BEHIND THE SPOTLIGHT

with PENSAMAN

\$4,000 DISPENSARY RESIDENCE TO BE SCRAPPED
Councillor C Curran had the mail on the head at a special meeting of the Waterford Board of Assistance held in Dungarvan on Friday last when he stated that it would be very hard to explain to the ratepayers why a dispensary which had cost more than £4,000 to purchase and which would have been scrapped in the history of the matter is that the Board purchased the premises, an old spacious residence, in 1947 for £2,164 which included a sum of £1,949 was then expended on the premises to renovate, repair and decorate the house in the same year. Despite this huge expenditure it was found necessary to spend the following amounts carrying out further repairs in 1951 £46, 1952 £142, 1953 £42 and 1954 £11 — a grand total of £241.

The matter came to a head at a couple of meetings back when a report came before the Board from the Engineer advising that further repairs estimated to cost £240 were needed to the house. Inspections were then made by two members of the Board, Mr H Gill and Mr C Curran, and the sum total of their conclusions was that it was an utter waste of money to spend anything further trying to repair the premises.

It must be borne in mind that all this occurred within the past six years. It was Shakespeare who wrote some centuries ago that something was rotten in the State of Denmark and I think we may well apply his quotation to the matter on which I write.

Coupled with the Clashmore case must be the inference that a similar residence purchased by the Board at Portlauric is going the same way. Ald Tom Gallagher, Mayor of Waterford, and a city representative on the Board said that this one also looked like it should never have been bought.

It is indeed, a sorry state of affairs that in one case the ratepayers' money should, over the past six years, have been shovelled down the drain at the rate of over £700 a year—I do not know what the ultimate decision in the other case will yet be.

It is an unanswerable argument that old properties should never be purchased by local authorities, except in cases of the direst and most urgent necessity.

Dungarvan Urban Council vesting into reconstruction has been costly experiment, the Board of Assistance have now found it so, will other bodies who have followed the same course also find their fingers burned. Time alone will tell. But in the meantime the hard-earned money of the ratepayers that is paying for all this.

Barrington Lecture On "A Living From The Land"
The lecturer Dr O'Connor said that this lecture was delivered under the auspices of the Barrington Trust (founded in 1836 by the bequest of John Barrington, Esq.) with the collaboration of the Statistial and Social Inquiry Society of Ireland. He pointed out that it was very important that people make a reasonable income from farming, otherwise they could not be expected to stay farming. A number of difficulties faced farmers in their attempts to improve income but the two most important were lack of capital and in many cases lack of technical knowledge.

Dealing with Capital the lecturer said that there were two kinds of Capital rationing in Agriculture internal and external. By external rationing was meant the case where the farmer could not get credit from any source at reasonable interest rates and by internal rationing was meant the case where the farmer would not borrow for productive purposes even if given the money free of interest. The latter type of rationing was the commoner of the two.

Remarkable advances had been made in the last decade in making technical knowledge available to farmers, but there was still a good way to go. The lecturer gave as his opinion that it would be a great help if Rural Science could be introduced into the primary schools. The main obstacle here was the already overcrowded curriculum in these schools. He knew one Agricultural Instructor, however, who had made arrangements with the Principal of a primary school to visit the school once a week for a lecture on elementary science. This was a most laudable experiment.

Dr O'Connor went on to say that the problem farms of Ireland that it was most important to concentrate on these. He outlined a plan for a 30-acre dairy farm which could be used as a basis for improving output on such type farms. In spite of price fluctuations it was difficult to make a reasonable income on such small farms without a few sows. Skim milk and home grown grain should be the basis of feeding such sows.

WASTE OF MONEY TO REPAIR £4,000 DOCTOR'S RESIDENCE
Hard To Explain Position To Ratepayers

EMPLOYMENT OF TRADESMEN—NO FAVOURITISM

Mr H Gill, Chairman, presided at a special meeting of the Waterford Board of Public Assistance held in Dungarvan on last Friday evening. Present were Messrs T A Kyne, T.D., T Gallagher, Mayor of Waterford, N Walsh, C Curran, J Ormonde, T.D., W Kennelly, T.D., and T Lannen.

Messrs J Hynes, Secretary J Conway, Engineer J Glanville, Accountant and F A Croke were in attendance.

Fever Hospital Repairs
With reference to the proposed repairs to the Fever Hospital, Waterford estimated at £15,000, the Chairman stated that with the Mayor and Councillor Fitzpatrick he saw the hospital and after an inspection they reached the conclusion that a considerable amount of the expenditure was not essential.

It was stated that although there was accommodation at the hospital for 120 beds, there had been only an average of ten patients in the hospital over the past three years.

Deputy Kenneally put forward the suggestion that the existing Fever Hospital might be changed into an annex for the County Hospital and the County House, if its purchase was sanctioned, might then be used as a fever hospital.

Mr Lannen said that Glenville House was never worth £10,500 to the Board and Mr Curran said that while many of the members thought the price was still, it was essential to have a cheap accommodation.

The Chairman agreed that if the price had been put up for auction it would not have exceeded anything like the price paid for it by the Board.

Mr Lannen said that he failed to see why the Board had to pay for the privilege or half of what they paid for it.

Deputy Kenneally said that if they had to build a place they could do it as cheaply as they could. The Chairman and the Secretary marked that this was in respect of a new hospital was £1,500 to £2,000 per bed.

The Board decided to defer the question of any expenditure on the fever hospital until the purchase of Glenville.

Go Hospital
An estimate of £250 for repairs to ceilings and windows at the County Hospital, Waterford was approved on the proposition of Mr Gallagher, seconded by Deputy Ormonde.

Complaints
Arising from a proposal to advertise the post of Assistant Orthopaedic Surgeon at a salary scale of £800-£900, the Secretary stated that he had been the scale agreed at a conference between the County Managers' Association, the I.M.A. and the Department. Mr Lannen remarked that this was a great deal of money for a man going around giving all this money.

The Secretary said that it was a matter for the Board to decide whether or not the appointment was necessary as Dr O'Driscoll was the Regional Surgeon and an assistant was required to take charge in his absence in other areas.

Mr Lannen asked how many outside patients were being treated at the orthopaedic unit at the County Hospital Waterford. The reason he asked the question, he said, was that over a bed there for patients in Dungarvan who urgently needed treatment, but so far there was no bed available for him. It was unfair to be taking in income patients when the County said while they had patients of their own who were awaiting treatment.

The Secretary said that the Surgeon was the person who decided the allocation of the beds. Deputy Kyne said that he was wholeheartedly in agreement with the complaint made by Mr Lannen. He was not a bit too happy he said that the lower income patients were getting the preference they were entitled to in this regard. He then cited a case of a man in Waterford City who had been waiting 2 years for a bed in the unit but who had taken a far not got it.

This service is there primarily for the working people who can't afford to go anywhere else, he added.

The Chairman said that the matter was one which could be taken up with the Surgeon.

It was agreed by votes 2 (Messrs Gill and Lannen) to advertise the post at the new salary scale.

Mr Curran said that a complaint had been made to him that the Dispensary Doctor at Ardmore had refused to attend

Waterford County Council
Pump Sinking System Unsatisfactory
Councillor's Complaint Facetious Says Engineer

Mr M Morrissey, Chairman, presided at the adjourned meeting of the above held in Dungarvan on Tuesday last. Also present were Messrs Quirk, T. D., Kyne, T.D., H. Leamy, H. Dowd, K. O'Ryan, C. Curran, N. Walsh, S. Lynch, J. Flynn, W. Foran, P. Butler, J. Power and W. Kennelly, T.D.

Messrs S. J. Moynihan, Co. Manager, D. Sheehy, Co. Engineer, J. Ormonde, Chief Assistant Engineer and J. G. Dowling, Secretary, were in attendance.

Small Dwellings Loan
The Council's decision to affix to the mortgage for a loan of £20,000 for the purposes of the Small Dwellings Acquisition Acts.

Ardmore and Grange Parish
Further to the request from the above Council read at the last meeting referring to the serious condition of the bye-roads in the Ardmore and Grange areas, the need for water and street lighting, the Co. Engineer with reference to the latter stated that a sum of £250 for 12 lights in Ardmore was included in last year's estimate but the Council had cut it to £50 and 6 lights had been provided.

Mr Curran said that a number of local prominent people told him that they were satisfied with the existing lights and it was agreed to make no order in this regard.

With reference to the question of roads Mr Curran said he was supporting the Parish Council on this matter. The bye-roads in the Ardmore and Grange areas and also in the Clashmore area were in a shocking condition, he said, and the people were restless because they were let go as they were while colonial sums were spent on the main roads for the benefit of tourists. The farmers and the workmen were every bit as entitled to have good roads as the tourists, he said.

The Co. Manager reminded Mr Curran that he could raise this matter at the special roads meetings held each year before the estimates.

With regard to the water question the Co. Engineer said that this had been before the Council on a previous occasion and various extensions suggested—the furthest to Crossford Cross which in 1951 was estimated to cost £2,200. This estimate would be higher now, he said.

At that time as the water rents had not been fixed it had not been possible to have a list of those who would take the water, he said, but this could now be done and the Council would then have a clean picture of the financial position.

When Mr Curran said that the extension to Ballinamona, a thickly populated area was only about 30 yards, the Co. Engineer said that the cost of this would be about £600.

At the request of the Co. Manager, Mr Curran said that he would get a list of the people in the district who would be willing to take in the water and the Co. Engineer was granted and to forward it to the County Engineer who would prepare an estimate for the next meeting.

Pump Sinking System
With regard to complaints made by Deputy Kyne at the last meeting that the Priority list had not been followed in cases of pumps which had been sunk in Dungarvan, Ballinamona and Ballinacorney, the County Engineer, as requested, reported on the complaint raised as follows:

The explanation of this was that it was better to complete the pumps in a particular Engineer's area before moving the plant into another Engineer's district.

As the Priority list was made out in Dispensary areas, which do not coincide with Engineer's areas there were naturally some departures from the priority list.

As the County Council seem to require the list to be followed irrespective of Engineer's areas I think it would be better to follow the Priority list, but as the latter is made up according to Dispensary area a Priority of the latter should be compiled.

I would suggest that a new list of the remaining pumps and wells be made up showing (1) a

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Employment of Tradesmen—No Favouritism
Deputy Kyne again raised the point of a statement by the Secretary at a previous meeting that repairs to certain dispensary residences had been held up because no tradesman had been available to carry out the work at the time. He had contacted six or seven unemployed men and sent some of them to the Secretary but had been informed later that none of them had been taken on and the permanent staff of the Board had been moved out to the work.

Mr Kyne then read a letter from Messrs William Burke & Sons, Dungarvan, which stated that they had been available at the time to do the work referred to, but had never been asked to tender for it.

He went on to state that it was deplorable that such a situation should arise and that these men were available to do the work when the Secretary stated that none could be got to do it.

Mr Lannen said that in matters like this the Board could have no favouritism or any white-haired boys picking pals and picking chums was wrong, he said, as everyone was entitled to justice and all the workmen were entitled to their share.

If I thought that any engineer or anyone else was doing so I would move that the matter be brought to the notice of the Minister, he said.

Mr Walsh said that before any accusations were made they should hear the Engineer's side of the matter.

The Secretary then read a report from the Engineer, Mr Conway, which stated that no pre-showing to any tradesman system of carrying out repairs by contract had been discarded by the County Council as unsatisfactory in the case of cottages and he saw no reason for reviving it to do repairs to dispensaries and dispensary residences by the Board. The report added that direct labour was a better basis for doing the work as it made for a question of supervision and they knew the men on the job and the work they were capable of doing. No essential work had been held up as a result of system followed, the report added.

Deputy Kyne said that the report was all right but it did not meet the position and was not an answer to the Secretary's statement that the work had not been held up because it was not available. He was sure he said that the Secretary had not conjured this statement out of the air and that he had some basis for making it.

The Engineer said that the system in operation was that where the Board had repairs to do he would apply to the County Council Engineer for that area to find if he had men available to do them. The time lag mentioned was due to the delay in the supply of materials and not because men were not available.

Deputy Kyne—If so it is all taken care of by the County Council Engineer, as requested, reported on the complaint raised as follows:

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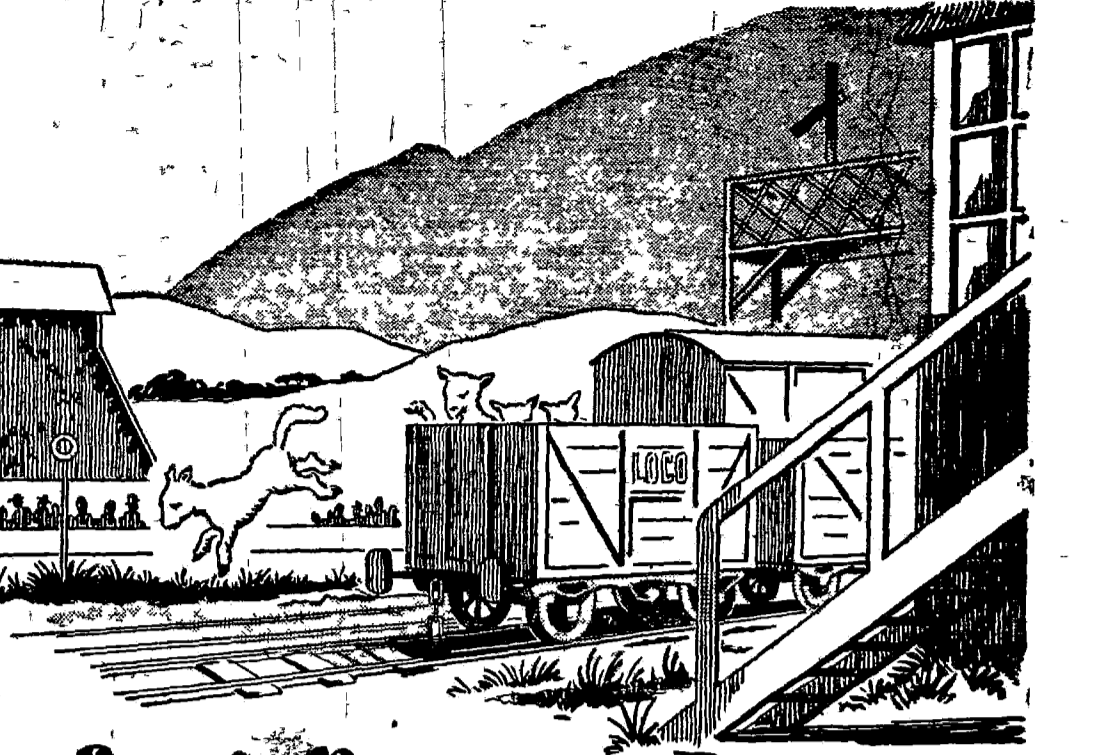
