S. Lynch, W. Kennedy, T. D. J. Power, P. Butler, D. Heskin and W. Dower. Messrs. S. J. Moynihan, County Manager, M. M. Hally, Solicitor, D. Sheehy County Engineer, and J. G. Dowling County Secretary, were in attendance.

They then know what's going on here. Mr. Quirk—Mr. Lannen is blaming the old Council, but while I was against buying a Priory House for a while I agreed to it in view of the advice we got, and I think it was a good job for the ratepayers that it was bought.

Mr. Lannen then concluded. I do not believe the Council is bound by the contract because Mr. Hally had no authority from the Council to sign the document and I think we should repudiate it. Furthermore, I thought the matter had gone far enough and asked the Chairman to put the motion to a vote.

Mr. Quirk seconded.

Mr. Lannen—Let him off, Mr. Chairman. It's just as well to see it out now.

Chairman—Alright Mr. Lannen you can proceed but keep off the dangerous points or else I'll have to knock you.

Mr. Lannen then continued. In January of this year the Council were informed that the Minister advised the purchase of Priory House. All that was necessary as far as the officials were concerned was that the owners of Priory House be obliged. It then became a mad rush to buy, officials tripping over themselves to get the purchase through.

I have been against the purchase from the beginning. I have spoken without malice towards anyone. I know I am expressing the wishes of the bulk of the people who are sent me to this Council with a greater vote than any other member here. I have held and I continue to hold that this purchase would never have to be made if the property was owned by anyone else other than the County Manager's people-in-law.

**Mass For Victim Of Drowning Accident**

When the meeting came to order, Mr. Quirk on behalf of himself his wife and family thanked the Council for adjourning as a mark of respect and having the special Mass celebrated. He also wished to thank all the people of Dungarvan, 25 minutes from where his son died for sending so many Mass cards and telegrams. They would never forget this great tribute, he said, which was a great help to them in their sorrow.

**Pensions For All Call**  
In the course of appointing sub-committees to deal with old age pensions, Mr. D. Heskin proposed that everyone attaining 70 years of age be granted a pension without reference to any means test.

Mr. Foran seconded the resolution, and Mr. Kyrne supporting it, said that the only snag was that the cost of implementing the proposal would be £3 million per annum. If they could suggest to the Minister how this money could be got he felt sure he would be only too pleased to meet the wishes of the Council.

Mr. C. Curran said that the present means test was a great injustice as it was based on gross income instead of net income.

The resolution was passed.

**The Purchase Of Priory House**  
The Council next proceeded to deal with the following notice of motion.

The County Council Solicitor be authorised to take whatever steps he considers necessary for obtaining the release of the County Council from an contract entered into by the County Council for the purchase of Priory House and that such purchase be not proceeded with. Signed Thomas Lannen, Countersigned John O'Ryan, Charles Curran, W. Kennedy.

Moving the motion Mr. T. Lannen, stated that he introduced it to give the Council a last opportunity to change what must be one of the most detestable pieces of injustice ever perpetrated.

This purchase had its origin last October when the Minister of Health visited Dungarvan, said Mr. Lannen, and then went on to allege that a member of the Council had used his position to have Priory House purchased by the Council.

Mr. Walsh—Chairman, is it usual to allow a member to read a prepared statement here?

The Chairman said that he did not see anything wrong in that but said that Mr. Lannen would have to refrain from indulging in personalities.

Mr. Lannen replied that Mr. Walsh did not speak with a clear mind in this matter as he was only playing up to the County Manager.

Mr. Walsh—That is incorrect, have I ever done so, Mr. Manager?

County Manager—Certainly not.

The Chairman said that they had always been a happy family in the Council and he wished to have it continue so, but bringing in personalities was not going to help.

Mr. Lannen—What have the ratepayers got by the purchase of this house?

Chairman—The members were advised all along on this matter and the County Medical Officer, who is the appointed Officer, gave every member his opinion that it was suitable and we took our guidance from him.

Mr. Lannen—I will get to that later.

Chairman—If you bring in personalities I'll knock you.

Mr. Lannen—If you knock me I'll take it somewhere else where I will get a hearing.

Chairman—Only want to be fair to everyone.

He was satisfied that the old Council did a good day's work in purchasing Priory House and he had saved £12,000 in the rates and twice as much to the taxpayers. For that he thought the old Council should be complimented and he concluded by saying "anything I have done I can stand over my head". Mr Lannen then asked the County Engineer how many square feet were in the ground floor of Priory House. After the lunch recess, Mr Sheedy stated that the total floor area was 4,100 square feet in 3 floors. Mr Lannen - What is the area of the first floor? Mr Sheedy - Approximately one-third of the total. The County Manager said that it was only fair to him in view of the allegations which had been made that the report from the Department on the matter should be read. The Secretary then read the report dated January 3rd 1955 which stated that in view of the reports of his experts the Minister was satisfied that Priory House was suitable for reconstruction as a dispensary and health centre. The report added that the purchase would achieve a saving of £18,000 and the services could be started one year earlier.
