INQUEST ON 54 YEAR OLD STRADBALLY SEAMAN
Fell Into Fire
A 54-year-old seaman who had spent most of his life sailing the seas of the world and who was twice shipwrecked in World War II, died in Dungarvan Hospital on Friday last as a result of injuries received on previous Thursday night when he fell into the fire of his own home in Stradbally, where he lived alone.
This was disclosed at an inquest held into the circumstances surrounding the death of Patrick Fitzgerald by Dr D. Healy, Lismore, Coroner for West Waterford sitting with a jury at the District Hospital, Dungarvan, on last Friday evening, when it was stated that the deceased walked a quarter of a mile to his sister's house for assistance having been extensively burned.

Waterford County Council
Unified Health Administration Proposals
WILL MEAN RATE INCREASE IN COUNTY

BRICKEY DRAINAGE AGAIN DISCUSSED

Mr M. Morrissey Chairman, presided at the adjourned meeting of the Waterford County Council held in Dungarvan on Monday last. Present were Messrs T. K. Byrne, T. D. J. Fahey, J. Power, K. Keane, S. Ormond, T. D. K. O'Riordan, D. Leahy, Senator J. Butler, Mr M. Walsh, J. P. Lynch, S. Lynch, J. Flynn, D. Curran, W. Kenneally, T. D. W. Foran and B. Barron.
Messrs S. J. Moynihan, Co. Manager, Co. Surveyor J. Ormond, Chief Assistant and T. B. Boyle, Acting Secretary, were in attendance.

Proposed Unified Health Authority
Proposals for the Minister for Health for a unified health authority in the County and City were contained in a letter from the Department circulated to the members.
The letter stated that the Health Act, 1953, took away from public assistance authorities their responsibility for the medical assistance service and gave the functions of providing all the general health services to the County Councils and County Borough Corporations as health authorities. In the Waterford area, however, special temporary arrangements had to be made to provide for the health services. Public Assistance to carry on the administration of some important services as agent of the health authorities. These arrangements involved a deal of overlapping and the projected development in the near future of the new services under the 1953 Act made it important that the division of responsibility should be terminated, and that the administration of all the services should be placed on the most efficient possible basis.

In general the Minister proposed that the constitution and authority of the new unified authority should be based on the county and the other local authorities who in turn would have powers to direct the County Manager.
The second modification proposed that the cost of services administered by the authority should be divided between the two contributing bodies in proportion to the effective valuations of their respective areas.

The Minister is aware added that the present incidence of the development of the health services and would lead to some increase in the county rate. He would be glad to have any further view of the County Council on this matter should they wish to discuss the matter with them.
Senator Butler said that he always thought the contributions should be on a population basis and he still held the opinion. He also thought that the County Council should have more than just recommendatory powers.

There is an amount of money involved and the Council should consider it very seriously. I think we should avail of the Minister's offer to discuss it but the Council should have the advice of the County Manager and the officials first before the Council is pressing considerably more than should in the ordinary way if the contribution was based on a population basis.
Mr Dowd agreed that if the Unified Authority came into being it would mean an increase in the rates. He had been shocked he said to read in the Auditor's report on the Board of Assistance that a quarter of a million pounds was being paid out in County Waterford in Home Assistance. This was a horrible state of affairs which reflected on the administration of the county and country in general. It seemed to him that in County Waterford and elsewhere there was a never ending stream of applicants for public assistance because an insanitary and unhealthy breeding ground for disease existed. In what had been done they had only skimmed the surface and had put paint on top of rust in the provision of housing and water it had been a case of too little and too late, while school children were completely ignorant of the rules of hygiene and sanitation. A unified authority should make an all out drive to combat these and there should be a decrease in the Board of Assistance estimate instead of an increase of a further £10,000 as was the case last year and which appeared to him to have been approved in an offhand manner.

Mr Walsh said that the position as that the services under the Health Act were mandatory and would have to be carried out and he shuddered to think what the full impact on the rates would be when it was fully operating. I have always held the view that the Act is a millstone around the ratepayers' necks and every day is proving that it should be a national charge.
The County Manager said that the matter was a very important one for the Council as the new proposals tried to put new burdens on the Council and there was no doubt but that they would have an adverse effect on the ratepayers.
A proposal was then passed proposed by Senator Butler and seconded by Mr K. Keane that the Council hold a special meeting to discuss the matter when full details of the costs had been prepared by the officials.

New Offices—New Rent
Arising from the proposal to provide an additional office for the Secretary of the Board of Assistance at Davitt's Quay Dungarvan, a report from the County Surveyor, pointed out that the Board had free offices in the building and suggested that an annual rent of £300 be charged.
The County Manager said that Mr Walsh in putting this rent on the Board it would not be a case of robbing Peter to pay another's debt.
Mr Leahy and Mr Curran, supported the provision of the additional office but Mr Dowd while agreeing that there was a certain amount of congestion, thought there was no need for it.
On the proposal of Mr K. Keane seconded by Mr Walsh the Council agreed to provide the Board an annual rent of £300.

Paint For Rural Cottages
When Mr J. Fahey stated that the doors and windows of rural cottages were falling down for want of paint the Council agreed on the proposal of Deputy Ormond to provide paint for the tenants on application and the approval of the Engineer who would report when the work was done.
A proposal by Mr Fahey that a further scheme of rural cottages be prepared was adjourned to a later meeting.
When Deputy K. Keane was told that the department had not so far communicated their findings on the Sworn Inquiry on the present scheme, he said that the Council should express its regret and surprise at the long delay.
Mr Keane referred to people who owned small lots of poor quality land, and who were living in appalling circumstances and said that the Council should do something about their eligibility to apply for cottages.

Before the lunch recess, the following votes of sympathy were passed—To Mrs and Miss Callaghan, South Terrace, to the relatives of the late Laurence Veale, Brynshunock.
Proposals From Ardmore and Grange Parish Councils
Mr John Cashman, Secretary of the above forwarded resolutions concerning roads sewerage, water, and street lighting, at Ardmore, with a request that the Council urgently consider these matters.
Mr Curran, supporting the Parish Council's resolutions, pointed out that the County and Grange Parish Councils as a result of the County and Parish Councils should meet their requests as far as possible.

The Chairman said that all they could do at the moment was to note the proposals and to get a report from the Engineer as to the need of the public lights required.
Other Items
Kilmanahan Bridge—Complaints by Mr Fahey and Mr O'Riordan, that flooding resulted because the eyes of the bridge were blocked were referred to the Engineer for a report.

Increases—Wage increases of 4d an hour with 10d rate increase for apprentices were granted to all skilled engineering workers employed by the Council while an increase of 3d an hour was approved in the case of building workers.
The Co. Surveyor reported that the cost of the increases to the end of the current financial year would be about £1,000 and the Council approved the provision of this amount.

Post of Occupational Therapist—The Council agreed to create a post of permanent whole-time occupational therapist at Ardkeen at a salary of £318 per annum.
Variation of Salary Scales—Variation in the salary scales of the Fire Inspector (Ardkeen) and the County Deputy Surveyor as suggested by the Department were approved.

Favouritism Alleged
Deputy K. Keane alleged that due to manoeuvring and favouritism in the purchase of Ballinagalknee number 1 on the pump site had been sunk before pumps at Ballinacourty and Touraneena number 4 and 6 respectively on the site.
The pump at Ballinagalknee was not being used by the people there and he saw the County Manager should be asked to investigate the occurrence and see that the pumps were sunk in the order they were listed.
Mr Ormond said that the pump in Ballinagalknee had been sunk as it was the last one in a particular area and it did not look sensible to let the plant out of the area and bring it back later. It was done with the best intentions and as a saving to the ratepayers and he resented Mr K. Keane's inference that it had been done through favouritism.

Taps at Stradbally—Following a request by Deputy K. Keane it was agreed to place one additional tap at the extremity of the scheme.

Druckey Drainage Proposals
With reference to a previous proposal to place a sluice-gate at Killongford bridge to help solve the flooding along the Brickey valley a letter from the Department of Agriculture stated that the Minister was advised that the provision of a sluice-gate alone would not achieve the desired results. The deepening of the river bed the provision of storage and the realignment of the seaward channel would have to be done in conjunction with the provision of a sluice or sluices in order to achieve worthwhile improvement. This would be an engineering job of some magnitude which the Land Project Division of the Department was not equipped to undertake.
In the circumstances the let-ting concluded that the Minister cannot be undertaken by this Department at this stage.

Mr Keane referring to the plight of landowners along the valley said that more than 1,500 acres of land was subject to flooding and during the last high tides two roads in the area had been blocked and a man nearly lost his life there. The Council again he wrote to the Minister again he wrote to consider the matter and to do something to relieve the losses of these farmers who were all good ratepayers.
Mr Harty challenged some of the remarks made by Mr Keane and said that if the sluice gates were put in the bridge it would increase the force of pressure on the embankments on the sea side of the bridge considerably. He thought that they should ask the Minister to consider getting all the technical data necessary for the whole scheme immediately so that the 1,500 acres could be drained.
Mr Keane said that Mr Harty was only interested in the land east of the bridge. He would like more evidence that the putting of sluice gates in the bridge was not a disaster. The farmers affected thought it was and so did he.
At this stage the Chairman was consulting with the County Manager and Mr Walsh turned aside when Mr Keane remarked that the Chairman should give him and the members as good a hearing as they gave him when he spoke.
The Chairman replied that he would take no nonsense from Mr Keane and said that he was consulting the County Manager on the matter under discussion. If you don't behave yourself, I will rule you out of the meeting. Mr Keane—If you rule me out I'll leave the meeting altogether. Chairman—I can sit down now as I will take no more of this fooling.
Mr Keane—Mr Chairman the trouble is that you are not fit for your job. I'm entitled to speak here for the people I represent.
Chairman—I was here before you Mr Keane, and I don't want you to come in here and tell me what to do.
Mr Keane—I was shown no respect by the Chair when I spoke. Several members then made appeal and Deputy K. Keane said that Mr Harty knew that the job he wanted was to be done it would cost at least £30,000.
The Chairman then stated that with regard to Mr Keane's remark that he was not fit to occupy the Chair he would like to say that he would show Mr Keane before next June that he was more than fit for it and if the members wanted him to rule the roost he would.
