WHAT'S WRONG?

It's unfortunate, but I find it necessary to again allude to the unruly tendency which has crept into the conduct of our Gaelic games in County Waterford in recent years. I do not do so for the sake of sensationalism but rather in an effort to see something done to put an end to these unhappy scenes once and for all.

Last Sunday at two venues, 30 miles apart, we had games abandoned because spectators gacked the necessary sportsmanship to allow them to conclude. What is the reason for these happenings which have marred so many matches in the past? A shrewd guess would be that it is the betting that takes place before these matches that is the cause of all the trouble.

"Gaelic" who have involved themselves heavily on the outcome of the games when they see matters taking a bad turn or find themselves ranged on a losing side, adopt the attitude of breaking up a game so that they won't have to pay off on their bets. This is most unfortunate indeed and our County Board will have to take stern action to see that this ugly monster is destroyed before it destroys the glorious traditions of the G.A.A. in the Decies.

I was not at Waterford on Dungarvan on last Sunday I was at Croke Park but I heard enough from reliable sources when I returned home to make me thankful that I had decided to go to headquarters to see a real game of football, played hard but in a sporting manner as all our games should be.

It is refreshing to travel to Croke Park on these occasions to renew inspiration as it gives great hope to face up to matters such as I have already alluded to.

I hope, therefore, that our G.A.A. Boards will carry out a full investigation of last Sunday's incidents and that all the Gaelic who constitute the Board will decide to take the proper action, be it popular or not.

SPECIAL WATER RATE ADOPTED

Reference to Article About Portlaw APPOINTMENT OF CLERKS

Waterford County Council held a special meeting in Dungarvan on Monday last, Mr. M. O. Curran, Chairman, presiding. Also present were Messrs. T. D. O'Riordan, T. D. Fahey, H. Dowd, K. O'Riordan, D. Heskin, Senator J. Butler, J. Ormond, T. D. Curran, T. Lannen, W. Foran, J. Quirk, W. Kennaugh, N. Walsh, S. Lynch, J. Flynn, W. Dower, R. Barron P. Butler.

Water Rate Struck

The main item on the agenda was the consideration of the County Manager's proposals with regard to the striking of a special water rate.

In the course of a prepared statement circulated to the members the County Manager stated: "My proposal to have uniform charges for all Schemes is based on the consideration that all water consumers throughout the county receive what is essentially the same service and that it therefore appears to be only reasonable that the basis of charges should be the same for all."

The estimated cost of Water Supply Schemes for 1955/56 is £14,824 and the proposed water rate of 4/1 in the £ on the valuation of premises supplied with water for domestic purposes is estimated to yield the sum of £4,224, being the amount shown in the 1955/56 estimates for Water Receipts. This rate of 4/1 in the £ is in all cases less than the economic rate required to meet the estimated cost of the various liquidated Water Supply Schemes for 1957/58, which is 13/2 in the £.

Subject to the concurrence of the Council I propose to make an Order striking a water rate of 4/1 in the £ for the Current Year and fixing a scale of charges for non-domestic supplies.

In the case of non-domestic supplies the proposals were £5 for a first tank on a valuation up to £30 graded up to £15 for a tank on a holding with a valuation of £100.

The Chairman said that as a member of Tramore Town Commissioners he was objecting to the proposals as they had applied to the County Manager to leave to get Counsel's opinion on the matter but that had been refused though the County Council had even recommended it. He thought that it was a matter that required clarification and that reason the Commissioners should be given permission to get the opinion.

The Manager replied that the County Council was the only body empowered to make a water rate in the county and any ratepayer or individual who wished to challenge its validity could do so.

The County Council have gone to a great deal of trouble to see that a water rate is legally struck, said the Manager, and I don't want any of these red herrings drawn across the trail at all.

The Chairman denied that it was a red herring and said that they had shown that the County Council had been wrong before in the matter of the separate charges.

where it was required Mr. Lannen pointed out that if Mr. Dowd's point succeeded the people in the Lismore-Cappoquin area who would get a piped supply would have to pay 17/7 in the £ for it.

Mr. Curran said that if the County Manager's proposals were adopted it would mean that the people in Ballvallygart and like areas would have to pay less than at present.

In reply to Mr. Lannen, the Manager said that the loan charges on the Ballyduff-Ballylennon supply had not yet been paid off.

Mr. Leahy stated that the proposals were fair and even proposed their adoption with Mr. Hartley's amendment.

Mr. Ormond seconded and by 15 votes to 2 with 4 not voting the resolution was carried.

House Connections To Water and Sewerage Schemes. The following is a list of financial assistance to persons desirous of installing piped water and sewerage connections to County Council water and sewerage mains, submitted by the County Manager for the consideration and approval of the Council, and for any suggestions or amendments which the Council may wish to propose.

It was agreed to approve of this and the Co Surveyor was asked to prepare a scheme for the Portlaw area for consideration at the next meeting.

Youghal Bridge. Mr. Curran said that the people in the Ballymore and Aglish areas were worried about rumours that the floor of Youghal Bridge was wearing away and that some of the girders supporting it were only the thickness of a penny. They also wanted to know the business people of Youghal wanted the new bridge erected at the site approved by the Engineers as soon as possible.

Mr. Walsh—That's at Ardral. Senator Butler—All we can do is to tell Cork County Council to hurry up and start work on the building of the new bridge.

Appointment of Clerks. The Secretary told Mr. Lannen that a statement made by Mr. Walsh at the last Board of Assistance meeting that examinations for County Council Clerks would be held early in November was correct.

Mr. Lannen said that he would like to get information concerning the appointments in the Council offices which had been approved by the County Council some time ago.

The Secretary said that these were now about to be made.

Mr. Lannen said that he intended to raise the matter of supervision of the examinations. There were men in the County competent to do this, he said, without having to bring in outsiders.

Chairman—You can hand in a notice of motion about that. Mr. Lannen—I will Senator Butler—In the interval before the next examination will any appointments to be made by the Council be taken in order of priority of the present panel.

Secretary—Any positions created now will come off the new panel.

Senator Butler—And they cannot come off the old panel? Secretary—No.

Mr. Walsh—And what about the resolution passed by the County Council that they should come off the old panel?

Secretary—That is a matter for the Department.
