DRAWING WATER AT LISMORE
Bible stories of the old testament often refer to the fact that people brought their pitchers to wells to draw water. That was thousands of years ago. Last week while passing through Lismore I was reminded of this fact as I saw residents in the Fernville district make their pilgrimages to the communal fountain with buckets to collect their water supply for domestic purposes. It struck me as strange that the system should not have changed despite the passage of three or four thousand years.

Much of Lismore has been hacked up in the last twelve months to lay the pipes for the new water scheme. The old engine at the Castle fountain still continues to chug along however, but the result is that people who enjoyed a piped supply (poor though it was) up to that fountain and other utensils and draw in the water themselves. Surely it is high time to get a move on with these essential water services.

URBAN AFFAIRS
I am glad that the Civic Fathers of Dungarvan have been wise enough to approve an expenditure for the repair of the swimming pool and that it was not put on the long finger to go derelict and fall to pieces altogether. It is a pity that the town can boast of an as Councillor Johnny McCarthy remarked, it should be maintained regardless of cost.

The Council have again discussed the provision of a public lavatory, but so far unanimity as to its location has not been reached.

I cannot understand the concern of some Councillors to locate the convenience for the primary use of bus travellers. CIE has already stated in definite terms that the facilities at their office in Dungarvan are adequate for bus travellers. Whether any Councillors disagree with this is one thing, but it should not be their concern to spend ratepayers' money to provide facilities which the bus company already says are adequate. It would be the same as if the Council had to provide toilet facilities for Railway travellers.

Reverting to the Swimming Pool, I want to make it clear that up to the present the Swimming Club ceased to function about three seasons ago, any money which came to it, came from dances and this was used to finance the running of the pool. The money which was collected at the pool on those days was negligible as it was in the nature of a voluntary contribution made by the spectators. The truth of this is backed by the fact that it was lack of money which caused the closure of this most useful club going out of existence.

SWIMMING POOL TO BE REPAIRED
PRACTICE OF SUBSTITUTING FIRE-PLACES FOR RANGES SHOULD BE DISCONTINUED
Chairman Refers To Leader "Editorial Comments"

Mr M. D. Moloney, Vice-Chairman presided at a meeting of the above held on Friday night in the unavoidable absence of Mr. A. Kynne, T.P., Chairman. Also present were Messrs J. McCarthy and E. Keane and Mr E. Deery, Town Clerk, was in attendance.

Fire places For Ranges—Bad Practice
Commenting on recent applications by tenants of Council houses to have their ranges taken out and fire-places installed instead of them, Mr J. McCarthy said that this was a policy with which he did not agree at all. The ranges in most cases were comparatively new ones he said and had been put in to help boost the economic prices of the houses. Now when they were taken out they deteriorated and became rusty in the Council's yard.

The Council were the legal custodians of hundreds of houses in Dungarvan, he added, and if every tenant applied for an exchange it would cost the Council thousands of pounds. The practice which in his opinion should be discontinued.

The Chairman agreed with Mr McCarthy and the Clerk stated that in each case he would check the cost of installing the fireplaces.

Chairman—Apparently it is not an economic proposition for the Council.

It was decided to adjourn the matter to next meeting to enable the Chairman to enquire into the matter and report thereon before a final decision is taken.

Repairs To Swimming Pool
Submitting an estimate of £224 for repairs at the Swimming Pool, the Borough Surveyor, Mr. P. Walsh, reported that there were serious cracks at the South East and South-West corners of the Pool. It was necessary to repair these in order to prevent further damage.

One member objecting to the repairs said that the Pool had cost a lot of money and the Council should be satisfied with it. A local Committee who had made a lot of money out of it should pay something towards the repairs, he said.

The Chairman said that the fact remained that the Pool was in a state where it would have to be repaired before a more serious damage occurred.

Mr McCarthy stressing the value of the Pool to the children of the town where, he said, they could swim at all times in comparison with the cost of the cost of the pool should be maintained. With regard to the Committee referred to he said that he understood that the Swimming Club had ceased to exist and that the Pool was an asset to the workers and the children of the town and it was better to spend £224 on it now than to have to spend thousands on it later.

The Clerk stated that he had a bad job the first day, he said, as it was built on a bad foundation.

The estimate for repairs was approved.

The Clerk reported that since 1947 the Pool had cost amounts ranging between £28 to £258 each year since then.

Cost of Water
The question of increasing metered water charges was adjourned again to next meeting. The Clerk stated that based on the amount of loan charges, maintenance, etc the cost of supplying 1,000 gallons of water in the Urban area was 7d.

Reference was made by Mr R. Keane to a man with an Ox-bow accident who had been around the town earlier in the evening advising the people of Dungarvan to boil all water for domestic drinking. What had happened the usual town crier in this case he asked.

The Clerk explained that a burst had occurred in the Kildangan main and due to the low level of the water at Deelish it had been found necessary to pump water from the river at Tarr's bridge into the town.

When the County M.O. had been consulted he advised that the townspeople be warned by loud-speaker of the position, he said, and as they could not procure a loudspeaker Mr Keane of the visiting Play Company volunteered to do the job.

Mr Keane said that people thought it was the play Company advertising and did not pay much attention to it and he thought it would be better to get the Town Crier out the following day.

This was agreed to.

The Chairman said that it was essential to warn the people as otherwise they might have an outbreak of typhoid. Referring to an editorial article in the Dungarvan Leader calling attention to a leak at Deelish dam, he said that when that dam was built a guarantee was given that there would be no water short-

Repairs
Referring to the Council's proposal to open a priority list for the purpose of housing lettings the Chairman stated that he had read in the Dungarvan Leader that only 20 applications had so far been received.

The Chairman said that the position was that the people did not understand it before but the article in the Leader had made it very clear, and he felt further applications would come in before the date closed on the 8th November.

With regard to the acquisition of Bohernatra the Clerk told Mr Keane that they would be ready to deal with a resolution asking for the confirmation of the Compulsory Purchase Order at the next meeting.

Abbeyside Development Association
Mr J. Hayes St. Patrick's Tce Secretary of the above applied for registration for the purposes of buying the Town Hall for dances. The aims of the Association were given as the development of the dancing stage, etc. Mr D. Moloney was named as President of the Association.

The application was approved.

A number of complaints re repairs made by Mr Keane were referred to the Engineer. Also a complaint concerning water shortage at Kilrush.

The Telephone Kiosk for the article in the "Spotlight" column in the Leader concerning the telephone kiosk at Abbeyside and suggested that the Department of Posts & Telegraphs be requested to erect the kiosk outside the Post Office at Abbeyside.

Cattle Auction Mart—At a meeting of the East Cork National Farmers' Association held last week, Mr James Colbert, Ouhane House, Dungarvan, presided. Farmers from various centres in East Cork attended. It was decided to hold a special meeting at a date to be arranged later with a view to appointing a committee for the purpose of making final arrangements for a Cattle Auction Mart in Midleton and to appoint an Auctioneer who would carry out the sales.

An Auction Mart is to be established in Bandon and the farmers concerned have decided to appoint Mr William McCarthy, Auctioneer, Bandon and Midleton to conduct the sales.

Road Reconstruction Work—The main road from Castletyons to Castlemartyr on which reconstruction work is in progress for a number of months past is now nearing completion. A bus service will run from Fermoy to Ballycotton over this road early next year.

The work of reconstruction is being carried out by Cork County Council Engineer, Mr J. O'Regan. B. E. A survey is over the reconstruction of a large number of roads has produced his expert efficiency and ability since his appointment a few years ago.

Re Planting At Mothel

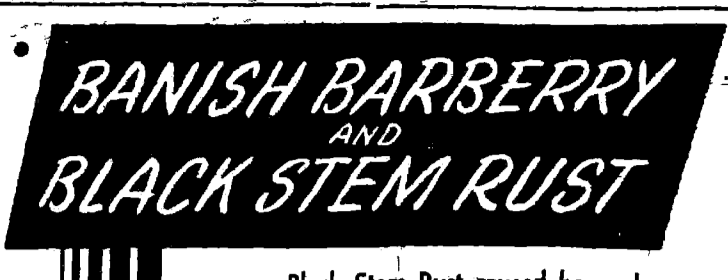

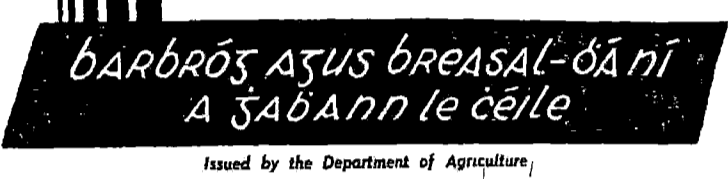
