ENGINEER'S FINAL FIGURES FOR RECONSTRUCTION OF SHANDON HOUSES

County Manager And Engineer Requested To Attend Next Meeting

Ald T. Kyme, T.D. Chairman presided at the fortnightly meeting of the above held on Friday night last. Also present were Messrs M. D. Moloney, N. Kelly, J. McCarthy, R. Keane, Mr. E. Deery, Town Clerk, was in attendance.

Housing Priority Lists
Mr. Moloney referred to the private meeting of the Council held on the previous Monday night to deal with the above and asked whether it would be advisable to make a statement to the Press on what had taken place.

The Chairman said that all they could say was that the conference had taken place with the County Medical Officer and the Health Inspectors and that the lists as prepared had been reviewed and finalised. He added that for the information of the public, copies of the lists would be posted at the Town Hall.

Reports On Repairs
Referring to his complaint at a previous meeting concerning lack of reports from the Engineer on points raised by members at meetings, Mr. Moloney said that he was glad to see that the County Manager had made the following order—

The report to be submitted by Town Engineer for each fortnightly meeting, for the information of members stating whether applications for house repairs raised at Council meetings have been granted or refused.

Mr. Moloney the Clerk said that the contractor's original tender had been £5,484. He gathered that the contractors were now claiming something around £9,414.

Goathouses Needed
Mrs. Loughmore appeared before the meeting pointing out that she had no out-house to put coal in and requesting the Council to provide one for her.

The Chairman said that the Engineer had estimated the cost of providing one at £15. If Mrs. Langan was agreeable to pay this amount it would be spread over the rent of her house.

Mrs. Langan replied that she could not afford any addition like that.

The Chairman said that the difficulty the Council found in it was that if they erected an out-house for Mrs. Langan they would have to do so for all the other tenants there.

Mr. Keane suggested that the Council might make some materials available to Mrs. Langan to put up some kind of cheap house as many of the others up there had.

Mrs. Langan said that if she got this her husband would put it up for her.

It was agreed to inquire from the Engineer whether Mr. Keane's suggestion could be carried out.

Trees At Bridge Street
Consideration of planting eight trees at Bridge Street as suggested by Mr. Casey at a previous meeting was again adjourned in the absence of Mr. Casey.

The Council agreed that whether Mr. Casey attended the next meeting or not, the matter could be finally dealt with on that night.

Payment Of Housing Loans And Grants
The next item on the agenda was the motion drafted by the Council's Solicitor following notices of motion from Councilors Lannen and Moloney concerning conditions of employment under which grants and loans should be paid by the Council.

The motion for discussion from the Solicitor was that the Council shall not make a Loan or Grant to any person in respect of the erection of a house where it is shown to the Council's satisfaction that throughout such erection the Council's By-laws have not been complied with, and rates of wages have not been paid or conditions of labour observed at least as advantageous to the persons employed in such erection as the appropriate rates of

Rent Collectors Reports
Mr. Keane said that they should obtain reports from the rent collectors in future as to the condition in which tenants were keeping their houses.

He suggested that if the memorial took the form of a torch of liberty—a tall granite column—they could have a good strong bulb placed at the top and it would then serve the two purposes.

The Chairman said that problems of Town Planning and permission were involved in such a suggestion.

Mr. Keane said that a Memorial was to be erected but no decision as to its location had yet been made.

The discussion ended.

Council Should Run Dances
Mr. Moloney pointing out that local clubs make colossal amounts of money running dances at the Town Hall on St. Stephen's Night for which they got the hall for £20 suggested that the Council should keep such nights for themselves and run dances and so save the ratepayers enormous amounts of money.

The Clerk said that beyond the ordinary expenditure no new works would be done without the Council's consent.

The Chairman said that a lot of people felt that a great deal of money was being wasted shovelling stones at the berths. Perhaps the Harbour Master knows what he is doing, he said, but the work doesn't seem to be paying any dividends.

Mr. Keane—It looks like men with shovels and spades trying to shift Crucachan.

Finally, when the Clerk assured the members that no new works would be done without the prior consent of the Council, the overdraft was approved.
